Retired Teachers Hear Rep. Heatly

"I believe our nation's Bicentennial year has brought persons closer together and aroused more patriotism than anything in our lives," State Representative W.S. (Bill) Heatly told members of the Knox County Retired Teachers Association and their guests Friday afternoon at the Community Center.

The veteran legislator from the 101st District reviewed his early schooldays and saluted the retired teachers. He also noted the progress education has made and said he felt that a great heritage had been left for all of us in the three R's.

He expressed his preference for a small town and said that he had never been sorry that he chose a small town such as Paducah in which to rear their three sons. He had great praise for the "Father of our Country" and said that he felt that George Washington lived in the will of God as everything he did was with the Almighty in mind. Next to George Washington, he

named Harry S. Truman as "one of the greatest" as he made his decisions in the interest of his people, and according to Rep. Heatly, when a person does this, he will always be right.

He stressed the fact that any organization, town, country, state or nation will fall without leadership and that he hoped that we could gain the leadership our nation needs.

He concluded with a word to the retired teachers as to the influence they can have in the state. He also discussed briefly the Social Security position in retirement.

The introduction of the speaker was made by Supt. W.R. (Bill) Baker, who related that Rep. Heatly had always been a friend to Knox City and this area. Mr. Baker was introduced by program chairman Mrs. Lois Smith.

FLBA Members Back From Meet

J.E. Nix of Jones County has just returned from Houston where he represented the Federal Land Bank Association of Haskell at the annual stockholders meeting of the Federal Land Bank of Houston.

The meeting, held at the Houston Oaks Hotel, was attended by members of 66 Federal Land Bank Associations in Texas. There were about 550 persons in attendance.

George Cunningham, president, in his annual report to stockholders, reported that the demand for new loans declined from the previous two years; however, 1975 was still the third largest year in the bank's history and also the third consecutive year that loan closings had exceeded \$200 million. Dr. Phil Gram, economist on leave of absence from Texas A&M University and B.K. Johnson, a prominent South Texas rancher and director of the King Ranch Corporation, also addressed stockholders and guests during the meeting.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long-term loans on farms and ranches throughout Texas and currently has \$1.4 billion in loans outstanding.

Knox City tracksters wrapped up another first Saturday in the Olney Relays as they amassed a whopping 182 points to capture top Class A honors. Closest to KC was Holliday who totaled 134 points for second.

Hurdler Jimmy Lynn took advantage of the brisk day and raced to a record-setting 41.0 in the 330 yard hurdles as did Class AAA David Ray of Burk Burnett who shared the record. Lynn also won in the 440 relay, the mile relay and took third in the long jump with a 20'8" jump.

Al Bateman was up to his old ways winning the 100 yard dash with a time of 10.7, the 220 yard dash in 22.9 seconds, and was on the winning 440 relay team that clocked a time of 44.7. Bateman also took second position in the long jump with a leap of 20'11".

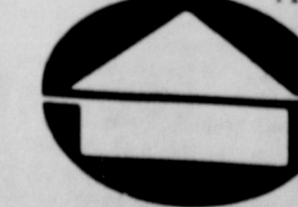

Turquoise Is Fragile

Turquoise is more fragile than diamonds, so Indian jewelry should be treated carefully.

Avoid wearing the jewelry when doing rough work that could scratch or chip the stones. Also chemicals found in some detergents and hand lotions can discolor turquoise and affect the patina of the silver.

The silver itself should not be polished with any kind of solvent. The patina would be stripped, removing the natural highlights of the silver. To clean the silver, use the jeweler's polishing cloth (for sale at jewelry stores) to remove surface tarnish.

To store jewelry, wrap the pieces in old cloths and avoid stacking the pieces. Some jewelers suggest using the Indian method for storage--place the jewelry in cornmeal and store in a dry place. The small amount of oil in the cornmeal helps maintain the luster of the stone.

PFI President To Address Local Lions

Bud Nevin, president of Physical Fitness Institute, Inc., Midwest Region, will speak to the Knox City Lions on April 7 at 12:00 noon in the Masonic Lodge. Nevin's topic will be "How to Remain in Business and Stay Alive."

PFI, headquartered in Peoria, Illinois, was organized in 1972 by its director, Perot Nevin, Jr., a California educator and life-long physical fitness advocate. The goal of the Institute is to attack the source of what many authorities feel to be the major contributing factor to many of the health problems afflicting modern society—the lack of physical fitness in the "average individual and family."

Many of the Nation's serious illnesses," says Nevin, "can be directly or indirectly traced to the poor physical condition of the sufferers...especially in the areas of heart disease, stroke, high blood pressure, chronic back problems and obesity. Medical authorities are also now telling us that many mental illnesses and the inability to cope with the stresses of modern living have a relationship to poor physical condition."

In addition it works with those whose vocation requires them to be physically fit. It has implemented the training programs of the NFL's Minnesota Vikings, the Oakland Raiders, the NHL's Philadelphia Flyers, the NBA's Golden State Warriors, plus several national amateur teams and individual athletes in various sports.

PFI bases the majority of its programs on a relatively new exercise concept called "Total Isokinetics". The concept is currently undergoing considerable research and study by the physiology departments of the University of Arkansas, Texas State Women's College and Northern Illinois University. PFI is funding many of these projects.

As a president for Physical Fitness Institute, Nevin's job is to implement the Institute's program within the Midwest and Texas. Nevin lives in Hughes Springs, Texas.

"This is an occasion no one will want to miss," stated McClatchy. "The events have been centered around every member of the family, because everyone is important to Olney Savings."

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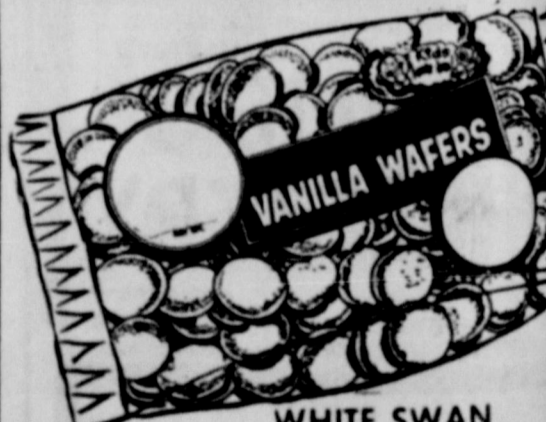


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
