Smash Jarrell 60-14

O'Brien Bulldogs Are 6-Man State Champs

The O'Brien Bulldogs stunned 2,000 fans in Coleman Texas Friday December 8 as they ran past the much larger Jarrell Cougars to capture the first State title ever awarded in 6-man competition.

The Bulldog starting lineup averaged 30 pounds a man lighter than the Cougars, but came up with the aggressive pursuit and downfield blocking necessary to defeat the East Texas representative in the playoffs.

Play opened as the Bulldogs kicked to the Cougars. The Bulldog defense held and forced a Cougar punt on fourth down. Taking over on their own 26 it only took the Bulldogs two plays to find paydirt. Danny Del Hierro ran 45 yards behind good blocking and Rayland Hayes converted to give the Bulldogs an 8-0 lead. On the ensuing kickoff freshman Jaime Rocha found a loose ball to give O'Brien possession once again. Four plays later Louis Conn scampered in on a reverse from 5 yards out. The PAT was no good and O'Brien led 14-0. Jarrell was then held for three downs and forced to punt on their next possession. O'Brien took over on their own 16 and three plays later Danny Del Hierro scored from 77 yards out. Hayes converted to make it 22-0. The Bulldogs regained possession of the football on the ensuing kickoff as Louis Conn picked off a free football. Four plays later Del Hierro carried in from 8 yards out and Hayes converted to make it 30-0 for the Bulldogs.

The Cougars found paydirt on the fourth play on the second quarter as Pat Palousek rammed in from 5 yards out to make it 30-6. O'Brien put the ensuing kickoff in play on their own 15 yard line but scored on their second play. A 26 yard pass play from Louis Conn to Mague Rocha set up the 39 yard scoring scamper by Del Hierro. The Bulldogs now led 36-6. The two teams then battled score less for the remainder of the second quarter with Jarrell having possession three times and O'Brien twice.

The Bulldogs came back from the half time dressing room determined to improve upon their second period effort. They received the opening kickoff and on the fourth play from scrimmage Danny Del Hierro found blocking to score from 25 yards out. Hayes converted to make it 44-6. Jarrell came back and scored on a 5 yard pass from Palousek to Bamseh. Hughes converted the PAT to make it 44-11. O'Brien took over control of the kickoff on their own 13 and 6 plays late.

Coaches' Comments

COACH STILLABOWER

The Houndettes got back on the winning trail again, after the Rule Tournament by sweeping the Munday Tournament last week.

We opened the first game against Olney on Thursday and after a slow start in the first half we came back and put on a scoring finish. The forward pass in the third quarter was something to see, as we picked up every loose ball in the gym and put it in the basket. The guards picked up the pace and shut out the Olney forwards to only 9 points while ours picked up 31. The final score was 83-37, with Grindstaff getting 42 to lead the scoring and Guinn picked up 21.

We had Friday off and continued our bid for the play off Saturday at 11:30. Goriee was our next obstacle toward the final game. The first quarter was one of our biggest quarters thus far this season with 23 points. It looked as if we were only able to get a 10 point spread on Goriee until the fourth quarter when we stretched out. The game ended 83-65 in favor of the Houndettes. Grindstaff again led all scorers with 38, Guinn added 27, and Baker put in 16. Our guards used a trapping defense to shut out the pressing Goriee forwards.

The Houndettes moved to the final game Saturday night against Rochester. I had never seen the Rochester girls play before but I knew they would

do what ever necessary to beat Knox City.

After a tied up first quarter 14-14, the Houndettes turned on the steam to score 32 points in the second quarter, while our guards didn't even leave their forwards, but a smell of the goal with 8 points. We picked up the final game scoring 89-46. Guinn led the scoring with 29 points. Grindstaff picked out 27, and Baker whipped on 22 points for the Houndettes. 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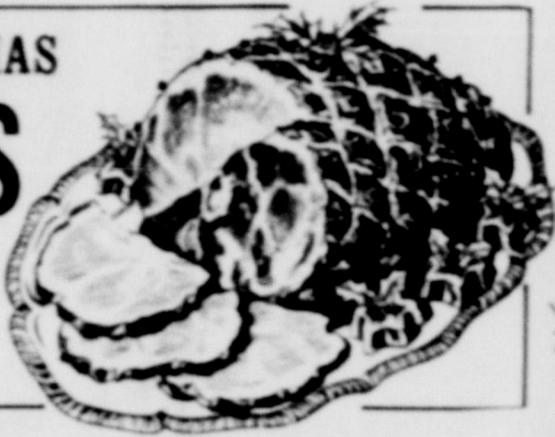
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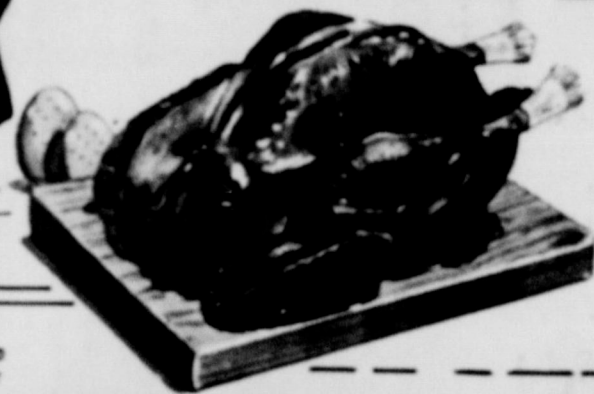

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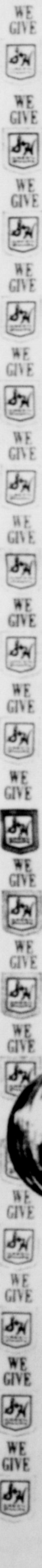

should be padded with cushioning material.

Tape used to seal containers should be durable type and should cover or secure firmly all flaps.

Paper for the outer wrapping should be at least equal in quality and strength to the kraft stock used for grocery bags. Incidentally, such bags, in good condition, provide excellent wrapping when trimmed to the proper size to fit the package snugly.

Wrapped packages also should be secured with strong twine, not ordinary light string. Twine should be knotted at several intersecting points to keep it from loosening.

All packages that contain delicate articles should be marked-fragile. Any food or other products that might deteriorate quickly should be marked-perishable.

All packages should contain the name and address of the person to whom it is being mailed inside the package as well as outside. An address contained inside the package is insurance that it will be received promptly even if accidentally opened or if the outside address should become obliterated.

Be sure to put your return address on the package.

And, finally, address the package correctly and legibly. Be sure to include the Zip Code. (Call your local Post Office if you don't know the Zip Code). Mail with the proper Zip Code is processed more rapidly than mail without the codes.

Post Office Suggests Mailing Tips

Projecting a holiday volume of 9 billion pieces of mail this year, Postmaster Jeff Graham has announced a series of recommended mailing deadlines.

Two of these deadlines should be remembered by every member of the household.

They are: December 15 - the last day for mailing surface greetings within the United States; and December 21 - the final date for posting all domestic airmail greetings and letters.

Postal officials are quite confident that all mail deposited before these suggested deadlines will be delivered in time for Christmas, which comes on a Monday this year.

In an effort to help customers with their "wrapping worries", the postal service has publicized a number of helpful tips.

Some of the suggestions include:

If a single item is being mailed, it should be cushioned with shredded paper, excelsior, compressed tissue paper, cloth, or expanded plastic foam.

If two or more items are mailed in the same carton or box, cushioning material should protect all items from contact with each other, and each item should have its own individual wrapper.

Cardboard containers, including large soap, cereal boxes, etc., larger than the gift being mailed should be cut down to about the size of the gift to minimize shaking and breaking in transit.

Fragile articles must be individually cushioned, and all four sides of the container

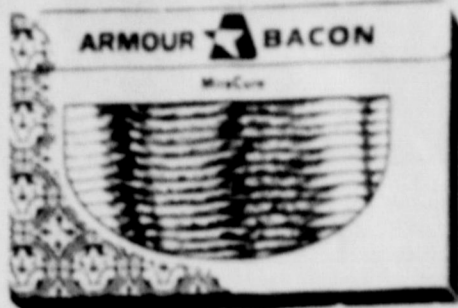

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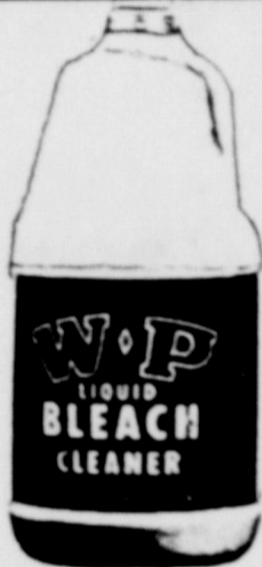

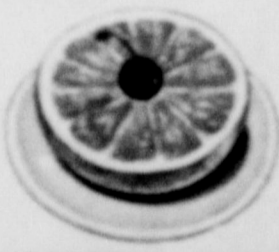
