

the same, or practically the same A. C. Humphrey, Stamford, from coast to coast, but the water swered questions concerning the sum-three different types-and can be found in one place.

Humphrey stated there were 20 million people affected by this water conversion system. He said Stamford had been water conscious for so many years, that the people there probably knew more about water than anyone else, as they had so little usable water that they have made extensive studies of water. They have ample water, as well as most towns in this area, but the water is unfit for consumption, because it was too hard and "The water in the Brazos ranges from 75,000 parts hard ness down to a minimum of 7,000 parts. The maximum hardness for human consumption is 1,000 parts hardness," Humphrey con tinued

Freeze and Nichols said the ideal location for the experimental plant would be 6.4 miles from Old Glory Brazos River and from the Double Mountain Fork, 2.9 miles.

At this location water could be obtained from three different sources-Double Mountain Fork, Upper Brazos River and wells could be drilled at that location to supplement the water needed for the plant.

At present, the cost of 1,000 gallons of converted water is a little over \$1.00 per 1,000 gal-lons, compared to the customary price of 35 cents per 1,000 gallons in most towns.
