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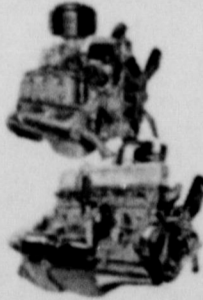

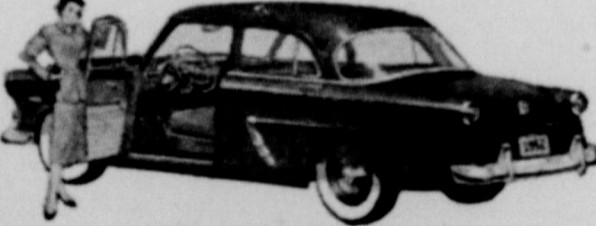

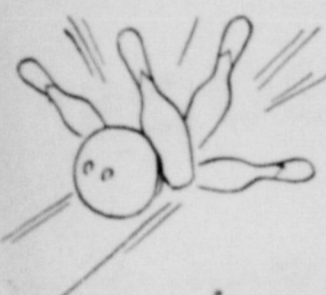

FARM BUREAU HELPS HOLD BEEF PRICES UP. COUNTY PRESIDENT SAYS

What does your organization do for the members, a farmer asked Ancel Waldrip, president of the Knox County Farm Bureau. When somebody hits Waldrip with that question he always takes some specific commodity that the farmer grows, and points out what Farm Bureau has done for the commodity. In this case, the individual was a livestock producer, and Waldrip told him about the Farm Bureau's activities in 1951 when OPS scheduled the price rollbacks of beef.

"The two rollbacks that had been set up for beef were knocked out by the Farm Bureau," Waldrip told him. "When Allan Kline, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation called every State Farm Bureau president in the Nation to Washington to protest the rollbacks". The Farm Bureau was able to accomplish this because those state presidents represented a million and a half farm families in this country.

According to the 1950 census, Waldrip continued, Knox county each year markets about 8,569 cows and calves. Average weight of the animals is approximately 600 pounds. Waldrip estimates that the rollbacks saved farmers five cents a pound, or \$30.00 per animal. This means \$2,570.70 that Farm Bureau saved Knox county livestock producers last year, the Farm Bureau president concluded.
