## Prominent Landowner, Roy Tankersley Dies Sun.

Roy H. Tankersley, 67, died unexpectedly Sunday night at Grapevine where he and his wife were visiting their son and his family. Mr. and Mrs. Loyd Tankersley. He was pronounced dead on arrival at 9:30 o'clock at the Grapevine Memorial Hospital where Dr. E. L. Lancaster ruled death due to natural causes. Funeral services were held Tuesday at the First Baptist Church here with the Rev. Floyd V. Bailey, Foursquare Church pastor, and the Rev. Roger Butler, pastor, officiating. Burial followed in the Knox City Cemetery with Smith Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Born January 28, 1902 in Alexander City, Alabama, he moved to Haskell County at the age of one year with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Hollie Tankersley. He married Mildred Elizabeth Abernathy on January 8, 1921 at Haskell. The couple built a home and moved to Knox City in 1945, and Mr. Tankersley retired from farming in 1947. ## City Council Sets Election For April 8

In a regular session of the City Council Monday evening, motion was made and carried that the council call an election for the purpose of electing a mayor and three councilmen. Two councilmen will be elected for regular two-year terms, and one councilman will be elected for a one-year term to fill the vacancy recently created by Larry Don Lain's resignation. Randy Larson was appointed to fill the vacancy until the upcoming election. The election has been set for Tuesday, April 8, at the City Hall and will be held again this year jointly with the school election.

Councilmen whose terms expire this year are Carl Sheltin and Sammy B. White. Mayor C. C. (Buddy) Angle's term also expires this year. Holdover councilmen are L. V. Worley and Willard Skiles. Other important business on the docket Monday night was the passing of a resolution by the council opposing the proposals as set forth in the recommendations of the Governor's Committee on Public Education and motion was made and carried that a letter be written to each of the State executives stating the City's position and attaching a copy of the stated resolution. The motion carried with four councilmen voting in favor of the resolution and one opposing same.

## Contract Let For Highway Work In County

AUSTIN - A contract for seal coat work on 182 miles of highways in the Childress district has been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission. The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer V. J. McGee, and will be in Hardeman, Briscoe, Childress, Collingsworth, Dickens, Donley, Foard, Hall, Knox and Motley counties. J. H. Strain & Sons, Inc. of Tye was awarded the contract with a low bid of \$362,577.20. Vance L. Castleberry of Childress is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 120 working days. The work in Knox county includes FM 266, 5.2 miles, from Haskell county line north to Goree; FM 266, 7.9 miles, from Hefner north to US 82; FM 1756, 4 miles, from SH 283 west four miles; FM 1756, 8.3 miles, from SH 283 east to FM 267.

ber cities in the reorganization of same. Officials were told that the Texas Legislature is expected to approve the petition admitting Knox City's name within thirty to forty-five days and approximately thirty days thereafter the issue will be presented to the public. Residents will have the chance to vote on a water purchase contract and bond election. According to authorities, it will be necessary to levy and collect an ad valorem tax by the NCT Water Authority for a period of approximately two years in order to establish a reserve fund consisting of money sufficient to pay one year's interest on the bonds, plus an emergency fund. As long as these funds are intact, no additional property tax will be levied. Once the lake is completed and water purchases have begun, authorities say it will no longer be necessary to collect the ad valorem tax. The project is planned so as to enable the Authority to pay all operating expense and interest and principal on the bonds for the sale of water. A Federal grant has been set aside for use in the project, but if approval is not received in the upcoming election, the funds will be allocated to other locations. One local official remarked that this would be the most economical and the best source of water available at this time. Cost can only go up in the future, he said. This is really a serious problem in that the quality of the water rather than quantity at the present time is causing grave concern due to the high content of nitrate in our water. Not only will this situation hinder any significant growth in our community but could jeopardize the health of those who live here in the future. The Herald will present short, informative articles each week in order that residents may be informed concerning our water problem.

 Mulch is being used by district co-operators of the Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District to aid in the establishment of grass plantings.

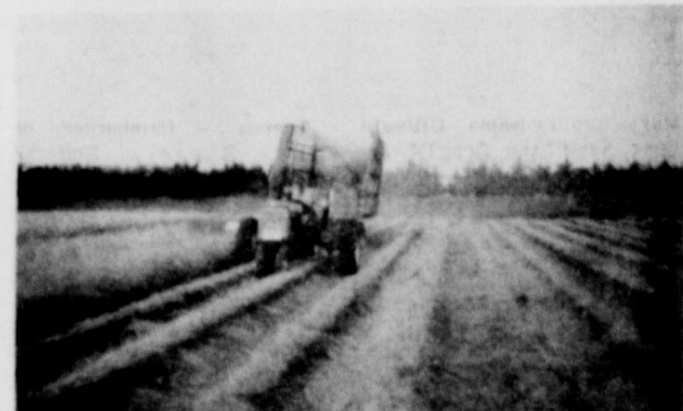

After the man was seated Garrett quietly walked over to him and said "What's your

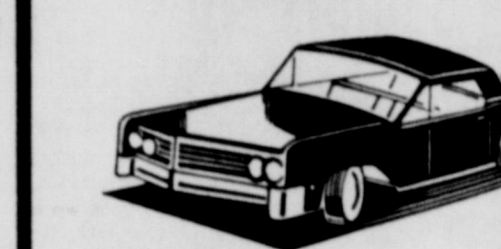

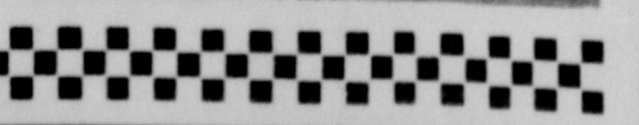
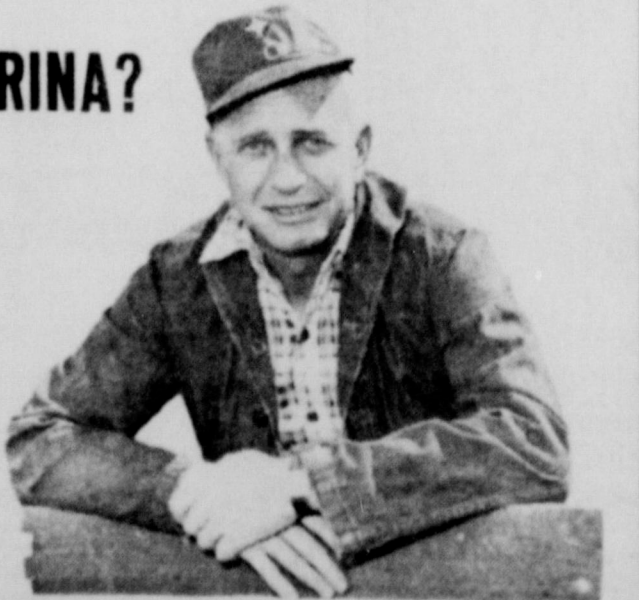

## Farm and Ranch News

### (LAST WEEK'S NEWS) FORM FOR REPORTING AGRICULTURAL PAYMENTS SHARED WITH OTHERS

Agricultural producers who receive agricultural payments in behalf of other persons, or that are shared with other persons must notify the Internal Revenue Service on form 4347 with their income tax report. Agricultural program payments to joint payees are reported by the United States Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service to the IRS by the identifying number of the person receiving the payment.

Through new electronic data processing procedures, the ASCS reports will be matched with the individual tax report and the Internal Revenue Service will expect the two reports to match, unless the taxpayer has specified the division of government payments on form 4347. The forms may be obtained from the post office, tax office or the district director of Internal Revenue Service.

### USE NITROGEN FERTILIZER TO REMOVE ICE

A light application of urea fertilizer available from most garden or farm suppliers will do an excellent job of removing the slick, icy surface on walks and drives which form during ice and snow storms. This material is relatively safe for concrete, asphalt, or brick surfaces and is much safer for your lawn and shrubs than the salt compounds so frequently used. In the absence of urea use any nitrogen fertilizer rather than the customary salt application.

### ROSE BUSH PRUNING

Do not be in a hurry to prune back your rose bushes, even though they may be an eyesore in the winter landscape. They may be partially pruned back to prevent damage by winter wind but the heavy pruning should be done in late winter or early spring just before the major growth begins. Heavy pruning early in the winter will often force new growth during a prolonged warm spell which makes the rose bush extremely vulnerable to a sudden drop in temperature.

### (THIS WEEK'S NEWS) SOIL TESTS FOR SPRING AND SUMMER PLANTED CROPS

If you are considering the use of fertilizer, soil tests can be a valuable source of information and a profitable investment.

A soil test is a chemical laboratory analysis designed to provide an index of the available nutrients in a soil. Common tests are for pH, calcium and magnesium needed as a basis for liming, but levels of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium are also measured.

In addition to showing levels of acidity or alkalinity and plant nutrients in samples analyzed, soil testing services provide suggested rates and combinations of plant nutrients needed.

There are two important requirements for getting valid information from soil tests. The first is reliable laboratory procedures calibrated to express available nutrients and correlated with field data. The second is a good soil sample.

Information about the soil and soil samples are also should be complete. The sample laboratory must be selected and the field on which the soil is desired. The soil should be uniform in color and texture as past crop rotation, better maintained when soil 10 to 15 different designated samples of core soil layer should be spot, put in a thoroughly mixed pint sent to the laboratory.

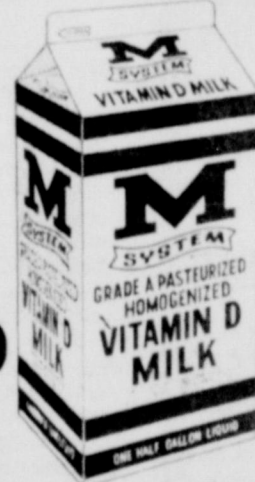

Mrs. W. A. Bryant of O'Brien asks some help for her grandson who is collecting Reader's Digests. He needs any copies before 1942, all of 1952, and several copies he has missed since 1942, if any of you have copies to give away.

We are all familiar with "Charity begins at home." Too often we think that charity means only giving money. It is a broader term meaning to give of ourselves or to give things that we no longer need that someone else can use, to be given with love and good intentions.

At the Queen of Peace Catholic Parish in Wichita Falls, mothers of the Notre Dame School children are saving Betty Crocker coupons for a school bus. They have saved 45,000 of the million coupons needed. This goal has been reached before.

Our St. Anne's Christian Mothers' Society at Rhineland is also saving 1969 calendars to be sent to prisoners, old eye glasses to be used in medical experiments, cancelled special issue stamps (leave a 1/4 inch margin around the stamps) sent to an Indian orphanage, and even old hose and cleaning bags to be used by different organizations. If you can save any of these things and get them to me, I will see that they reach the place where they can do some good.

A conversation overheard between two five-year-olds concerning a present day health problem: "My granny has the flu."

A thoughtful pause, then, "Where did she get it - the wind? Or did she just catch one?"

Now that we have become aware of the school problem, do you find yourself looking more closely at school buildings?

If any of you think this is not a real threat to our communities, there are four examples between us and Wichita Falls, alone.

The big Sunset building stands useless, wasting away. The Rhineland High School is empty except for an occasional religion class; the recently built gym is deteriorating. In Dundee and Bomarton, the whole towns are withering away, with all the young people moving where there is a future, and right at the middle of the once small towns and the core of their problems, stand the school buildings with strips of sheet iron covering their window eyes in embarrassment.

Did you know that six months after the Mattson school closed, with intentions to use the building for club meetings and social events, the Baptist Church there closed and the community is no more?

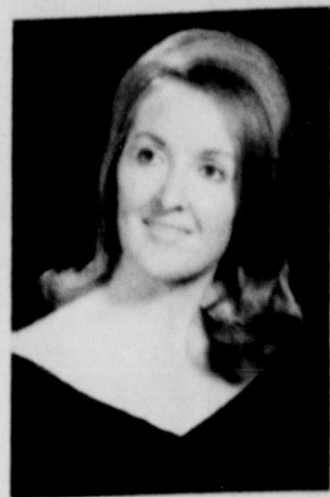

"The NEDT battery," Miss Drozda said, "is a series of tests in English, social studies, mathematics, natural sciences, and word usage designed to measure each student's ability to apply basic learning skills rather than his ability to memorize facts."

It has been administered to more than five million students throughout the country since it was introduced in 1959.
