A local race of interest to voters will probably account for a good turnout in the Second Primary (runoff) election Saturday, June 5.

Seeking the office of County Commissioner for Precinct One are Billy Gene Johnston and C.C. (Buddy) Angle.

In the first Democratic Primary, Johnston was first in a field of four candidates with 245 to Angle's 196.

In a check with Zena Waldron's office Wednesday morning, the total number of persons voting absentee through the June 1 deadline in the Clerk's office was 22. Out of 13 ballots requested by mail, five had been returned. Absentee ballots by mail have until noon of election day, June 5.

Graduation End Era In Grahams' Lives

This year's Knox City High School graduation exercises concluded an era in the lives of the L.W. Graham family.

Their youngest of 19 grandchildren, Timlu, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jeff Graham, received her diploma along with other Knox City graduating seniors and the grandparents probably had fleeting memories of years gone by of 14 other commencements when their six children and eight grandchildren were graduated from Knox City High School.

The Grahams moved to Knox County in 1914 and lived near Benjamin. In 1919, their oldest child, Elsie Graham Smith, started to Knox City Schools and since that time, 57 years in all, there has been a child or grandchild in the Knox City Schools.

They have been members of the First United Methodist Church for 57 years and are active in all church and community affairs.

Knox County 4-H Horse Show To Be Held June 4-5

The Knox County 4-H Horse Show is slated for Friday and Saturday, June 4-5, at the Lake Creek Arena Recreation Association in Knox City will host next year's show, with the show being slated for the Benjamin arena the following year.

Any Knox County youth who is nine years old, or less than 19 years old, on January 1, 1976, and single may enter the show. The contestant must be showing a horse owned by himself or his immediate family.

A small entry fee will be charged.

Trophies will be awarded to the Grand Champion Mare

and Grand Champion Gelding and to the first place winner in each class, with ribbons being given through sixth place. A high point trophy and runner-up high point trophy will also be given, with the winner being determined by System A of the Official Rules of the Texas State 4-H Horse Show.

Classes scheduled for Friday night are registered mares under five years of age; registered mares five years old and over; grade mares, all ages; registered geldings under five years of age; registered geldings five years old

and over; grade geldings, all ages; Showmanship; Western Pleasure; Western Horsemanship; and Reining.

The timed classes, which are polebending and barrel racing, will be run Saturday night, beginning at 7:30.

Judging this year's show is Tom Gibbs of Wichita Falls. Mr. Gibbs is a well-known judge of both 4-H and registered shows.

Assisting Mr. Gibbs as ring steward will be Bobby Robertson of Benjamin.

Jan Carver and Katrine Hudson, both of Benjamin,

will serve as registrars and bookkeepers, with Mrs. Carver also serving as photographer.

Gatemen for this year's show will be Joe Boone of Knox City and Stanton Brown of Benjamin.

Brenda Smith of Munday will serve as concession stand chairman. Concession stand committee members are Philamae Roberson of Benjamin, Peggy Grindstaff of Knox City, and Ronnie Cude of Goree.

Trophy purchasing chairman for the show is Shirley Brown of Benjamin.

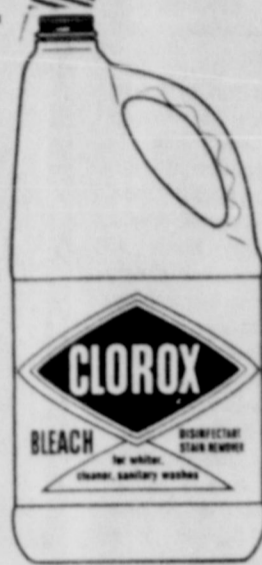

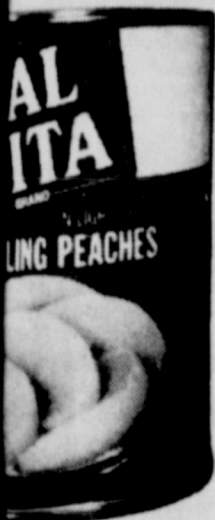
