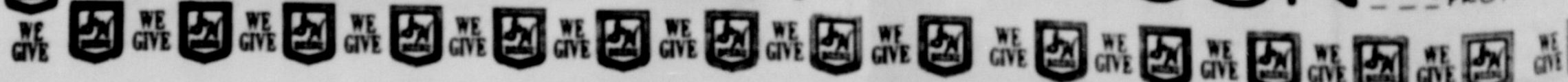

Farm and Ranch News

Several important dates are approaching for farmers and ranchers who are on a calendar tax year—which includes most individuals in the Rolling Plains. These dates are listed below as reminders:

January 31—Farmers and ranchers must file Form 943 showing the social security taxes on wages paid to hired labor during 1971. A payment of any tax due must be made at this time. If timely deposits of social security tax were made during the year, then you have until February 10 to file Form 943. Copies B and C of Form W-2 is to be sent with Form 943 to the Internal Revenue Office.

February 10—Employers who made timely deposits of social security taxes on wages paid to hired labor must file Form 943 and pay remaining social security tax due.

March 1—If a declaration of estimated tax was not filed by January 17, the 1971 income tax is due.

March—All farm businesses must report payments of rents and interest amounting to \$600 or more to any one taxpayer other than a corporation. This is to be reported on Form 1096 and Form 1099, which are information returns.

Cash income to farmers and ranchers in Knox County should be more than \$11,335,000.00 by the end of 1976, according to Herman H. Collier, county agricultural agent.

This will be an increase of more than \$2,465,000.00 from 1968-69 figures, with beef cattle contributing a large part of the gain. The projections are based on studies of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and are part of the "3.76 in '76" program, a state-wide project to increase Texas agricultural cash receipts by more than \$1 billion.

Total cash receipts from all agricultural enterprises in Knox County are presently about \$8,000,000.00. The most important ones are beef, cotton, and wheat. They are expected to account for about 60 per cent of the projected 1976 totals.

The county will be aided in its production efforts by the Rolling Plains Economic Program.

These projections are based on estimates from the County Program Building Committee after separate predictions were made by Extension economists. The figures were published for each county, Extension district and economic area in Texas.

"Knox County producers will have access to production information and techniques that can help spell success for the Texas goal of \$3.76 billion in 1976," says Collier.

A statewide program to increase Texas agricultural income by more than a billion dollars by 1976 was announced by Dr. John E. Hutchinson, director, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, in January 1970.

This goal calls for \$3.76

billion in total cash receipts by the end of the 1976 crop year, not including government payments. It was determined from projections by Extension specialists and individuals in the agricultural industry. A committee of agricultural economists with the Extension Service studied past production records and made projections for 1976 based on current trends and expected improvements in technology and marketing.

Texas presently accounts for about five per cent of the total national agricultural cash receipts. To achieve the goal of "3.76 in '76", the state must claim almost 10 per cent of the projected national increase in the coming years. Extension specialists and county agricultural agents are conducting meetings with Texas producers to help them with new advancements in technology and marketing in their respective areas. Cash receipts will benefit the consumer as well as the producer. Food prices will undoubtedly reflect an increased efficiency in production and marketing as costly practices in current use are improved or eliminated.

A service awards dinner was held at Mitchell's Restaurant in Seymour Monday (Jan. 10) to honor 15 General Telephone Company employees.

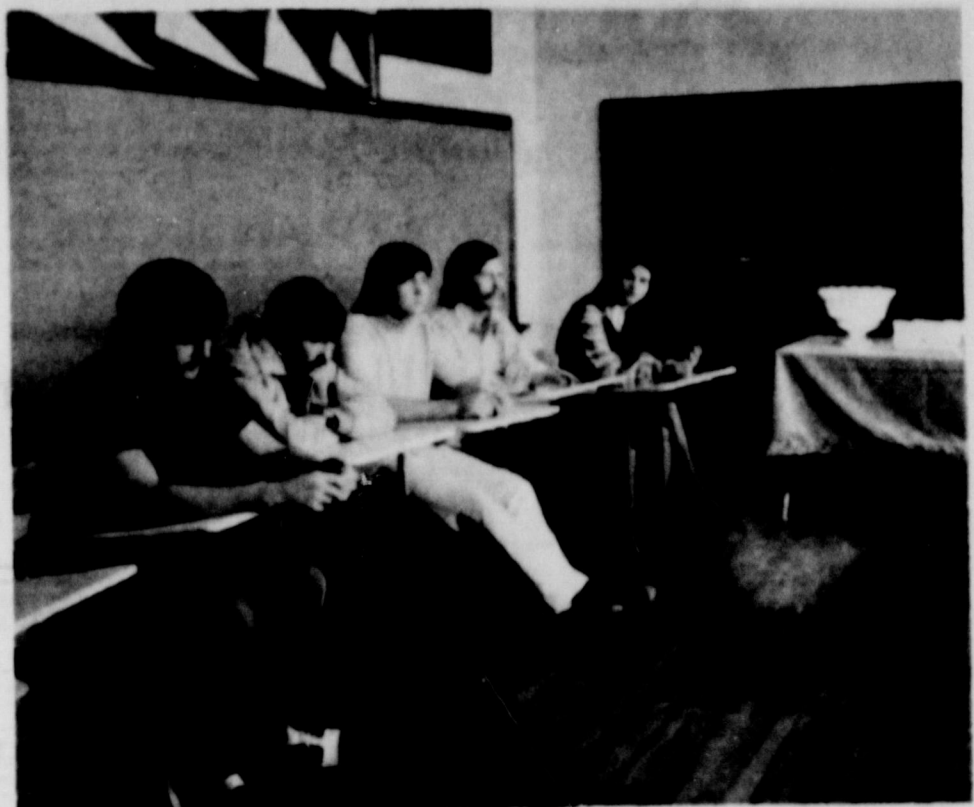
Charles Massey, combinationman in Seymour who will retire February 2 after 46 years with the company, was among those recognized.

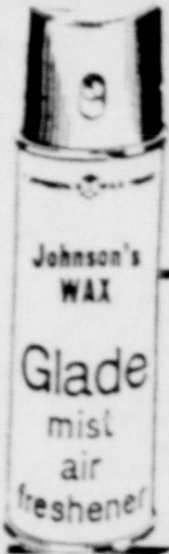

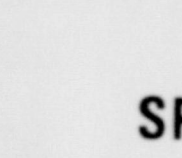
