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# Planting & Care **About Guar**

Planting time for guar is May 15 to July 15. For maximum seed production the optimum planting time is from May 15 to June 15. While other type planters are being studied and adapted for the purpose, most guar is planted with a row-crop planter equipped with grain sorghum plates with straight holes and no bevel or taper on the under side. This helps to prevent clogging. A little graphite in the planter box a'so helps to smooth the flow of seed.

On land where weeds are not a serious problem, or where rowcrop equipment is not available. guar may be planted with a grain drill. By stopping some of the drill holes the plants can be spaced for row cultivation. Leaving all drill holes open gives a wider distribution of plants and an earlier ground cover which may help in competing with

Recommended seeding rate for guar under the row-crop system is six pounds per acre, adjusted upward to off-set any adverse conditions such as a poor seed-bed or low germination due to poor quality of seed. Recommended rate for drill planting is 12 to 20 pounds per acre with all holes open or adjusted downward according to number of holes stopped for row spacing. Optimum planting depth is 11/2 to 2 inches depending on type and condition of the soi!. Guar should not be planted in a deep furrow but on the level or near level so that the plants will be on the apex of a slightly raised bed after final cultivation. This allows for maximum recovery of beans at har-

Cultivation requirements for guar are about the same as for cotton except for one caution. The guar plant is very tender and is therefore extremely susceptible to mechanical injury. Cultivation that is too close, too deep or too late may do more harm than good.

Irrigation to supplement soil moisture insures maximum production of both forage and beans. In dry weather the guar plant may cease to grow but will spring into growth and bloom again as soon as moisture is available. A

consistent moisture supply is required for best results. Water applied by irrigation should be generous but not excessive and no more often than necessary to keep plants in good growing condi-

Guar should be grown in rotation, mainly for the benefit it gives to succeeding crops. It rotates well with cotton, sorghum, corn and vegetables. It is a very good summer cover on small grain land, and will produce good yields of beans when planted soon after grain is harvested if moisture is available. A common practice in some areas is to alternate strips of cotton and guar in a 2year rotation.

Any fertilization of guar shou'd be based on soil analysis. Only on very poor soils is a complete fertilizer ever needed. Phosphate is the element most often required. The equivalent of 200 pounds of 20% super-phosphate is the usual rate. The seed should be inoculated before planting with a special guar inoculent. This is to insure nitrogen fixation in the soil. HARVESTING AND YIELDS

If planted reasonably early in the spring the guar plant usually matures and defoliates before frost. This allows for early harvest when conditions are favorable. Guar beans do not shatter and the stalks stand well except for windstorms or other mechanical injury. Guar is harvested with an or-

dina; y grain combine with little adjustments. The cylinder should be slowed and the tractor speed reduced to a rate that will permit the proper threshing of the beans. The heavier the yield the slower the machine must move. Yields of over 2000 pounds of

beans per acre have been reported. Yields of 1500 to 1600 pounds per acre are not uncommon. An average of 1200 pounds per acre is a conservative estimate for yields generally where improved varieties are grown with the attention and care normally given to a main crop.

A fact to remember in considering economic returns from guar is that it has no peer as a soilimproving summer legume. Influence on succeeding crops is truly amazing.

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
