THERE used to be a character in George Creel's town in Missouri, a

transplanted Kentuckian, a self-appointed colonel and a veteran of Shelby's command, who was a born orator and an inspired romancer.

One sunny afternoon he was holding forth to an attentive and

sympathetic audience upon the part he had played in the war between the States. It was rather to be inferred that he was one of the main reasons why the Confederacy endured, against odds, for four years. He progressed to where he was enriching history with an account of the first engagement in which he had participated.

"Gentlemen," he proclaimed, "envisage the scene. There we stand, a little group, armed for the most part with nondescript weapons, with flint lock muskets, with scythes, with £xes, even with cudgels. And, gentlemen, such is the impetuousity of our attack, such is the ferocity of our blows, that soon the blue lines break and in mad disorder routed the enemy flees, unable to face the irresistible torrent of Southern manhood."

From the audience spoke up a gray bearded listener.

"Say, looky here, Kurnel," he said. "I was in that there fight myself and whut really happened wux that them plegged Yanks give us a fust rate lickin," and run us ten miles acrost country."

## The Growth of Bureaucracy

By RAYMOND PITCAIRN National Chairman

Sentinels of the Republic During the past five years the pop-ulation of the District of Columbia, seat of our national government, has in creased more than 22 per cent.

No state, or group of states, has approached that rate of growth during the same period. It compares with a population increase of 3.9 per cent for the nation as a whole.

What caused the jump? A recent report of the Census Bureau, whose es-timates supply the figures, attributes it to an unprecedented peace-time influx of Federal employes to jobs in the scores of new bureaus and commissions functioning during the past few years at Washington.

These are significant facts. They introduce an arresting element of novelty in the American picture. Except during the brief emergencies of war-time our most striking growths heretofore have occurred along what might be de-scribed as our geographical and indus-trial frontiers.

Population increased at the swiftest pace in states where new and produc-tive lands were being developed by agriculture; in cities where new and productive industries were originating and expanding.

Inevitably such growth meant greater opportunity for the men and women who took part in the development; greater wealth for the nation and its citizens as a whole.

But an unprecedented increase ob-holders at Washington has quite a different meaning. It shows only a growth of Sureauctacy. Unlike the men and women who, by their energy and their labors, continue to develop America and to bear the costs of its govern near, many political job-holders pro-duce little or nothing. They consume, instead—out of the share of all men and women who labor in the home, on the farm, in the factory or in business.

And the greater the number of those who merely consume, the greater the burden on those who produce.

#### Our Constitution

"I do, with sincere zeal, wish an inviolable preservation of our present Federal Constitution according to the true sense in which it was adopted by the states."

"No Constitution was ever before so well calculated as ours for extensive empire and self-government.

#### Public Debt

"Taxation follows public debt, and in Its train wretchedness and oppression. Economy in Government

"I am for a government rigorously frugal and simple."

"We must make our election between economy and liberty, or profusion and servitude.

Centralization of Power

"It is not by the consolidation or cen-tralization of powers, but by their distribution that good government is ef-

Were we directed from Washington when to sow and when to reap, we should soon want bread."

Personal Liberty "A wise and frugal government, which shall restrain men from injuring one another, which shall leave them otherwise free to regulate their own pursuits of industry and improvement, and shall not take from the mouth of labor the bread it has earned. This is the sum of good government."

#### Freedom of the Press

"Our liberty cannot be guarded but by the freedom of the press, nor that be limited without danger of losing it."

"If we can prevent the government from wasting the labors of the people under the pretense of taking care of them, they must remain happy."

So long as our public men-and we, ourselves - remember those teachings, the spirit of Jefferson lives. When we forget them, that spirit dies—and with it the true spirit of America.




