

Presently, the City of Knox City, the County of Knox, and the Knox County Hospital District each pays one-third of the ambulance up-keep. According to Mrs. Faye Railsback it is not the financial burden, but the responsibility of maintaining the ambulance service, that caused city officials to decline to continue

operate or control ambuance services. All of these are backed by big, heavily taxed hospital districts or by nothing short of almost total monetary support from the counties in which they are located. Knox County Hospital District certainly does not fall into any of these categories. The most important thing



### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS **GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976**

#### NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.I.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

A group of volunteers. about 26 each Sunday, conduct worship services for the 450 inmates of the jail.

The work is coordinated by Chaplain Cox, who is employed by the Tarrant Baptist Association. He said his job includes talking with inmates and the 80-member confinement staff, their families, and hospital visitations, in addition to offering Sunday worship services.

"There's only one of me," he said. "There is a need for volunteers.

To be accepted in the worship program at the jail, he said, volunteers have to be active members in a local congregation and they have to have a recommendation from their minister, rabbi, or priest.

Only two have ever been turned down, he said. One had a mail order degree.

Cox said disagreements over doctrine or methods are quickly silenced. "We try to keep it very simple--basic teaching of the Scriptures. Anything that is particular or controversial of a doctrine to one individual or faith we try to stay away from. Inmates are not concerned with that." he said.







With each sequence of animated and actual fire hazard of the various classes both inside and outside the house and around the farm. Bullard gave applicable prevention and control suggestions. For fire control Bullard pointed out that many fires in the home, vehicles. equipment and other build ings can be extinguished while in the incipient stage: provided you have a U/L extinguisher of the correct size and type. "Recharge each portable extinguisher after each use", he added. This educational fire program was brought to the school under the sponsorship of the Knox County Farm Bureau.

### Two Injured In August Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of August, 1976, according to Sergeant Frank Jircik, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

Three crashes resulted in no persons killed and two persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1976 shows a total of 35 accidents resulting in one person killed and 22 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for August 1976, shows a total of 566 accidents resulting in 16 persons killed and 319 injured, as compared to August 1975. with 596 accidents resulting in 16 persons killed and 292 persons injured. This was 30 less accidents, the same number killed, and 27 more injured in 1976 at the same period of time.

The 16 traffic deaths for the month of August, 1976, occurred in the following counties: three each in Parker and Hansford; two each in Donley and Motley; one each in Deaf Smith, Foard, Lubbock, Lynn, Montague, and Palo Pinto.
