## W. H. 'Bill' Clonts Is Buried Tuesday

Funeral services were held for William (Bill) Henry Clonts Tuesday at 2:00 p.m. in the First Baptist Church. Rev. Floyd Bailey, pastor of the Foursquare Gospel Church, officiated. Burial was in the Knox City Cemetery with Smith Funeral Home in charge of arrangements. Mr. Clonts, 90, died at 12:20 p.m. in the Brazos Valley Care Home where he had been a patient for the past five years. Born November 29, 1883, in Dallas, Georgia, he moved to Red Springs, Texas, early in life and then to Knox City in 1906. He married Jennie Lowes on January 19, 1936, in Fort Worth.

Mr. Clonts served in the Navy during World War I. He was a member of Orient Masonic Lodge #905, Haskell Commandery, Hella Shrine Temple in Fort Worth, and the Teague-Carpenter American Legion Post #229. He was a retired farmer. Survivors include his wife, Jennie; a daughter, Mrs. Ruth Averitt of San Antonio; three grandchildren; and five great-grandchildren.

## Danny Del Hierro Seriously Injured

Danny Del Hierro, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfonso Del Hierro of O'Brien, was seriously injured Monday afternoon about 2:30 o'clock in a fall from a scaffold in Brownwood where he was working.

According to Supt. of Schools Harry Holder of O'Brien, Danny was helping his brother, a concrete reinforcement contractor in Brownwood, between semesters at McMurry College in Abilene where he is enrolled.

Mr. Holder said that Danny is a patient at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene where hospital attendants list his condition as very critical.

Danny is a 1973 graduate of Carney Independent Schools.

## Citizens State Bank Deposits Show Gain

Deposits in the Citizens State Bank of Knox City at the close of business on December 31, 1973, were \$6,638,564.61, reflecting an increase of \$1,332,343.75 over the deposits a year ago. In a conversation this week with Fuller Shannon, executive vice president, he attributed the

growth to the good cotton and milo crops harvested along with the good prices, as well as the increase in cattle prices.

The figures indicate how dependent on agriculture the area is, when the farmers fare well, business does well also. A consolidated report of condition of the Citizens State Bank appears elsewhere in this week's News.

The County Show alternates each year between Knox City and Munday.

A Rhineland 4-H Club member, Mary Denise Zeissel, had the Grand Champion Steer, while Dave Partridge, a Munday 4-H Club member had the Reserve Champion.

A Hampshire barrow, owned by Ronnie Phillips of Munday, was named Grand Champion in the market swine division, and Reserve Champion honors went to a Duroc barrow owned by John Alsides of O'Brien.

In the breeding swine division, Art Crowner, a Knox City FFA Chapter member, took Grand Champion with his Duroc boar. Kyle White's Spotted Poland China boar brought home Reserve Champion honors. Kyle is from Knox City. Grand Champion gilt was a Hampshire owned by Rudy Esquivel, a Munday 4-H member. Reserve Champion gilt was a Duroc owned by Knox City FFA Chapter member, Mike Burkham.

**Social Security News**  
Persons working for wages in private homes are covered by social security.  
Coverage of domestic workers is a little different than coverage of regular industrial or business employees. Close family relatives are generally excluded, and the wages paid must be \$50 or more a quarter from each employer to be covered.  
Just as in business, the employer must report to Internal Revenue Service covered wages of each employee at the end of each calendar quarter. We have just finished the last quarter of 1973. Wages paid in October, November, and December are to be reported by January 31, 1974.

After a close first half, 36-38, the Hounds got off to a slow start in the second half against Paducah and couldn't seem to find the bucket. This proved to be a fatal mistake as the Dragons opened a gap which the Hounds could never close. Had it not been for the cold third quarter in which we hit 2 of 13 shots of which most were good inside shots, the game would have gone right down to the final buzzer. Add to the third quarter woes of the Hounds 34 turnovers in the game and it is easy to understand why we got beat. Most of those 34 were caused by the Paducah full court press. The press so far this season hadn't hurt us that bad, but the team quickness of the Dragons made ordinarily good passes bad passes on this night.

I felt before the game that we had to control the Dragons and slow them down offensively but their 81 points shows that we obviously didn't. 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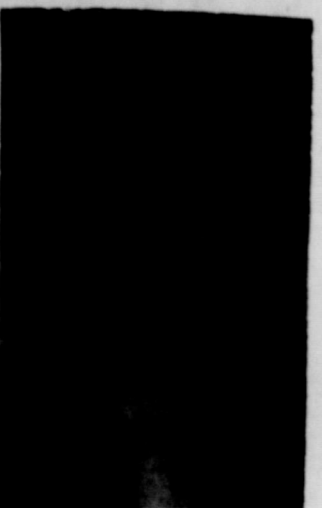

chairman of the Appropriations Committee for an unprecedented six terms. His seniority, fourth in the House membership of 150, assures him membership on the Appropriations Committee as long as he remains in office. Equally important is his membership on the Legislative Budget Board which has the responsibility of keeping in touch with financial requests of State Agencies between sessions of the Legislature. In addition the Budget Board prepares biennium budget recommendations to be presented to the Legislature when it convenes.

Mr. Heatly's major activities and concerns have been with livestock, agriculture, Mental Health and Mental Retardation, Texas Youth Council, and public education. He has supported all constructive legislation and voted for all pay raises and retirement benefits for school teachers.

During his last three terms he has introduced the School Bond Assumption Act. This would work on the same order as the Road Bond Assumption Act as it was passed many years ago. It would mean that the State would assume the outstanding school bond indebtedness, thereby alleviating the sinking fund and permit the public schools to have considerable more funds for their operation. This bill has not passed, but Mr. Heatly hopes that it will gain momentum and become a law in the not too distant future.

Mr. Heatly authored and got passed during the recent session of the Legislature a Rural Medical Education Board that would assist medical students who would agree to practice in a rural area of less than 25,000 population.

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

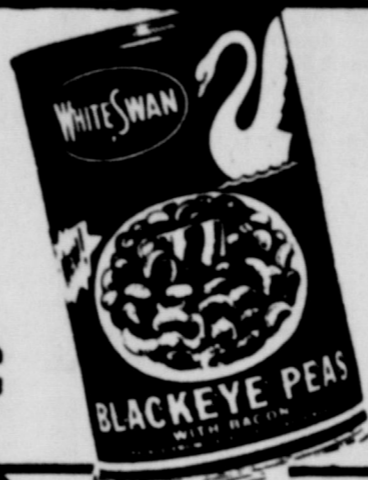
