CONTROL MEASURES FOR SMUT IN WHEAT AND BARLEY

By W. M. Jones, County Agent For Wheat

Use three ounces of Copper Carbonate to one (1) bushel of wheat one pound will treat five bushels of wheat. Two methods are used in treating wheat.

First: Pour five bushels of wheat in a barrel, add one pound of Copper Carbonate, closing the barrel tightly and mixing thoroughly. Transfer the wheat to the grain drill and sow. This method will be found the most practical and more efficient if used.

Second: Pour a small amount of wheat into the grain box and add one ounce of Copper Carbonate. Four in another layer of wheat followed by another layer of Copper Carbonate, until the box is filled. Usually the movement of the drill will mix the seed with the Copper Carbonate sufficiently but in order to be safe run the hand through the seed in the grain box before starting to drill.

Caution: In using the Copper Carbonate it is advisable to wear a cloth over the nose to prevent inhaling the dust.

For Barley

Use one pint of 4 percent Formaldehyde to 40 gallons of water, and cover every seed with a small amount of this solution. Two methods are also used in treating barley for smut.

First: Pour the seed on the floor and add the Formaldehyde solution with a sprinkler, stirring the barley at the same time, until all the seed are moist. Turn again with a shovel, rake into a heap and cover with a saxon sheet for twenty-four hours before sowing.

Second: Dip the sack of barley into a barrel containing the Formaldehyde solution, churn up and down until the seed are well covered pour into a pile and allow them to partly dry before planting.



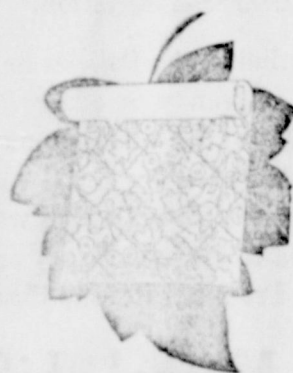
