## Miss Watson New County Health Nurse

Miss Blanch Watson, of Fort Worth, public health nurse of Knox county arrived in Benjamin last week to begin her duties in connection with local CWA work. She is connected with the health and sanitation survey work of the county.

Miss Watson submitted the following article on Diphtheria to the parents of Knox County.

### Diphtheria and Your Child

Is your child among those who are safe from the terrible disease—Diphtheria?

Many thousands of fathers and mothers have made sure that their children will never take diphtheria, by the doctor giving them toxoid or toxin-antitoxin. These children need never fear the disease.

Have you given your child this treatment? Although fewer children are dying from diphtheria now than ever before, your child, if exposed to the disease, is in as much danger as he was before toxin-antitoxin was discovered, unless you have given him this protection.

### The Danger Is Real

Last year an average of 100 children died weekly from Diphtheria in the United States and Canada. At least fifteen times as many more children suffered from the disease.

We can only guess why these children had not been given toxin-antitoxin or toxoid. In a few cases the mother or father, did not believe in such treatment; a few parents did not know how important it was; some could not get to a doctor or a clinic; but most of these children were left unprotected because their fathers and mothers just put off having it done.

Putting off where diphtheria is concerned is always dangerous. In these cases it was tragic.

The same thing will happen this year. Many unprotected children will suffer with diphtheria and every day some of them will die of it. If your children have not been given toxin-antitoxin they may be among the victims. You can do something about protecting them now, and it should not be put off another day.

### What Should You Do

Take your children to the school at the clinic and ask to have them protected against diphtheria. All children, when they are six to nine months of age, should have this treatment. Children under five years are in the greatest danger. They are most likely to get diphtheria and to die of it. The treatment will be in one dose and is simple and harmless and quickly given. It takes a few months for the protection to develop.

Three months after the last treatment, take the children back to the doctor to find out if they have had enough toxin to make them safe. He can tell this by giving them the Schick Test. Be sure to do this. Then you can be certain that your children are safe and that you need never fear diphtheria.

Most of the cases and deaths occur in children under 10 years of age. There were 812 deaths from diphtheria in Texas in 1933.

## In Memoriam

Mr. Ben F. Kay was born in Prescott, Arkansas, May 23, 1877. His parents soon moved to Central Texas where Mr. Kay grew to manhood. In 1895, at the age of 18 years, he joined the Missionary Baptist Church, and was baptized by the Reverend Mr. R. M. Cox in Hill County. On March 17, 1901, at Hubbard, Texas he married Miss Katie Hines, to this union were born eight children; infant twins died; the following survive: Mrs. Ben Lillard, Miss Clyde Kay, Mrs. Walter Roberson; Ben Lewis, and George Kay.

He was in failing health several months prior to his fatal illness, but continued at his duties as a farmer in the Sunset community till his weakened body could no longer carry on. His family took him to the Knox County Hospital where every care and attention were given him. His faithful wife and son Lewis were at his side almost continuously. Other members of his immediate family were with him much. He was visited also by his sisters, Mrs. Will Hanks-ton of Richland, and Mrs. Susie Wells of Houston; and by his brothers, Mr. John Kay of Humble, and Mr. Sam Kay of Longview. Many friends neighbors, and former neighbors called to see him, or to express to his family their concern for his welfare. But in spite of all that loving hearts and skillful hands could do death claimed him at 3 o'clock Saturday morning, December 23, 1932, at the exact age of 56 years and seven months. Interment followed in the Odd Fellow Cemetery at Knox City, Texas.

The great loss of this good man is not alone to his family nor yet to the community in which he lived, the community in which he lived, but more, he was a conscientious citizen, capable of discerning right from wrong, and fearless enough always to what he considered right. He was at all times willing, even eager, to lend a helping hand to one in need. He gave freely of his labor and of his means to any less fortunate than himself.

### 4-H BEDROOM IMPROVEMENT STARTED IN KNOX COUNTY

The 4-H bedroom contest was started Saturday, January 20, when nine bedroom demonstrators and their bedrooms judged before they began the improvements. The judging was done by Mrs. Irene Clifford, Home Economics teacher in the Monday High School.

These rooms were scored on a basis of 1000 points, 125 points for sanitation, including ventilation, screening, cleanliness and ease of cleaning; 100 points for lighting both natural and artificial; 160 points for interior finishes; 365 points for furnishings, furniture that is adequate for needs, appropriate, comfortable and the condition of the furniture and the arrangement; washing facilities, curtains, floor coverings, bedding, linens, pictures and appropriate and harmonious accessories; 50 points for storage for clothing; 100 points for general appearance the attractiveness, restfulness and outlook and 100 points for the suitability of needs of particular girl.

The points scored by the girls varied from 342 points to 675 points. Each girl is busy now to make the most improvement possible as inexpensive as she can. They are striving to have as pleasing a room, one that meets their needs, is comfortable and one that they can easily keep.

### HOTBED BUILT IN HOOD COMMUNITY

"We want to have greens the year round and also raise all the plants for our spring garden and I believe this hotbed is large enough for that purpose," said Mrs. H. L. Cannon, 4-H pantry demonstrator in the Hood club. "There are only three in my family so I dug the pit for my hotbed much smaller than the one described in the leaflet, "Mrs. Cannon further stated."

This hotbed is located on the south side of the garage where it will be well protected. It is about 3 feet wide and six feet long. It is some 14 or 20 inches deep. At a demonstration held in the community a frame was made for this bed using scrap lumber. Muslin cloth dipped in paraffin is to be used to cover the hotbed. It will be tacked on a frame and braced with 2 or 3 cross boards.

## THE ROOSEVELT ROSE

First Quilt Named in Honor of a President Since Lincoln



Revival of quilt-making by American women has been given fresh impetus by the quilt pictured above, which was designed by Ruth E. Finley, author of "Old Patchwork Quilts and The Women Who Made Them", is now the President. Presentation to Mrs. Roosevelt was made at the White House by Good Housekeeping, in the January issue of which Mrs. Finley has the pattern. The quilt is called "Roosevelt Rose".

The "Roosevelt Rose" is an appliqued quilt in an "all-over" design—a reversion to the gorgeous bass-relief patterns of Colonial times but made without the tedious old-time labor of "stuffing" or "padding". The quilt presented to the President is a riot of magnificent color, a variety of brilliant calicoes were used for the flowers of the wreath against a background of black sateen. The quilt is lined and corded with lip-stitching for an occupant of the White House. This was "Mrs. Cleveland's Choice."

"Here the record stops," according to Mrs. Ruth E. Finley, an authority on quilts, author of "Old Patchwork Quilts and the Women Who Made Them," who describes the Roosevelt Rose quilt in the January Good Housekeeping. "Quilts and quilt-making went completely into the discard, Presidents came and went two wars were won. Change followed change. Electric lights, the telephone, the phonograph, the automobile, plane, radio, the talkie have all become, since the eighteen-eighties, the familiars of every day. But where are the quilts designed to record them? No pattern distinctive enough to be more than locally

### T. R. West

#### County Sanitary Supervisor

Mr. Thomas R. West has been assigned to Knox county as County Sanitary Supervisor for the purpose of conducting a county-wide sanitation program. The object of his work will be to improve sanitary conditions by aiding in the protection of drinking water supplies and the installation of approved methods of disposal of human excreta. Where municipal water supplies and sewer systems are available, the objective is to get all habitable buildings connected with the systems, but where there are no available water or sewer systems, such as in the rural communities, Mr. West will endeavor to get accessible to all persons in the county a safe water supply and an approved type of pit toilet. The Civil Works Administration has placed at the disposal of Knox County Sanitary Supervisor the necessary labor for carrying on this program and to avail yourself of this opportunity to sanitize your premises, it is only necessary for you to furnish the material. This means that an approved type of drinking water supply and approved type of excreta disposal are made available for a cost ridiculously low, and an opportunity afforded which should not be overlooked by a single person in Knox County. Mr. West is headquartered in the County Administrator's office in Benjamin and should you desire to discuss any of your problems with him regarding the sanitation of your surroundings, he will be only too glad to assist you in any way that he can.

### VERA 4-H GIRL IMPROVES BEDROOM

Before the bedrooms will be judged again, Addie Bell plans to paint the woodwork, build a closet, make a washstand and improve her bed by adding a spring cover, a mattress cover and pad, a bedspread and adequate bedding.

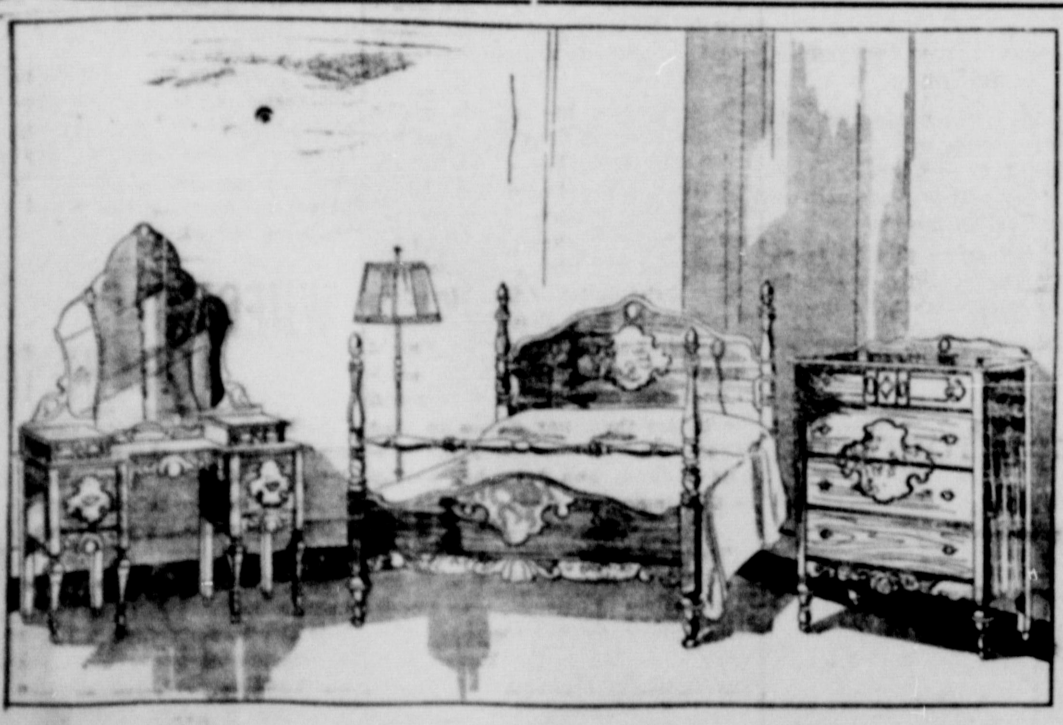

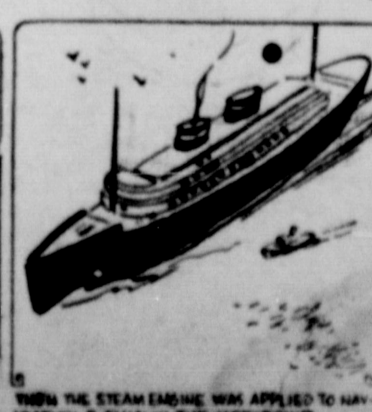

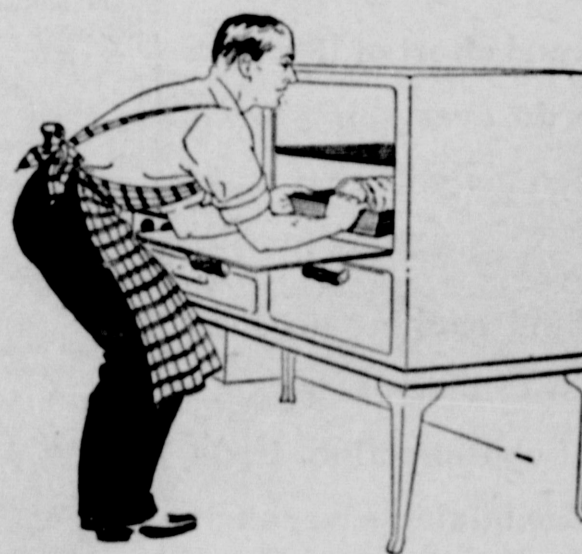
