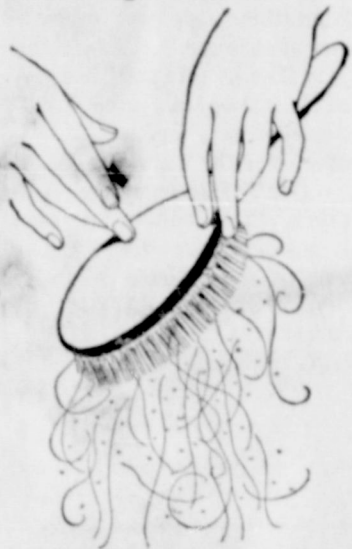

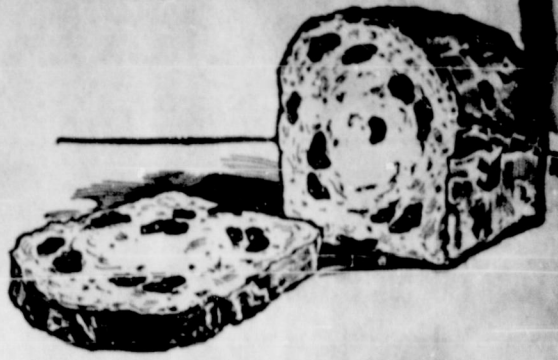

MICROBES HARD TO KILL

Though some microbes are very tough and can stand great extremes of heat and cold, the majority of them are easily killed if the right methods are used. But what puzzled scientists for many years was that "killed" microbes seemed to be able to come alive again! You could kill them as dead as door nails, but in a very short space of time they would appear in swarms and as lively as crickets! Then a discovery was made. It was found that many microbes bred by means of seeds or spores, which are almost indestructible, save by fire. Experiments made with spores show that they do not in the least mind undergoing a temperature 400 degrees below freezing point for many hours. Nor does it hurt them to be boiled! That is why such a disease as anthrax, the microbes of which produce spores, is so extremely difficult to stamp out—no ordinary means of disinfection is of the slightest use.

MAYFIELD WINS IN SUPREME COURT

TWO OF THE SEVEN QUESTIONS CERTIFIED DISCUSSED AT LENGTH.

EXPECT ACTION IMMEDIATELY

Secretary of State Will Notify County Judges When Advised of Dallas Court's Order.

Austin, Texas—The Texas Supreme Court answered that the parties bringing suit against Earle B. Mayfield to keep his name off the general election ticket were not the proper parties. The motion for order to stay the Corsicana injunction was granted.

The court held that the Thirteenth District Court of Navarro County was without jurisdiction to hear the injunction suit and that Section 9 of the anti-corruption law was not violative of the Constitution.

The court ordered that a certified copy of the opinion be immediately sent to the Court of Civil Appeals in Dallas and also a copy to the judge of the District Court of Navarro County.

The opinion covers fifteen typewritten pages and was written by Justice William Piersen. The court in a special sitting on the seven questions certified to the Court of Civil Appeals in the senatorial control these answers are favorable to Mayfield's contention and to go to the Dallas Court.

FATHER OF BLOCK SIGNALING

Life of William Robinson Written Large in the History of Railway Transportation.

An automatic electric system of railroad signaling was put into successful operation for the first time in 1872.

It was the invention of William Robinson, the first to which he submitted signaling appliances was made early in September, 1872, at the town of Kinross on the old Philadelphia & Erie railway in northern Pennsylvania.

Mr. Robinson is very generally referred to as "the father of automatic block signaling." His invention is recognized as the forerunner and at the same time the basis of "practically every automatic electric block signal system in use on railroads today."

This tribute to his work appeared in a recent report of the interstate commerce commission: "Perhaps no single invention in the history of the development of railway transportation has contributed more toward safety and dispatch in that field than the closed track circuit."

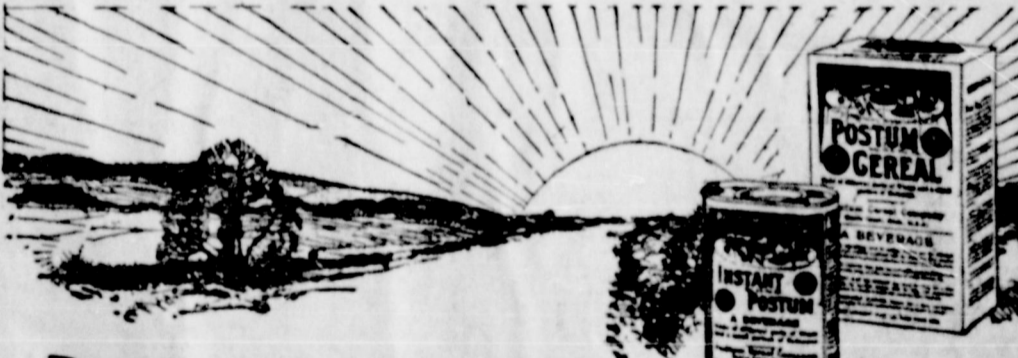

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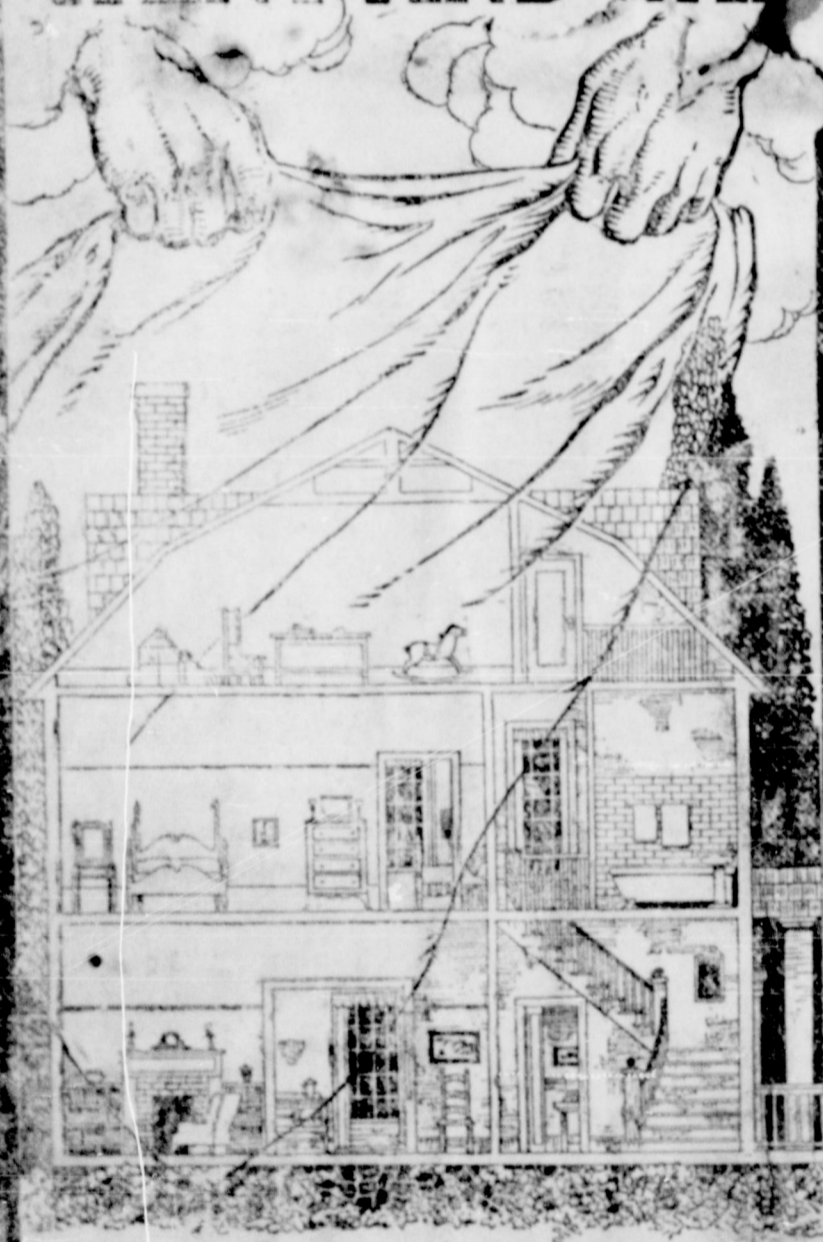
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
