O'Brien Baptists Begin Work on New Church Building

Work started Monday on a new \$75,000.00 Baptist Church at O'Brien. Contractor is Fletcher Construction Co. of Ft. Worth. The firm is also building a new Baptist Church at Rochester.

L. P. Bennett, 82, Dies at Lubbock

Funeral services for L. P. Bennett, 82, brother of Mrs. W. H. Benedict, were held Monday, Nov. 12 at the Broadway Church of Christ in Lubbock with Don Morris, president of Abilene Christian College, officiating.

A widely known rancher and philanthropist, Mr. Bennett died in a Lubbock hospital where he had been a patient since Oct. 29. Death was attributed to a heart attack. Interment was in Tech Memorial Park, Lubbock.

Other survivors include four sons, Gene of Denver City, Hugh and Ralph of Colorado Springs, Colo., and J. Frank of Whiteface; four daughters, Mrs. W. H. Kirby of Cotton Center, Mrs. Virgil Hamby of Midland, Mrs. Fay Wallace of Reagan Wells and Mrs. Hurly Chenault of Ft. Worth; 17 grandchildren and 15 great grandchildren.

Born near Conway, Ark., Mr. Bennett came to Knox County as a lad of 13 and secured a job on a ranch. He was married to Miss Ruth Smith and in 1916 the family moved to Terry County. Two years later, he and his father-in-law bought 11 sections of land in Yoakum County. Oil was discovered on the land in 1935.

Bennett liberally shared the wealth from oil on his land. He was a benefactor of ACC, to which he gave two and a half sections of land in 1929. He later gave oil royalties to the college. Bennett Gymnasium at ACC was built from funds obtained from the oil land, and college officials today figure the remaining wealth from Bennett's gifts at \$1 million.

A niece, Mrs. Mabel Pyeatt, attended the services in Lubbock Her mother, Mrs. Benedict, was unable to make the long drive.

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County Judges in Texas Now Executing Freight Reduction Authorization Certificates

Walter T. McKay, State Director, Farmers Home Administration, has been advised by the Secretary of agriculture and the governor of Texas of revised routines in the execution of freight rate certificates entitling eligible applicants to reduced freight rates under Interstate Commerce Commission Drouth Orders.

Effective Nov. 15, Governor Shivers relegated to all county judges in designated drouth counties the authority to execute certificates. In Knox County Judge L. A. Parker of Benjamin will serve.

Persons entitled to reduced rates are those designated as being in distress and in need of relief by the United States Dept. of Agriculture or by such State agents as designated by the Department.

"Heretofore, Farmers Home Administration County Supervisors were authorized to execute certificates and only stockmen

who were eligible for emergency feed could obtain the certificates. This revised authorization will extend the benefits of reduced freight rates to all stockmen in designated counties," McKay stated.

Rural Mail Carriers Help USDA in Livestock Survey

Rural mail carriers left some cards along their routes Wednesday that they'll want back in a few days.

The cards are used in making the yearly survey of the number of livestock on Texas farms, Postmaster Jeff Graham explained.

Every year at this time the post office cooperates with the U. S. Department of Agriculture in getting reports from farmers and ranchers about their livestock holdings.

In distributing the survey cards the carriers pick boxes at random along their routes.

"This means that not every box will get a card," Graham said. "For this reason, it is important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that USDA can get a true sample of the nation's livestock holdings."

The facts and figures secured in the survey are the basis for the state and national pig crop report and inventories of livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year.

The material is analyzed and reported by the Crop Reporting Board of the Agriculture Marketing Service, an agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

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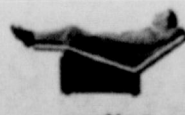

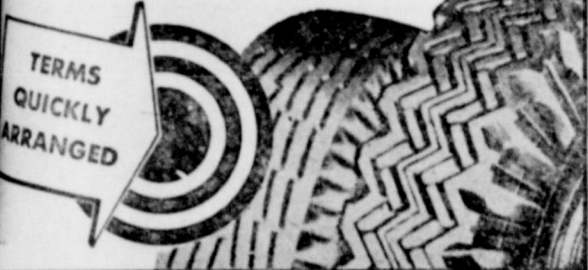

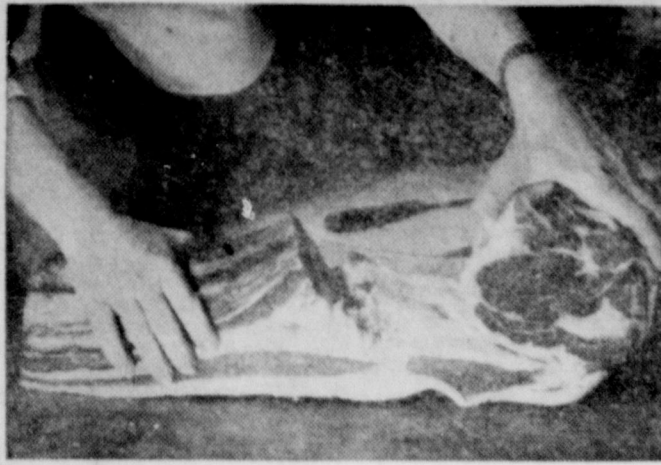

arate the rib-eye from the outside section. Cut rib bones free and trim lean meat off. Remove thin blade cartilage and backbone. (2) Then roll outside section, fat side out, into a pot roast and skewer or tie. Cook over low temperature with moisture for best results. (3) Slice the rib-eye into 1½ to 2-inch "country club" steaks which are tender

enough to broil or, if preferred, swiss. Use bones for beef stock and lean meat for stew. Wrap or cover the cuts loosely if they are to be used within a few days; freeze them if longer storage is desired. At-home fabricating saves time and money, says the Texas Beef Council and provides three or four distinctively different dinners.

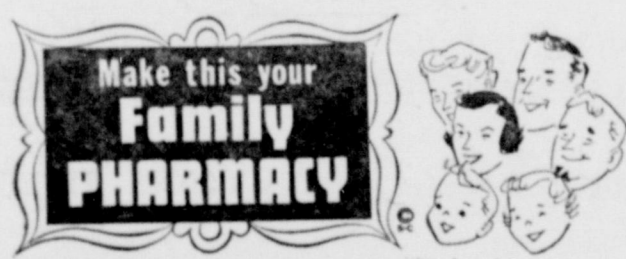

Postmaster Lists 10 Pointers for Christmas Mailing

In anticipation of the largest holiday mail volume in history, Postmaster Jeff Graham called Knox Citizens' attention this week to ten basic pointers outlined by Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield for users of the mails to follow in order to assure prompt and safe delivery of their Christmas cards and gifts.

1. Address mail fully and clearly. Write legibly or print plainly. Where applicable, use zone numbers on the address and return address. Avoid using abbreviations which might confuse mail handlers.
2. Be certain that a return address is printed on the upper left hand corner of both Christmas cards and parcels. This will prevent any undelivered mail ending up in a "dead letter" office.
3. Do not enclose coins or hard objects of any kind in letters, without marking the envelope for hand stamping. High speed cancelling machines cannot process such letters, often jam and damage letters.
4. Do not mail cash in any Christmas gift. For safety's sake use Postal Money Orders or checks.
5. Make sure parcels are well packed and securely wrapped in strong containers. Cushioning material, such as excelsior, shredded newspapers or tissue paper should be evenly and firmly placed on all sides of the Christmas gift. The carton should be wrapped in heavy paper and securely tied with strong twine.
6. Gifts of a delicate nature, such as glass, china, electrical appliances, radios and musical instruments, must be marked "Fragile" by the mailer. Food stuffs should be marked "Perishable" if subject to spoilage.
7. Insure parcels. Register letters of real value. Where only proof of delivery is required for letters of no intrinsic value use certified mail. Use combination mail where a letter or message—other than a gift tag—is to be enclosed inside a Christmas parcel.
8. Ask any post office for the

free pamphlet, "Post Office Department Publication No. 3," which contains rates of postage and limits of size and weight for domestic mail. Another free pamphlet is entitled "Packaging and Wrapping Parcels for Mailing."

9. Mail Christmas cards and parcels early to avoid the last minute rush and waiting in line at the post office. The best times to avoid crowds at stamp windows are before 10 a. m. and between 1:30 and 3:30 p. m.

10. Every postal employee is happy to answer questions on postal rules and regulations. Anyone with problems about mailing his Christmas parcels should avail himself of the opportunity of discussing the problems with postal employees, and taking advantage of their experience.

Graham further emphasized how important it is to start planning now to shop early and mail early for Christmas.
