## NEWS OF AGRICULTURE

By TOMMY ANTILLEY

Cool temperatures throughout the winter have kept greenbug populations and wheat growth at a low level in Knox County. As warmer temperatures prevail and wheat begins to grow vigorously, greenbug populations will begin to increase. Under optimum weather conditions greenbugs can produce an average of three young per day for a period of several days. In Texas all greenbugs are female and they do not lay eggs but give birth to living young. Predaschool with winner from each tack greenbugs will develop populations at a much slower school competing for awards on the district level. The

The weather and the condition of the crop will primarily determine how severe greenbug populations become. To this point greenbug populations have been lighter than in the past several years.

control should be based on the size of the plant, the

number of greenbugs present and the damage that they are causing. Generally populations of up to 100-300 greenbugs may be tolerated on plants 3-6 inches in height before control measures are required. On a 4-8 inch plant up to 200-400 greenbugs may be tolerated. Up to 300-800 greenbugs may be tolerated on 6-16 inch plants before control measures are re-The decision to apply con-

trol measures should be based on plant height, damage and the number of greenbugs present. At least 5 spots consisting of 1 foot of drill row should be inspected at scattered points throughout the smaller fields. More inspection points are needed when inspecting fields larger than 40 acres. Often greenbugs build up in very heavy populations in spots within fields. In The need for greenbug that case, control measures may be needed only in those

Parasites and predators aid greatly in controlling greenbugs. The most important of these is a wasp that stings and deposits its egg within the body of the greenbug. The wasp larva feeds from within killing the greenbug. Large parasitic wasp populations develop in March or April of most years. These wasp, under favorable conditions, can greatly reduce greenbut po-

Fruit tree owners should be hecking their trees for development of buds. With the warm spring-like weather we have been having, many trees are beginning to put out and develop swollen buds at this time. Care should be taken in case of a freeze on these

Homeowners should wet the trees down thoroughly just prior to an expected freeze. This will act as an insulating effect giving some protection to the young tender
