



kick and Gary Carver covered for the Hounds on the Cat 37. Swain lost 2 yards on the first play, then hit Cloots for 10 yards. An incomplete pass and Newton was stopped for no gain.

The Cats got the ball on their own 29. Nine plays later and some fine defensive work by the Hounds, they got the ball back on their 30. A quick pass to Whiteley for 13, draw play to Carver for 18 yards, a sweep by Newton for 28 yards brought up 1st and goal at the Rule 8 yard line. Carver got 4 yards on a run. Then trying to catch the Cats napping, a pass was thrown, but Rule intercepted to kill the threat.

Rule ran 3 plays and Cloots recovered a fumble and the Hounds had the ball on their own 15. Along pass, another interception, and Rob Harrison dropped the runner for a 10 yard loss. The Bobcats made 7, then Carver stopped the runner for a 2 yard loss. On 4th down on the Hounds' 42, Rule tried a run and lost 6.

Knox City then had the ball on their own 19. On the first play Swain lateralized to Whiteley and Whiteley threw a pass to Cloots. Cloots was clear but failed to find a handle on the ball. The next play Swain found Hacker for a 15 yard pass to Rule's 38. Knox City fumbled the ball and the Bobcats recovered on their 48. The Cats ran 4 plays and gave the ball to the Hounds on the Hounds' 45. There was a five pass to Newton and then another interception.

Two plays later the first half ended.

Rule received the second half kickoff. The Greyhound defense was ready. On 3rd down and needing 15 Rule threw a pass. The Hound defender made a dive for the ball hitting it with his chest. The official called pass interference, so Rule got a 1st down at the midfield stripe.

Assessment To Be Students Oct. 21

Mrs. Reeves also announced the complete schedule for the 1972-73 academic year. The five national dates (with corresponding registration periods in parenthesis) are: Oct. 21, 1972 (Aug. 21-Oct. 2); Dec. 9, 1972 (Oct. 9-Nov. 13); Feb. 24, 1973 (Nov. 27-Jan. 29); April 28, 1973 (Feb. 22-April 2); July 21, 1973 (April 16-June 25).

Cost to students for the guidance-oriented ACT Assessment which takes about 3½ hours to complete, is \$6.50. Resulting information reports are of valuable use to students and their counselors in pre-college planning.

Students uncertain whether they need to take ACT Assessment or who are concerned about the location of the most appropriate testing center, are urged to contact Mrs. Reeves.

Students can also obtain registration packets and other ACT informational materials from their guidance counselors.

Last year approximately one million students in the U.S. and overseas took the five-part assessment, which is required or recommended for applicants at more than 2,000 colleges, universities, two-year colleges, scholarship agencies, and athletic conferences.

The ACT Assessment consists of four academic tests and a questionnaire section that collects information about an individual's academic and extra-curricular achievements in high school immediate plans for the future, and career aspirations.

The four tests—covering English usage, math, social studies, and natural sciences—are designed to assess general educational development.

Mrs. Reeves recommended that students write the ACT examination questionnaire during the junior year or early in their senior year, in order to make use of the resulting ACT data in planning for college.

With national headquarters in Iowa City, Iowa, ACT is an independent and nonprofit corporation that provides a number of guidance-oriented assessment services for students and institutions in the U.S., and more than 60 foreign countries.


