And except for taking time out to marry her late husband, Joe Watkins, and have two sons, to recover from a bout with tuberculosis, and to work a few years at the clinic, she has been there ever since. FmHA To Provide Emergency Loans

Farmers and ranchers in Knox County who sustained production losses as a result of damages and losses caused by prolonged drought from July 26, 1973 through August 22, 1974, may be eligible to receive an emergency loan from the Farmers Home Administration, according to an announcement by Knox County Judge Sam E. Clonts. Those who have not received an emergency loan to assist them in recovering from their losses may apply for such a loan at the Farmers Home Administration county office at 1101 East Main Street, Knox City, Texas, before close of business December 2, 1974, for physical losses and July 7, 1975, for production losses. These loan applications will be taken under the terms of a new law (P.L. 93-227) enacted January 2, 1974. Individual examination will be made of each application to determine date of the disaster occurrence and emergency loan benefits for which the applicant is eligible. Loans based on qualifying production losses may include funds to reimburse applicants for production expenses which went into damaged or destroyed crop and livestock enterprises, but not to produce new crops during 1975. Payment terms depend on the purpose for which the loan is used and the applicant's payment ability. No loan may exceed the actual loss sustained. The interest rate for these loans is 5% and there will be no principal cancellation. These loans must be secured by crops, livestock, farm machinery, or real estate. County Fm.H.A. supervisor is Joe T. Boone.

Hounds Eke Out No. 5

Greyhound fans breathed a sigh of relief Friday night when the clock finally ran out ending the Knox City - Windthorpe game with the final score, Knox City 20, Windthorpe 16. The last few seconds of the game saw Knox City fans on their feet and applauding the fine defense that the Hounds executed in the closing minutes. With 3:16 minutes left on the clock in the first quarter, the Hounds had already put 20 points on the board. Quarterback Joey Swain was responsible for the first two TDs on runs of one and two yards. Swain kicked the PAT after the first touchdown, but the run for two failed after the second TD. Al Bateman scored on a 28-yard run followed by Swain's kick for extra point, giving the Hounds the 20 points. The Trojans, playing before a large homecoming crowd, made all of their points in the second quarter as Richard Koetter scored from the three and Roy Koetter caught a 20-yard scoring pass from Robert Schroder. Richard Koetter made all the extra points. Excellent defense was demonstrated by Hounds, especially in the last quarter of play. Coach Don Mullins said that Jimmy Lynn's recovery of a mid-air fumble and Jimmy Moore's interception with only seconds to play helped to overshadow other obstacles encountered Friday night. Charlie Flye was injured early in the game, and according to Coach Mullins, will be out of play for at least two weeks. The Hounds have an open date this week, and will begin District 7-A play next week, October 18, when they host the Munday Moguls for the annual Coming Home game. The annual bonfire will precede the game at 5:00 p.m. and will again be on the gin yard.

First Christian Church Building Comes Down

Members of the First Christian Church have mixed emotions this week. Of course, they welcome progress with the prospect of a new sanctuary, but many are experiencing a "lump in their throats" as they watch the building, which has served them for 66 years, come down. Razing began Monday of this week and according to a spokesman, construction of the new sanctuary is tentatively set to begin in February of next year. Building committee members John Crownover, Paul Grinstead, and Joe Reeder Jr. will be looking into different kinds and availability of building materials in the near future. Contract for the new building has not yet been let. The new building will join the present educational building and will sit further west and north than the present sanctuary. Dimensions will be 37 x 60 feet. The First Christian Church was organized here about 1906 with Elder Sam Anderson as leader. The first meeting place was in one of See CHURCH Pg. 7

Absentee Voting To Begin Oct. 16

The absentee voting period for the November 5 General Election begins next Wednesday, October 16, and will continue through Friday, November 1, according to Zena Waldron, County Clerk. Those persons who expect to be absent from their county of residence only on the day of the election may vote by personal appearance during regular office hours at the County Clerk's office. Those persons who expect to be absent from their county of residence both during the time for voting by personal appearance and on election day can make application to the county clerk requesting that an absentee ballot be mailed to them at an address outside the county. In addition, those persons residing within the county but unable to vote on election day due to sickness, physical disability, religious belief, or incarceration for less than a felony, can also make application to Mrs. Waldron requesting that an absentee ballot be mailed.

Seniors Can Receive Pay

High school seniors can now join the Texas Guard and not have to leave for their initial active duty for training for nine months. Best yet, they can be paid for six months of that time they are in school.

A recent exception to a Department of Defense regulation now allows high school graduates, high school GED equivalents, and high school seniors to delay entry in Guard training for up to 270 days after enlisting.

High school seniors who will graduate within 270 days of their enlistment can be paid for the first 180 days. Starting weekend trips pay for a Private One is \$43.48. The delayed entry and pay is open to students who have no prior military service.

High school seniors who are paid must agree to go on their initial active duty training within sixty days of graduation.

Seniors can up their pay by upping their rank. A promotion to Private Two or Private First Class is authorized for new members of the Texas Guard who can talk two or four friends into joining with them.

Better Mileage At 53 Than In City Traffic

Because there are fewer stops in highway driving, you are likely to get more miles per gallon of gasoline in highway driving than in city driving, even though the highway driving speed is higher.

That is one lesson that appears to emerge from tests recently conducted by the United States Auto Club.

The city driving test consisted of going 108 miles in light city traffic including 225 traffic lights and 30 stop signs at an average speed of 25 miles per hour. The eight cars averaged 21.4 miles per gallon.

But in 972 miles of cross-country driving at an average speed of 53.2 miles per hour, the eight cars averaged 23.7 miles per hour, which is more than 10% better mileage.

These are the miles per gallon figures on the U.S. Auto Club's test of city driving. The numbers in parentheses indicate how many cylinders each car has.

GEOGRAPHY AND FLORA INFLUENCE HAY FEVER

A more scientific name for hay fever is pollen disease, the author of a book on allergies explains. Hay fever affects about one per cent of the population, and its symptoms are produced by contact of pollen with the allergic, upper respiratory mucous membrane.

There are three principal hay fever seasons in the U.S., Spring, Summer and Fall, corresponding to the pollination of three plant groups—trees, grasses, and weeds.

The symptoms include attacks of sneezing, watering and itching of the eyes, discharge of watery secretion from the nose and itching of the nose, throat and roof of the mouth.

The fall or weed-pollinating season lasts two or three months. The seasons for hay fever and the pollens to which a patient may be sensitive depend on geographical location and the flora of the territory. The weeds of fall hay fever cause symptoms in the northern areas from mid-August until the first frost. Fall hay fever is the type from which 90 per cent of patients suffer. Giant and short ragweed are the principal offending weeds. The more pollen in the air, and the more one is exposed to it, the more severe the symptoms.

Some hay fever sufferers vacation during the hay fever season in an area believed to be pollen-free. Others stay home during this period, in a room with doors and windows tightly shut.

In recent years air filters have been made available that remove pollen from the air.

Physicians advise against automobile and train trips for the hay fever sufferer during the height of the season. Golf or tennis also are out during this time.

"Maximum effectiveness in



treating a stuffed nose," according to the authors, "can be obtained by using a simple, non-prescription nose spray (like Neo-Synephrine 1/8 to 1/4 per cent)." However, they caution against prolonged use of any nose sprays.

Products containing an antihistamine are useful if the nose is running because of an allergy, such as in hay fever. (According to the 1972 National Therapeutic Disease Index, one of the nasal sprays most frequently recommended by doctors for relief of symptoms, is NTZ, which contains Neo-Synephrine and an antihistamine.)

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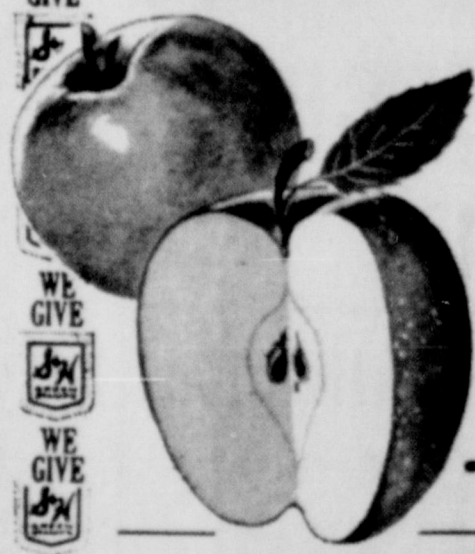

Ms. Kirchhoff Cites Rural Need Solution

Local industrial development bonds, backed by credit resources of the State of Texas, were proposed today by Mary Kirchhoff of Plainview, candidate for the State Senate's 30th District.

"This would be a solution to the problem of getting new jobs and new industry to locate in the smaller cities and towns throughout Texas. I have been working in rural development since the 1950's, and I know this is the time for a positive step forward.

"The first bill I will introduce as a State Senator in Austin will propose that the state puts its full faith and credit behind a program of industrial development bonds if a town or a city needs assistance in securing new industry."

The candidate, whose work with the Small Towns Task Force has been used as a pattern for rural development, pointed out that smaller communities in Northwest Texas have been at a disadvantage in competing for new industry and new job opportunities. "The reason has been," Mrs. Kirchhoff stressed, "because private capital in those towns and cities has not been available in amounts large enough to attract new industry. By way of contrast, in the major metropolitan areas, aggressive industrial development programs have been underway for a long time because they could afford it through gifts of private capital."

This is a problem that can be corrected, the candidate emphasized. "This lack of balance is wrong. Our young people should be able to find jobs at home if they want to remain and work among their families and friends. I believe state government should provide a helping hand wherever it is needed -- such as those instances in which a community is unable to find adequate resources of its own to attract new industry.

Too many smaller towns and cities are "on the verge of drying up," she said. The population decline has caused a lack of jobs in these areas -- and the bigger cities just "keep getting larger and larger."

"Many of these same people who have moved to larger cities would prefer life in a smaller town if they could support themselves there," she said. "I keep hearing this in every county where I have traveled lately. Our people want something done about this problem, and believe our legislature should respond with a program of positive action.

"We are well past the point where political double-talk is acceptable. I want to get things done. This problem of 'no jobs' and 'no new industry' has hindered us too long already, and I suggest that use of the state's credit in support of local industrial development bonds would be a safe, inexpensive way to get that job done.

"It's time for action."

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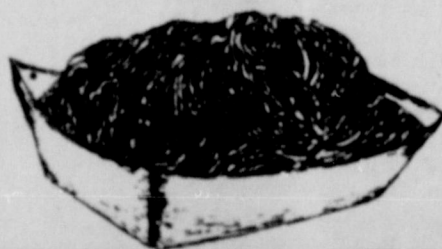
