

Test Results Show Knox City School Students 'Tops'

WARD M. COOKSEY, Principal of the National Educational Tests in the Knox City High School on Tuesday, January 27, said the staff and administrators were highly pleased with the results. Of the thirty-two students in the sophomore class who received scores for scoring above the national average on this test, Knox City students were among the top performers.

Students who scored in the top 10 percentile on the test include Gwen Angle, Rogers Lankford, Sammy Tankersley, and Mike Newton. Students who scored in the top 20 percentile include Lynn Clarke, Melody King, Kenny Lawson, and Kathy Verhalen. These students received certificates that were displayed with pride and admiration since they do indicate that the recipient was in the 90 plus percentile of the entire United States. Our six students represent 18.75% of the sophomore class to receive this honor.

Percentage-wise on this test, our school will rank with any school of any size in the United States. Last year, six students including Joe Barnard, Gayle Campbell, John Helms

Agricultural Problems Discussed At Meeting

The 12th Annual Knox County Farm and Ranch Day Program was held in Munday on Wednesday, January 22, 1969 in the High School Cafeteria and Auditorium.

The event began at 5:30 p.m. in the cafeteria with a free barbecue dinner. A large crowd gathered for the barbecue and later attended the interesting programs.

The program was of educational value to the entire family. It was co-sponsored by the Fort Worth & Denver Burlington Lines Railway and Texas A&M Extension Service in cooperation with Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

Acting as Master of Ceremonies for the program was Mr. M. L. Wiggins, President of the First National Bank in Munday.

The keynote address, "Financing Agriculture in the Seventies", was given by Mr. Jack Barton, Assistant Vice-president of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston, Texas. Mr. Barton was introduced by Mr. Mace K. Orman, Burlington Lines, who acknowledged the accomplishments of the Munday area. Mr. Barton said that agriculture is an old occupation that has recently been revived with new interest. The beginning of agriculture in 1607 at Jamestown gave the incentive to people from trial and error which gave way to free enterprise. Thus far, agriculture has met every challenge with proficiency. "Agriculture faces the greatest challenges in 1970 of transition and obsolescence," stated Mr. Barton. With the changing future the farmer or rancher must meet the expanding needs. Mr. Barton cited six ways the present day farmer must change to meet the needs of the future.

In summary of his speech Mr. Barton concluded, "The costs of farming and ranching are going up. Profit margins will remain narrow, however, the net income of the successful operator will probably increase. This increase will be, primarily, the result of a combination of an increased overall demand for food and fiber products and fewer producers. The key to successful farming will be 'up-to-the-minute' modern operator teamed with an adequate, dependable source of credit."

Master of Ceremonies Wiggins introduced J. T. Simmons, District Agent, who gave brief introductory remarks about Dr. L. S. Pope, Associate Dean of Texas A&M University. Dr. Pope spoke on "The Value of Research To The Rolling Plains Area". Impressed by the dynamics of agriculture in this area, Dr. Pope stressed the fact that research was the key to all progress in the agricultural field as well as any industry. He also mentioned that a research station in Munday is soon to become a reality. The development in agriculture stemmed out of basic research and occurred in the last twenty years. Dramatic changes have created the diversity of the Texas products.

Dr. Pope stated, "Dean Kunkel of Texas A&M University foresees four major centers of agriculture in the future. Texas is the fourth emerging area based on the geographical location by population, Texas has 1.5 of all the irrigated land in the United States." But this development depends on many areas of research and progress in marketing. A Market Development Center has been created at Texas A&M University especially to deal with the marketing field. Increased marketing knowledge will mean increased income in the fields of production.

Research in agriculture benefits not only the farmer or rancher but also the consumer. Dr. Pope posed the question that appeared in the Wall Street Journal, "How long will the taxpayer have to support research industries are paying for?" "We have to justify our research," explained Dr. Pope, "the added emphasis and products or research have to be paid for." In conclusion Dr. Pope stated, "When you're in trouble, step up research".

Wiggins then held the drawing for the valuable door prize conducted by Mrs. Callie Ann Combs, Chamber of Commerce Manager. Miss Lana Harper, 1968 Knox County Livestock Queen and 1968 Vegetable Festival Queen drew the winning ticket held by Rhoades Allen. At that time the ladies adjourned to the cafeteria for a program entitled "Probate Court" by Judge Sam Clonts, Knox County Judge, while the

gentlemen remained for a discussion on "Drylot Feeding and Crossbreeding of Cattle" by Mr. Paul T. Marion, Superintendent of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Spur, Texas. The farmers and ranchers of this area were particularly interested in this topic.

Judge Clonts conducted a very interesting program on "Probate Court". He explained generally what probate is and the changes occurring over the years in probate laws. Judge Clonts outlined the steps in obtaining a will, the steps in probating a will, and what one generally contains.

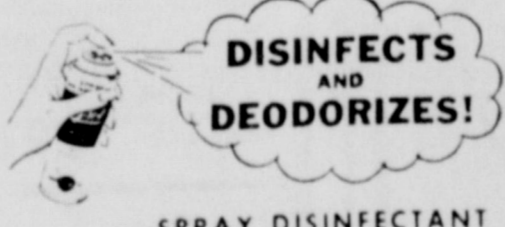


