1% City Sales Tax Goes Into Effect On April 1

Knox City's 1% sales tax will become effective Monday, April 1. Voters of Knox City passed the local and use tax in a special election on December 16, and collections will begin next Monday.

The city tax will be collected in the same way and on the same items as the state sales tax with the remittance being made to the State Comptroller of Public Accounts along with the two per cent state tax. The State Comptroller will in turn remit the city's part quarterly. This quarter's return will not be made until June 30, and it will require some time after this date before the city receives its share.

A pecan tree management meeting has been scheduled to meet in the American Legion Hall in Knox City, Tuesday afternoon, April 2 at 2:00 p.m., according to County Agricultural Agent Herman H. Collier.

This meeting was planned by the Knox County Crops and Fertility Committee and the Extension Service. All Knox County and surrounding area persons interested in pecan production are invited to attend. This meeting should be of interest to many people within the city limits of Knox City, Munday, and Goree.

Mr. Blueford G. Hancock, Horticulturist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service will discuss and demonstrate pecan grafting and budding.

Mr. Hancock is a native of Erath County and an A. S. degree from Tarleton State College and earned his B.S. degree from Texas A & M College in 1950 majoring in horticulture. He has served as Assistant County Agent-at-large and also County Agent-at-large with headquarters at College Station.

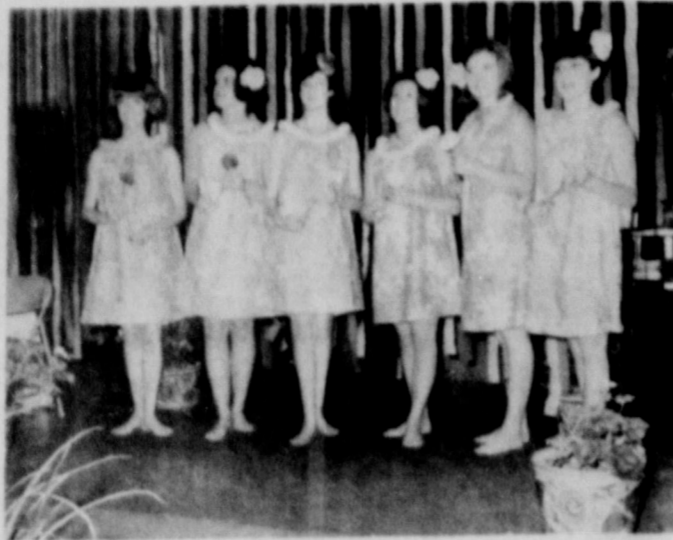

Knott Ballard of Rochester and Emil Navratil of Gilliland, members of the SWC board, were also present for the ceremony.

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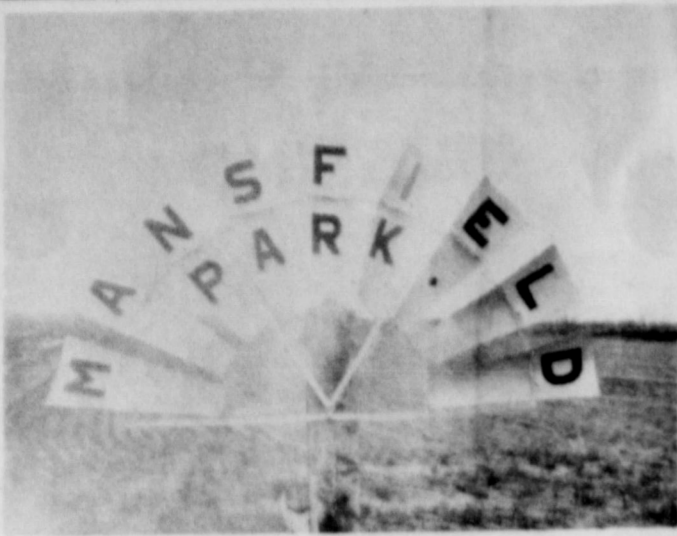
