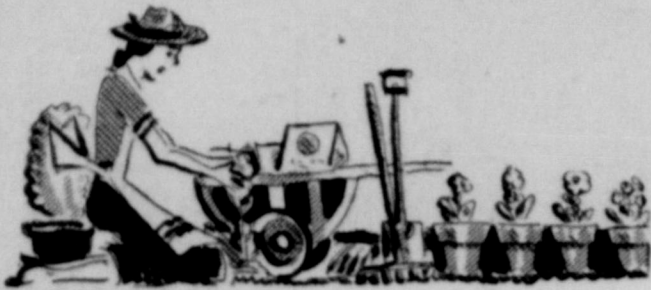

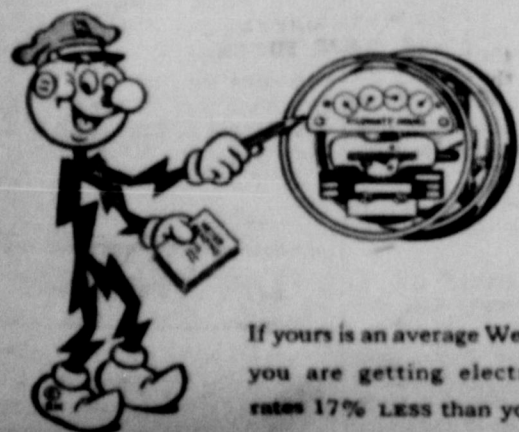

**DEAN NOLAN IN "BOOT" AT MARINE CORPS CAMP**  
 Dean R. Nolan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Nolan of Knox City, is now undergoing training at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot, San Diego, Calif. The 21-year-old former Knox

City high school student was inducted into the Marine Corps at Albuquerque, N. M., recently.  
 During the eight-week "Boot Camp", as recruit training is commonly called, Private Nolan will become well versed in such basic military subjects as precision drill, first aid, Marine Corps history and mission and field tactics.  
 Three weeks of the training period is spent at the Camp Matthews Rifle Range, situated 15 miles north of San Diego. While there, Pvt. Nolan will fire the .30 calibre Garand rifle, .45 calibre pistol, carbine and Browning Automatic Rifle. He will also receive indoctrination firing with the light and heavy machine guns, 60 and 81 mortars, flame throwers, and the latest type bazookas. Under a newly adopted training program he will also receive instructions in throwing live hand grenades.  
 Nolan was employed by the Swenson Ranch in Throckmorton county before reporting for service with the Marine Corps. Upon completion of recruit training he will be granted a

10-day leave and, if he has maintained a good record, will be promoted to Private First Class. He will then be assigned to a Marine post or station for duty or to a Marine Corps advanced training school.

**GRAIN SORGHUM BY-PRODUCT FEED DEMAND INCREASES**

COLLEGE STATION. — Grain sorghum by-product feeds—sorghum gluten feed and sorghum gluten meal—may become important in the rations of livestock grown in Texas. These feeds have been available for only three years.  
 Grain sorghum made up approximately 30 per cent of the total grain grown in Texas from 1941 to 1950. In 1950 it made up nearly 50 per cent of the total grain produced in the state.  
 One reason for the increasing importance of grain sorghum in Texas is its expanding industrial use. The grain is now being processed in a manner similar to corn.  
 Sorghum gluten feed and sorghum gluten meal are by-products obtained when sorghum grain is processed for starch, sugar and oil. These feeds are offered for sale as "milo gluten feed" and "milo gluten meal."  
 The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station conducted a series of feeding trials from 1947 through 1951 to determine the value of these by-products. Beef cattle, dairy cattle, poultry, sheep and swine were fed in the tests.  
 "Grain Sorghum By-product Feeds for Farm Animals," B-743, a new bulletin released by the Experiment Station, discusses the feeding value of sorghum gluten feed and sorghum gluten meal. This bulletin is available from the Publications Office, College Station, Texas.

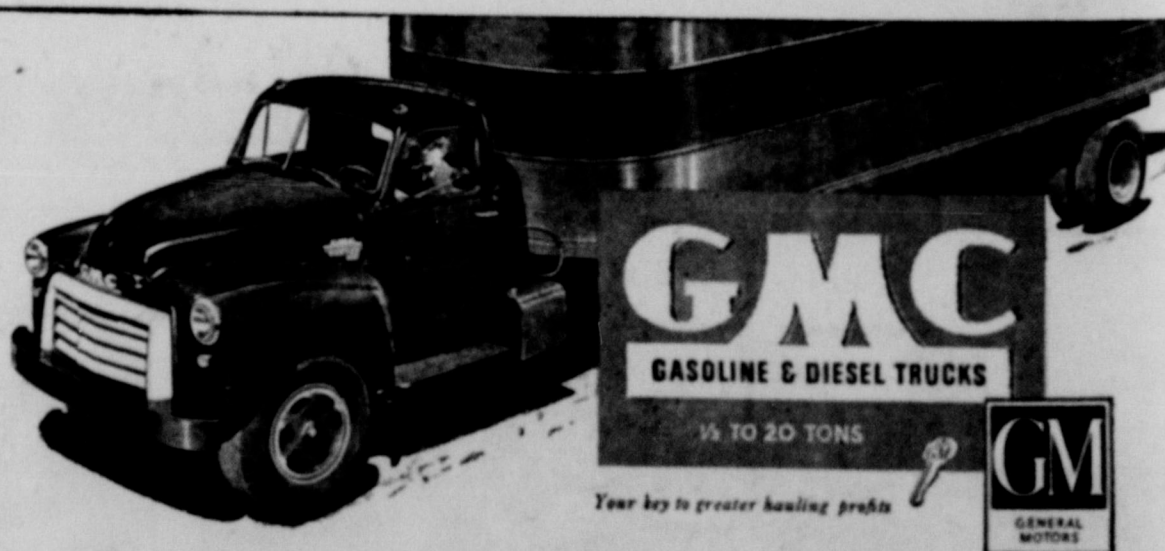

**LEGUME PLANTING PROSPERS DESPITE LONG DROUGHT**

COLLEGE STATION, Feb. 25. Texas farmers, come dry or wet weather, have recognized the value of using legumes in their crop rotation plans. Despite the prolonged drought during the fall and winter of 1950 and 1951, seed purchases were reported as heavy.

The state office of the Production and Marketing Administration at College Station has just released a report covering the amount of legume seed farmers secured under the purchase order program for the 1951 legume production program. The report shows that 32,677,172 pounds of all types of legume seed were secured by farmers under the program. The total included 10,631,089

pounds of lespedeza. Other large orders were for winter peas, both Austrian and Dixie Wonder, hairy vetch and hubam sweet clover. Smaller orders were for Madrid sweet clover, melititus indica (annual yellow blooming sweet clover), Singletary peas, Williamette and common vetch.

In addition, a great deal of home grown seed were planted, says E. A. Miller, agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Plantings of sweet clover and hairy vetch were especially heavy from home grown seed supplies.

Miller adds that reports from county agricultural agents show that an estimated 1,513,398 acres of legumes were turned under in 1951. Seed were harvested from 187,910 acres with a total production of 44,452,422 pounds. Most of this seed production was from sweet clover, hairy vetch, alfalfa, Singletary peas and crimson clover.

The board of supervisors of the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District held their regular meeting Friday, Feb. 22, in Knox City.

The most important subject at this time of the year is planting various grasses. The district board purchased 1,000 lbs. of King Ranch Bluestem, 500 lbs. of Sand Lovegrass and 500 lbs. of Blue Panic seed. All of this seed will be made available to farmers and ranchers through the John Smith Hatchery in Knox City. Farmers wishing to plant grass seed may contact Mr. Smith.

During the past year, about 3,500 acres of land in the district were planted to various permanent grasses. District-owned grass seed drills to plant these grasses may be had by contacting vocational agriculture teachers or Soil Conservation Service technicians. Several farmers are planting hubam and madrid sweet clovers for soil conditioning to improve soil structure, for grazing, and seed production. It is best to put the clover in rows and cultivate to keep down weed competition.

Fifteen farmers have secured assistance from the district the past month through initial agreements, starting at least one or more conservation practices toward a coordinated soil conservation district program.

SCS technicians are assisting farmers and ranchers in laying out tanks, terraces, irrigation systems and grass planting.

### ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE RECEIVES \$1,250,000 LOAN

A loan of \$1,250,000 to the Brazos River Transmission Electric Cooperative with headquarters at Waco has been approved by the Rural Electrification Administration, REA informed Senator Tom Connally recently.

The transmission serves nineteen distribution cooperatives, seven towns and one privately owned utility company in North, Central and West Texas.

The new loan will be used to build forty-five miles of 69 kilovolt transmission lines and related substations, to complete previously approved transmission construction which is already underway, and to make other improvements, including the installation of communications equipment.

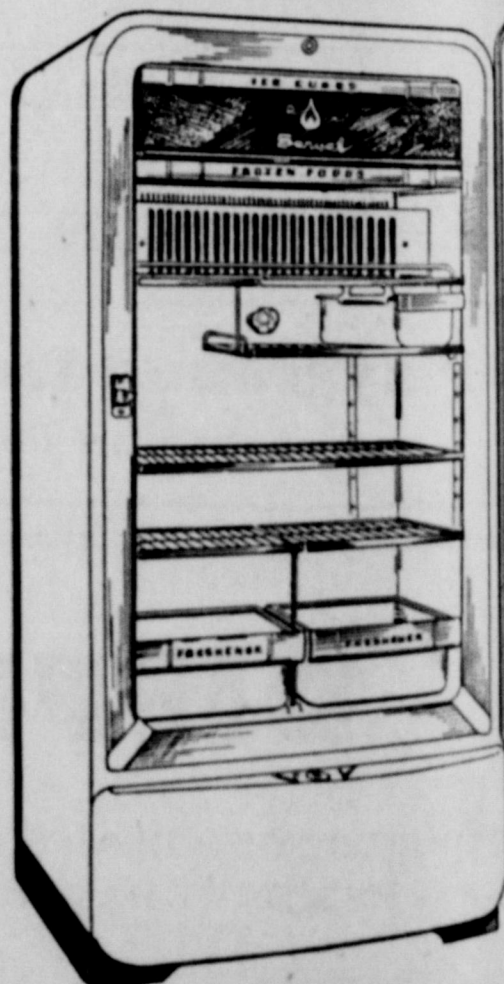

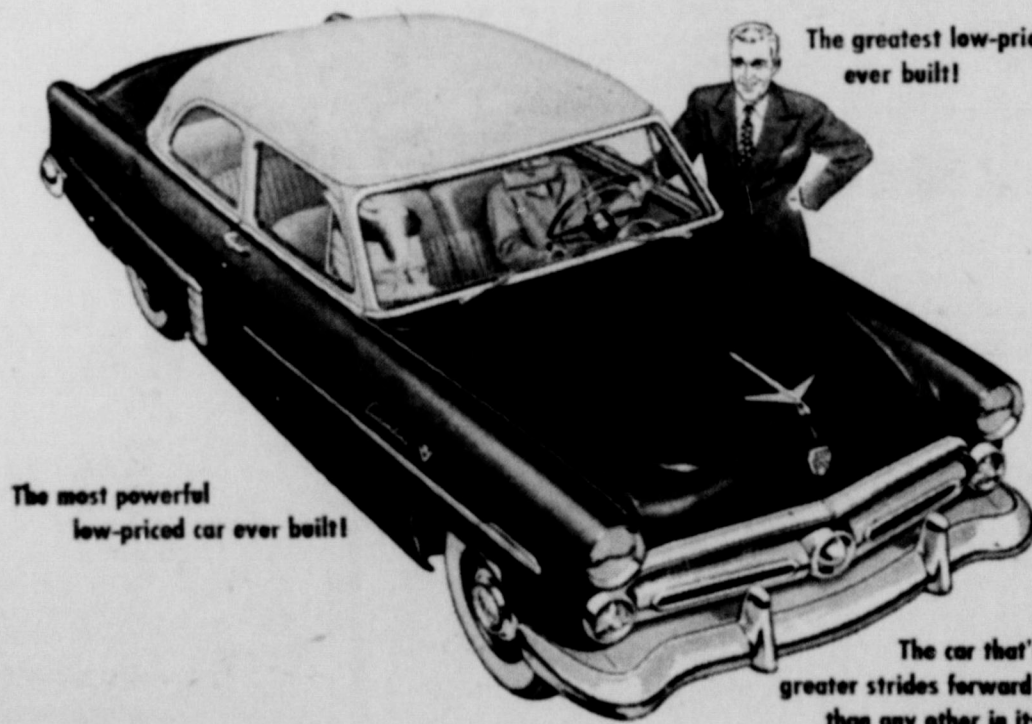
