Young Farmers Fly In To Washington To Air Needs

Texas Farmers Union is sponsoring a Young Farmers Legislative Fly-in to Washington this week in conjunction with the nationwide National Farmers Union program. Fifty Texas farmers between the ages of 20 and 40 joined several hundred from other states who flew into Washington Saturday night to discuss farm legislation with members of Congress.

The group will attend hearings on the Mondale Bargaining Bill, a measure designed to give producers of farm commodities legal authority to negotiate prices with processors and handlers. Hearings on the bill are being held by Senator Ellender's Committee on Agriculture, and it has the support of both Texas Farmers Union and National Farmers Union. Senator Walter Mondale of Minnesota, the bill's sponsor, has scheduled a briefing with the "Fly-in" group.

The young farmers and ranchers are meeting with Senator Ralph Yarborough and Congressman Olin Teague of Texas to discuss the GI Education Bill and with Senator Gaylord Nelson of Wisconsin about his Young Farmer Investment Act. They will also confer with Senator Lee Metcalf of Montana about his Young Farmer Investment

Act. They will also confer with Senator Lee Metcalf of Montana about his bill to eliminate the unfair competition of tax-loss farming with commercial farm and ranch operators.

A group of the young farmers representing eight important peanut producing counties are having a special peanut meeting with Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman and personnel from the peanut division of USDA to discuss peanut grading, sampling and proposed changes in the peanut program. The peanut farmers will also consider how the Mondale Bargaining Bill can be used to give them the authority to negotiate peanut prices.

Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman of Waco, who is accompanying the Texas delegation to Washington, described the participants as "aggressive, determined and outspoken young men who are taking advantage of their democratic responsibility to let government officials know their problems and needs."

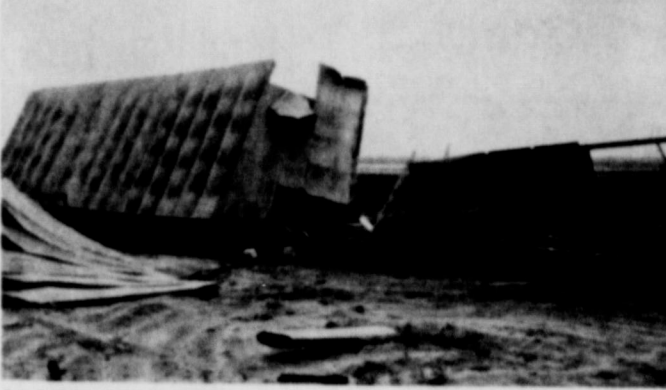
"The Washington Legislative Fly-in program is an integral part of the total action program of Farmers Union, and we feel that it is the way for a constructive and responsible farm organization to dramatize the problems and get results," Naman said.

A visit with Vice President Hubert Humphrey climaxes the three-day stay in Washington, and the young farmers returned to Texas Wednesday evening.

Saturday Night Rain, Hail, And Wind Hits Knox City

Knox City was hit hard last Saturday night about 7 p.m. as a fast moving cloud moved in from the northwest with heavy rain, hail, and strong damaging winds.

The storm warning siren sounded about 6:50 p.m.

Rain amounts varied from 1.6 to 4 inches. Most gauges in Knox City showed approximately 2 1/2 inches rain in about thirty-five minutes. Flood conditions almost existed as the heavy down-pour hit. Several television antennas were blown down by the gale winds. Heavy garbage cans were scattered over town, and area damage was heavy.

North of town, one of three

hangers at the Knox City Airport was blown onto the Benjamin highway, and highway crews had to be called out to remove the debris. John Crowover, who owned the hangar, estimated damage at \$5,000.00. Telephone and utility lines were damaged and some area residents were without electricity for about 15 hours.

Two cotton warehouses at O'Brien were completely destroyed, and damage at the Lloyd Stephens farm five miles southeast of Knox City blew over two barns. Irrigation pipe was scattered and fence damage was done at Morris Denton's place just east of Lloyd Stephens.

Vote Saturday At City Hall For City, Schools, And Hospital

Voters may cast their separate ballots here at City Hall Saturday, April 6 from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. for four elections, none of which are contested.

For the first time, the City of Knox City, the Knox City Independent School District, the Knox County Schools, and the Knox County Hospital District will hold a joint election.

Otis Harbert will be presiding judge, assisted by Mrs. Odell Harbert, Mrs. Louise Graham, Mrs. G. W. (Jack) Coats, and Mrs. Tommy Abe Watson. Mr. Harbert explained that all counties under 100,000 population were required to open the polls at 8 a.m., and Knox County falls in this category.

The three candidates seeking three seats on the city council and L. V. Worley, Willard Skiles, and Larry Don Lain.

Three trustees are to be elected for the Knox City Independent School Board. These three candidates are Donald Johnson, Charles Reese, and John L. Grindstaff Jr.

Jack Idol's name will appear on the ballot as County Trustee-at-large for Knox County.

Three men will be elected as directors of the Knox County Hospital District Board. Candidates include W. O. Smith, Vernal Zeissel, and C. J. Reese.

All registered voters will be eligible to cast their ballots this Saturday. Please vote.

EDITORIAL

During the month of April, there will come a knock at the door or a ring of the door-bell. The caller may be a stranger, or often a neighbor already known.

In either case, he or she will be a volunteer of the American Cancer Society, prepared to leave life-saving information, and asking our support for the Society's work.

That is why the information the ACS volunteer will bring can be a matter of life. Ours. But to carry on its work of education, service and research, the support must be ours as well.

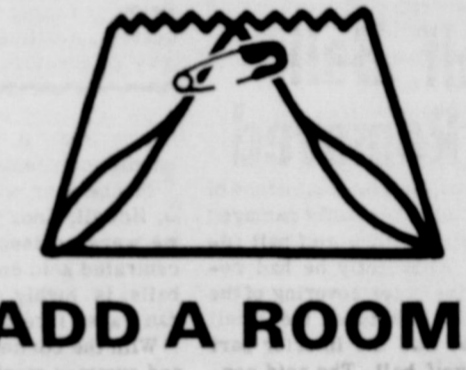

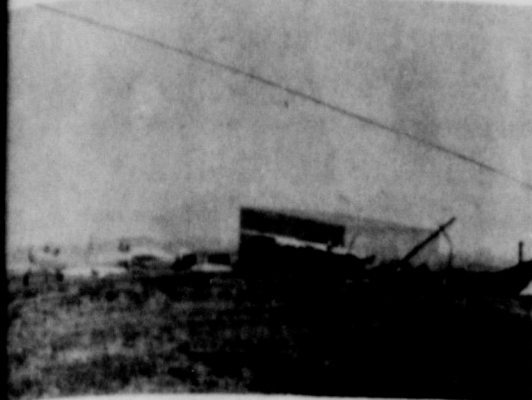

USE TO BE — John Crowover's hangar at the airport was totally destroyed as the storm blew it off the highway. Some damage was done to the three other hangars.



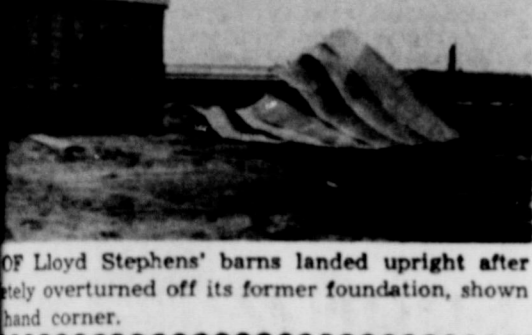
A HEAVY COTTON TRAILER was overturned just south of the John A. Smith residence when the winds struck.

Hard Work And Dolph Briscoe, Man With Progress In Mind

Hard work and Dolph Briscoe go hand-in-hand. Work is the name of the game so far as this prominent Texas businessman-rancher is concerned because he has built his fame and reputation on just that. Briscoe, of Uvalde, who is a candidate for the Texas governorship, is famous in the Lone Star state's farming and ranching circles for taking on tough jobs for no pay and coming up with the tough jobs well done.

Briscoe, who would be the first to deny that he is a miracle man, has the happy faculty for "coming up with a miracle," fellow Uvalde citizens and friends are fond of saying.

"He can make it do everything but rain on command," says one, "and sometimes I'd be willing to swear he can do that, too, if he puts his mind to it."

Briscoe's formula is simple: "Progress" in his mind is the keynote and action is his byword.

The gubernatorial candidate's qualifications and accomplishments are almost too numerous to mention.

He is a banker, businessman, civic leader and a former state legislator. He is married to the former Janey Slaughter, of Austin, and has three children, Janie, 17, Chip, 15, and Cele, 11.

The tall, distinguished-looking Texan looks upon his campaign to eradicate the screwworm in Texas as one of the landmarks of his career.

His father, Dolph Briscoe, Sr., was a prominent ranchman, businessman, wool and mohair dealer and agriculture leader before him.

It was from his father that Briscoe developed his love for the land and his fellow-feeling for the men who work the land.

He is a graduate of the University of Texas and was first elected to the Texas House of Representatives in 1948 where he served eight years.

He was never opposed for reelection.

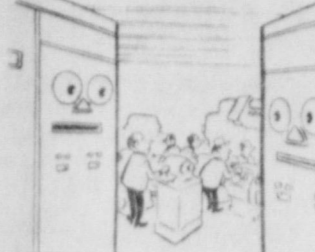

VA Questions And Answers

(EDITOR'S NOTE — Veterans and their families are asking thousands of questions concerning the benefits their Government provides for them through the Veterans Administration. Below are some representative queries. Additional information may be obtained at any VA office.)

Q. — I am 61 years of age. May I convert my National Service Life Insurance term policy to the Modified Life Plan? What would the new premium be?

A. — It is not possible to convert to the Modified Life Plan after age 60.

Q. — I served in the Army from 1956 to 1959. Am I eligible for any G. I. Bill benefits, particularly a business loan?

A. — You are eligible for many benefits, from education and training to home and farm home loans, under the "Veterans Readjustment Benefits Act of 1966," popularly known as the Post-Korean G. I. Bill. However, this Act, which covers veterans who served in our Armed Forces after Jan. 31, 1955, does not include business loans for veterans among the benefits it provides. The Small Business Administration, though, may make business loans to veterans. Check with your nearest U. S. Veterans Assistance Center or VA office for information and assistance on all your veteran benefits.

Q. — My husband is a veteran of World War II and has a service-connected disability of 100 per cent. What benefits do members of his family have if one of them needs hospitalization?

A. — By law, the Veterans Administration's program of hospital and medical care is available to veterans only. VA may not provide hospitalization for the dependents of veterans. Even veterans are admitted to VA hospitals on a priority basis; i. e. (1) veterans with a service-connected disability requiring hospitalization for this disability; (2) veterans with a service-connected disability requiring hospitalization for a non-service connected illness; (3) veterans without a service-connected disability requiring hospitalization are admitted when beds are available if they are unable to afford private hospital care.

Persons nearing age 65 should talk over the Medicare provisions with a representative of a Social Security district office 1 to 3 months before that 65th birthday.



Still Time For Flower Garden

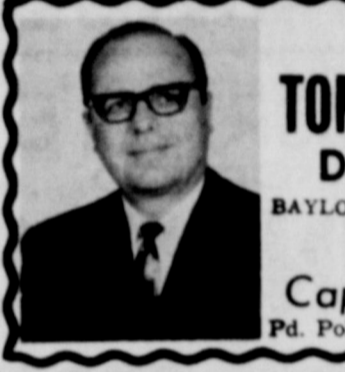
Abundant rainfall and the late arrival of warm weather should not stop you from having an attractive garden, according to E. E. Janne, Extension landscape horticulturist at Texas A&M University. By using started plants as soon as the soil is dry enough to plant, attractive flower borders can be established before the extreme heat of summer arrives.

For plants to be grown in bright, sunny areas, try Petunia, Portulaca, Zinnia, Marigold, Salvia, and Celosia. For shady areas plant Coleus, Impatiens, and Begonias — for a splash of color a massing of Caladium bulbs will add contrast. Caladiums should not be planted until the soil is warm and night temperatures remain above 55 degrees, says Janne.

Annuals are many and varied in color, and the new All-America Seed selections will draw attention. There are always new and different varieties available, although not necessarily any better than the old favorites that have withstood the test of time.

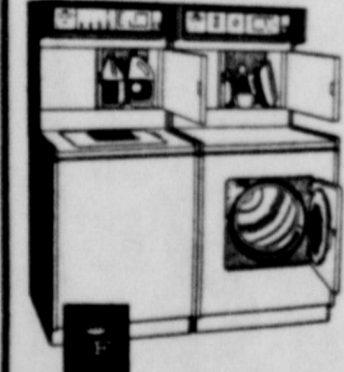

Welfare Worker Available In Wichita Falls

Miss Mary Wright of Wichita Falls is the Child Welfare Worker for the Department of Public Welfare of Texas. Miss Wright's office is located at 401 Burk Burnett Road, Wichita Falls, and is available for consultation through this address.

The Wichita Falls Office has the responsibility for licensing day care in twenty-one counties which includes Wichita County.

Child Care by other than the child's relatives or parents is subject to licensing by the Child Welfare Department. Any person or agency in this area caring for unrelated children away from the child's home is urged to contact Miss Wright for license application.

The licensing requirement is established by House Bill 15 which calls for licensing by both non-profit and commercial facilities. No charge is made for the license.

The licensing law is designed to offer physical safety for children through adequate supervision, qualified staff, buildings and grounds well suited to the child's needs.

The license is valid unless revoked and every license is reviewed annually.

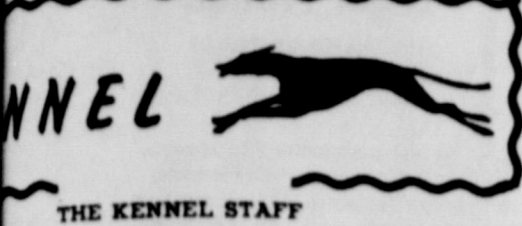

The degree should show growth of the candidate, as an individual, as a member of her school, her community, her church, her home and her FHA chapter.

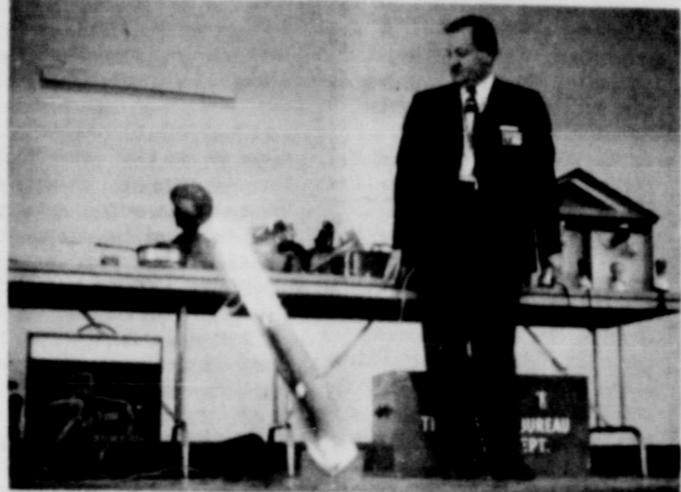

KC School Students Attend Fire Prevention Program Wed.

Fires don't just happen—they are caused, Joe Smetana, Safety Director of the Texas Farm Bureau, pointed out in a graphic fire demonstration held March 27 in the Knox City School Auditorium. He went on to name the three causes for most fires: "men, women and children."

In the 45 minute program Smetana used a variety of demonstration equipment and materials placed on tables 16 feet in length to dramatize seven basic facts about fire, its use, and control: (1) what fire is; (2) how to control fires; (3) the fact that nothing is fire-proof; (4) kitchen fires and their control; (5) fuel vapors; (6) the power of petroleum products; and (7) household wiring and overloaded electrical circuits.

Using a "fire triangle board," Smetana illustrated that fire is like a three-legged stool - it can't work with one of the legs missing. The "legs" fire depends on are: (1) fuel, (2) heat and (3) air. He stated that in American homes these three things come together in deadly and destructive combination every 57 seconds - an average of 1,500 home fires every day, causing more than 5,000 deaths in home fires every year.

Creating quite a loud explosion from one single drop of gasoline, Smetana stated that one gallon of gasoline contains approximately 155,000 drops and under ideal conditions, could produce an explosion force equal to the power of at least 30 sticks of dynamite.

After demonstrating how fires can be caused by overloaded electrical circuits and improper fusing, Smetana pointed out that many fires of this type are blamed on faulty wiring. He suggested that "faulty thinking" is involved more often than "faulty wiring."

The demonstration, which was brought to the Knox City School under the sponsorship of the Knox County Farm Bureau, is part of a long-range fire prevention program now being conducted by the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department. The demonstration has been presented over 400 times for some 125,000 people.

Floyd Baker assisted Smetana during the demonstration as the school's Junior Fire Marshal.

Special guests of the school at the assembly program were Buddy Angle, Mayor; Drew Holcomb, Fire Chief; Larry Don Lain, Fire Marshal; Charles Lankford, City Secretary; Bill Stone, City Marshal, and Don Bayer, Knox County Farm Bureau Agent.
