'Hounds to Open Season At Blanket Friday Night

First-Day Enrollment In Local Schools Shows Increase

Enrollment in the Knox City Schools increased this year over last year, even though many local people and Latin Americans moved to other places during the drought and have not returned.

A total of 456 students were registered Monday, showing a gain of eight over a total enrollment of 448 last year. High school gained six students and the elementary school gained two.

Mrs. E. F. Branton, elementary principal, expects the elementary enrollment to take another jump when the cotton harvest season gets into full swing. She said very few Latin Americans have registered to date.

High school has 115 enrolled and the two elementary buildings are full with 341 pupils.

The number enrolled, by classes, and the teachers in the elementary school are as follows:

First grade, 66, Mrs. A. V. Kemletz and Miss Evelyn Hollis; second, 41, Mrs. Annie Bird and Mrs. Hazel Long; third, 38, Mrs. R. G. Vaughan; fourth, 36, Mrs. L. E. Groves; fifth, 52, Mrs. E. R. Carpenter and Mrs. Geo. Montandon; sixth, 30, Mrs. Ulric Lea; seventh, 38, Mrs. Geo. Wynn; and eighth, 40, Mrs. Branton.

Mrs. Ottis Cash, who has taught the seventh grade in the local school for many years, was assigned to high school to teach English and take charge of the library.

Last year the first grade had 44 enrolled; 2nd 42; 3rd 46; 4th 54; 5th 34; 6th 35; 7th 44 and 8th 40.

The Knox City Greyhounds, playing their second season of 11-man football, will travel to Blanket tomorrow night (Friday) for a return engagement with a team that blanketed the 'Hounds 18-0 last year.

No information is available here on the Blanket team—defending champion of District 8-B last year—and it is not known if Wayne Isom, the fast back who made or set up most of the Blanket TD's last year is still on the squad.

When the two teams met last year, however, the 'Hounds were playing their first game of 11-man ball and had been badly crippled in a game with Class A Wylie a week previously. This year, the team may give a better account of themselves at Blanket.

Since neither the band nor the pep squad will make the trip, Coaches David Slaughter and Norman Hickok urged that as many fans as possible accompany the team and form a rooting section.

Probable starting line-up, the coaches said, will be Shelby Bishop at left end, Bob Jensen at left guard, Monroe Thomas at left tackle, James Jackson at center, Dickie Cross at right guard, Rob Jensen at right tackle, Nathan Lewis at right end, Hubert Finley in the quarterback slot, Leonard Burt and Ernie Wilson at half, and Jimmy Leach in the fullback position.

With the exception of Bishop, all of the probable starters are lettermen.

First home game for the local lads will be next Thursday night, September 17, when they are hosts to the Stamford B team.

Another practice game, also on the home field, will be with Hermleigh on Sept. 25, and on Oct. 2 the boys will journey to Aspermont for the conference opener.

The game with Stamford is the only game scheduled for Thursday night. All other are on Friday and all begin at 8:00 p. m. except the Rochester-Knox City game, which will be played in the afternoon on Armistice Day.

Jack Edwards Injured In Fall From Second-Story

Jack Edwards, son of Dr. and Mrs. R. C. Edwards, was injured Wednesday morning when he walked—in his sleep—out of his second-story bedroom window.

Jack was found about 4 a. m. when members of his family heard him groaning. After examination by local doctors, he was rushed to Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene, where it was found a hip was broken in two places.

Later reports were that he also has a punctured bladder. According to his father, Jack had not sleep-walked since he was a small child.

His injured leg has been put in a traction splint and indications are that it will heal well. However, he will not be able to return to dental school until January or later, members of the family said. He was scheduled to return to classes September 20.

Fire Damages Apartment House Here Saturday

A gas leak near a kitchen range was blamed Saturday for a fire which heavily damaged a two-story apartment owned by C. E. Ball of Plainview, former Knox City resident.

The fire started in a second-floor apartment about 3:30 p. m. and gained considerable headway before it was brought under control about 5:00 p. m.

All of the top floor was destroyed. Rip Collins, a resident of one of the downstairs apartments, said his only damage, other than from water, was when the floor of an upstairs kitchen fell through to the Collins apartment.

The fire departments from Munday and Haskell were called and assisted the local volunteer department in extinguishing the blaze.

Ray Lusk, Haskell fire chief, suffered a painfully sprained ankle when he stepped on a charged hose, and an unidentified Munday fireman was treated at the local clinic for a cut wrist.

TO CELEBRATE GOLDEN WEDDING ANNIVERSARY

The Knox County Board of Trustees, following a public hearing Saturday, took under consideration a petition asking that 5,584 acres of the Munda School District, adjacent to the Knox City district, be annexed to the Knox City district.

The petition, signed by 80 percent of the qualified voters in the area involved, had been presented to the board about ten days previously, and the board called the hearing to allow the Munday district to present arguments against the annexation.

Munday was represented by attorneys M. F. Billingley, Munday and Gaylon Kendall of Austin. The petitioners and the Knox City district were represented by Bill Brookreson of Seymour and Dallas Scarborough of Abilene.

A number of residents of the area involved, which amount to about 9 percent of the Munday district, also took part in the hearing.

The area covered by the petition includes the Lowrey Estate, the G. A. Branton and Bill Clarke property, Jamison Estate, D. H. Henry land, Herbert Partidge farm, Dave Whitford farm and the Simmons and J. Hawkins farms.

The county board has given no indication as to when it will announce a decision.

The voters residing within the corporate limits of the City of Benjamin shall vote at Voting Place No. 1 and voters residing within the District but outside of the corporate limits of the City of Benjamin shall vote at Voting Place No. 2.

That said election shall be held as provided by Chapter 25 of the General Laws, Regular Session of the 39th Legislature, 1925, as amended, and shall be conducted as provided by law for holding general elections except as otherwise provided in said Chapter.

That at said election only qualified resident property tax-paying voters of such District shall be permitted to vote.

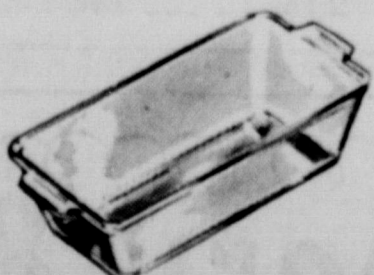
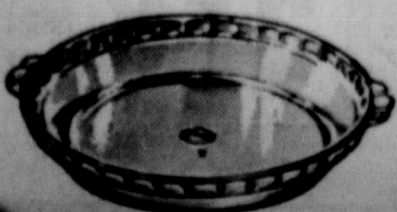

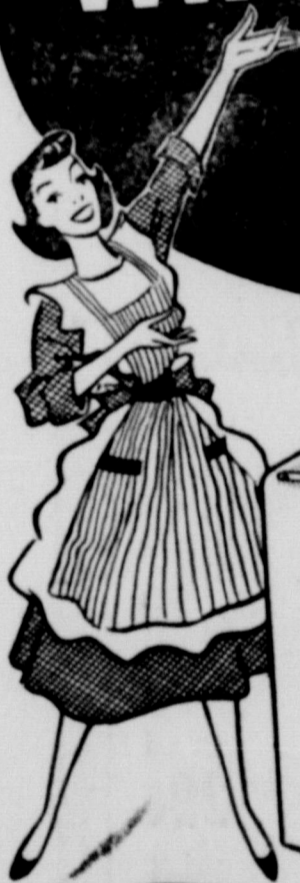
