



The Knox County 4-H Horse Show is slated for Friday and Saturday, June 4-5, at the Lake Creek Arena Association arena in Munday. Registration will be at 7 p.m., with classes beginning at 7:30 each evening, according to Herman Collier, Knox County Extension Agent.

The Knox County 4-H Horse Show has been held at the Knox County Riding Club's arena in Benjamin in previous years, but it was decided at a recent meeting to rotate the County 4-H Horse Show among the three arenas in the county, with Munday's

arena association hosting the 1976 show. The Brazos Valley Recreation Association in Knox City will host next year's show, with the show being slated for the Benjamin arena the following year.
