

## Farabee Opposes School Bill

AUSTIN-- State Senator Ray Farabee was one of several rural Senators opposing Senate passage of a new school finance plan. The measure, known as the Revised Foundation School Plan, has passed the Senate.

Farabee said he voted against passage of the bill because portions of the legislation would cause increases in the amounts local school districts have to raise. School districts under the present plan are required to raise at least 20% of the cost to participate in the Foundation Program. Under the new plan, districts would be required to

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

"Under the new program," Farabee said, "it is estimated that Knox City ISD would have to increase its local payment by \$25,000. In return, it would receive a \$160,000 increase in State aid.

The Senator explained that a portion of the increase in local money required would be offset by increases in State funding.

"Since some programs are currently being paid for with local money," Farabee said, "it is unclear as to whether new taxes will be required at the local level. It is my contention that the Legislature should not pass a state-wide program such as this one and then expect local districts to shoulder such a tremendous portion of the burden for

# 'Being Old' — A New Beginning?

### By Bernard E. Nash

Because there has been so much in the press and on television lately about the plight of our nation's older citizens, it is all too easy to conclude that all older people are disabled, destitute and destined to wither away their final days in a nursing home or some other institution. And there is nothing more self-

defeating than this totally negative image which virtually dooms any cffort to improve conditions Fortunate.

ly, this is sim-Bernard Nash ply not true of the majority of older Americans. There are, of course, many older people suffering financial deprivations, and many others who are ill-and their lives have undoubtedly been circumscribed by these unfortunate factors. Yet, while it is essential that we give our attention to helping these people improve their living conditions, it is equally important that we not forget that most older Americans are alert and well and actively involved in their own communities.

To help set the record straight, I offer the following brief vignettes

· In New York's famous Plaza Hotel, Herbert Bluestone recently celebrated his 82nd birthday by coming to work as usual in the hotel's drugstore, which he has operated for the past 40 years.

Besides running the pharmacy. Mr. Bluestone is chairman of a local pharmacists' pension fund, and is thus responsible for signing and dispatching pension checks to retired pharmacistsmany far younger than he. However, he doesn't plan to be endorsing any pension checks himself.

"Retire?" he declared. "I have no intention of retiring. Why, my mother lived to 94!"

· After a long and varied career that included stints as a Denver Post reporter, Navy security guard, musician (clarinet and saxaphone) and court reporter. Clemert Lee is retired, but he's hardly unemployed. Now living in San Diego, Mr. Lee, 80, and his wife of 52 years, Grace, 72, are busily embarked upon a two-person ecology crusade to keep America's roadsides clean.

Each day, they drive along interstate highways near their California home in search of aluminum beer and soft drink cans tossed from car windows by careless travelers. Sometimes they collect as many as 500 cans a day, which are then sold to a salvage dealer for recycling.

The Lees began their pick-up project three years ago after Mr. Lee discovered that "no one wants to hire a man my age." To avoid the boredom of inactivity. and to make a useful contribution toward improving out environment, they took to the road.

"Cleaning up America," notes Mr. Lee, "is better than sitting at home twiddling my thumbs."

· Also cleaning up, so to speak, in Harrington Park, N.J., is 78-year-old Amedo Quaresima who, until his retirement last year, designed and made the colorful neon tubes used in storefront advertising displays. With retirement came a move from New York to this suburban New Jersey town to be near his son and three of his grandchildren. The transition was a difficult and at times depressing one

"I prayed to God to either take me away or make me better," he recalls. "Gradually, I cheered up. Now, I am like a kid again."
