## Public Schools Week To Be Mar. 3-6

### School Elections Join Parents Here On Sat. April 5

School officials have announced that the date of their April 5 election will be Saturday, April 5. The date named pre-keeping with area schools and also to coincide with the Knox County Hospital District, as the Knox County School Board election will be held at the City Hall from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. with Otis Harbert as presiding judge. Each school will have a separate election.

The Knox County Hospital District will elect one director. The term of C. J. Reese is expiring this year. Lyndol Cypert, Administrator, advised the Herald that anyone desiring to have his name placed on the ballot might do so by securing a form at his office in the Knox County Hospital or obtain a form at Smith's Rexall Drug in Munday from W. O. Smith. Applications must be filed before March 4.

The Knox County School Board election will be for two county school board trustees. Residents of Commissioners Prec. No. 1 will elect one trustee. Prec. No. 3 will elect one trustee. Prec. No. 1 voters will cast their ballots at the City Hall in Knox City and Prec. No. 3 residents will vote at Gilliland School, Clifford Cornett's term expires in Prec. No. 1 and H. A. Reeve's term expires for Prec. No. 3. Both men have filed for re-election.

Smith said that due to the higher cost in labor, the money is badly needed for the care and maintenance of the cemetery.

Needed Rain Welcomed. Knox City and surrounding areas received very welcome moisture last week in the form of rain. The showers arrived at a perfect time for supplying needed moisture for winter grain and perhaps leaving a reserve for spring row crops.

The Plant Center recorded a total of .96 of an inch, Sammy Tankersley who lives south of town had 1.6 inches, the M. H. Mansfield farm northeast of town got .8 of an inch, the Morris Denton farm located 5 1/2 miles southeast of town recorded 1.25 inches, and J. C. ### O'Brien Seaman Completes Tour

(DO345) SAN DIEGO (FHTNC) Feb. 14 - Airman Apprentice Lewis L. Davis, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard M. Davis of Route 1, O'Brien, Tex., returned to San Diego, California aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Constellation. The carrier has just completed its fourth tour of combat duty off the coast of South Vietnam.

While deployed, Constellation's Carrier Air Wing 14 launched 6,574 combat sorties and 4,089 support missions over Vietnam. Its total estimate of damage of destruction to enemy targets included 424 trucks, 461 supply barges, 31 bridges, 27 anti-aircraft sites, and a 16 mile petroleum pipeline.

University of Maryland in 1954. He served a brief time as assistant county agricultural agent in Maryland, then as a pilot in the U. S. Air Force with the Military Air Transport Service for approximately 3 years. He returned to work with the Maryland Extension Service two years before going to Oklahoma State University for graduate work.

After receiving an M.S. degree in Agricultural Economics from Oklahoma, he was named farm management specialist on August 1, 1960 with headquarters in the District Extension office at Lubbock. While in Lubbock, he worked with county agents and farm leaders on problems relating to farm management, was elected president of Lubbock Economics Council and served as coordinator of the economic study of the South Plains.

Seibert was named Grain Marketing Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service headquartered at Texas A&M University on September 16, 1968. He is working with commodity groups, producers and general farm organizations in expanding and making more efficient grain marketing, both domestic and foreign.

Norman Britts, Area Farm Management Specialist from Vernon will be on hand March 6 and will also be in charge of the March 13 meeting.

# Vegetable Research Program Established In Munday Area

TEXAS TECH COLLEGE, Lubbock, Texas — Potatoes, cabbage and onion variety trials have been planted in Munday in cooperation with area growers and the Ferry-Morse Seed Company.

Cabbage and onion varieties were planted in October, 1968 and to date have made excellent progress. The possibility of over-wintering these two crops look excellent. These crops have withstood temperatures as low as 10 degrees F. with no noticeable damage. Sand damage has been moderate to severe on young onion plants, however the plants are well enough established with a large root system, and should recover in good condition.

Eleven varieties of chipping and fresh-market potatoes were planted on February 13th in trial plots on the Eugene Thompson farm. The potato trials will be followed by cantaloupe, honey-dew, slicing cucumber and onion varieties for onion-ring processing trials.

Area Vegetable Specialist, Joe D. Tidwell, will coordinate plantings with area growers.

Five or six cantaloupe varieties, with available honey-dew varieties, will be planted on the Floyd Reed farm. Five or six hybrid slicing-cucumber varieties will be planted on the Lonnie Offutt farm.

Cabbage and onion trials will again be planted on the James Smith farm in late fall to evaluate the potential of over-wintering of vegetable crops for early market advantage.

Established and new herbicide materials will be used on all trials in an effort to find the most economical and effective method of controlling weeds in vegetable crops.

By conducting field-trial research on small plots, a considerable amount of information can be gained at very low cost and risk to area growers. Evaluation of yields, earliness, plant vigor, production quality and market acceptance will be made on all crops and varieties, and all information will be made available to growers, shippers and packers in the Rolling Plains Area.

A \$30,000 grant supports the vegetable research project directed from Texas Technological School of Agricultural Sciences. Others cooperating in the study are the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. Consultants Robert R. Reed, Program Chairman and Dr. George Tereshkovich, Horticulturist, help direct the Munday tests, assist with evaluations and conduct closely-controlled tests at the University in Lubbock.

A two-night Farm Management Short Course has been scheduled for 8:00 p.m., Thursday nights, March 6 and 13 at the Munday Chamber of Commerce building. This will be a two-night short course instead of three nights mentioned in an earlier news letter sent out.

John J. Seibert, Extension Grain Marketing Specialist from Texas A&M University will be the main speaker on March 6, discussing "Future Markets and Hedging."

Mr. Seibert grew up on a dairy and grain farm in central Maryland, where he was active in 4-H and FFA work. He received his B.S. degree in Agricultural Education from the

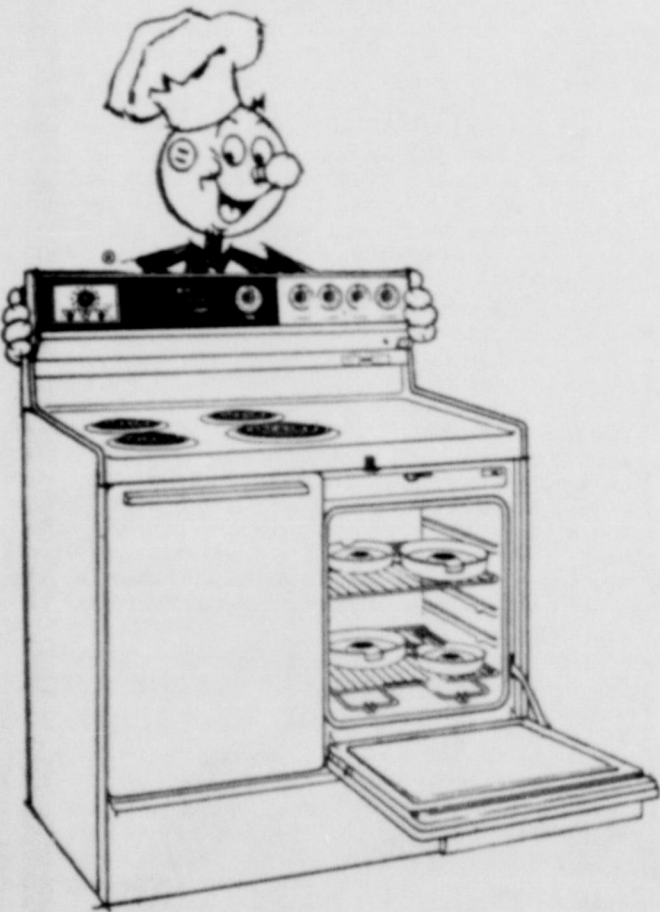

## Lone Star Gas To File For City Gate Rate Adjustment

L. G. James, President of Lone Star Gas Company, announced today that Lone Star has commenced preparation of an application which it expects to file with the Railroad Commission of Texas in early summer to adjust upward the Company's authorized intracompany city gate charge for gas delivered in Texas. The last application filed of such a nature by the Company was in December, 1958.

James stated that the current city gate charge is insufficient to compensate for the increases in expenses and investment incurred by Lone Star's transmission division since 1958. According to James, Lone Star's transmission division has, since 1958, incurred substantial increases in the cost of gas purchased, Federal income taxes, other taxes, wages and salaries, the cost of debt money, capital construction, and the cost of such construction.

Lone Star's transmission division purchases and gathers

natural gas and transports it to the city gates on the system. Lone Star's distribution divisions receive and pay for gas at the city gate and distribute it to customers' premises.

James said that residential and commercial rates would not be immediately affected by the filing with the Railroad Commission. After the new city gate charge is established and specific computations made for each city and town, requests would then be filed for increases in individual cities and towns where they are justified.

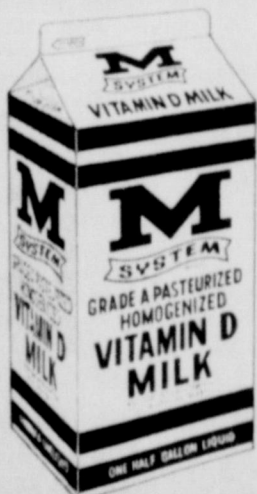

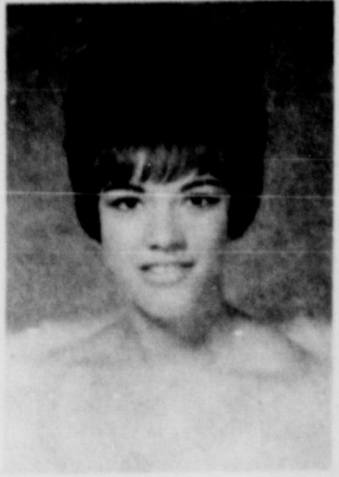

## O'Brien FHA Girls Visit State School

Tuesday the O'Brien FHA girls went on a very interesting trip to the Abilene State School. The girls were taken on a tour of the school by one of the school's Psychologist, Dr. Flowney. The State School covers 640 acres of land and has a population of 2300 residents.

In 1889, the Texas State Legislature authorized the establishment of an Epileptic Colony. In 1901, the legislature designated the colony's location as Abilene on 640 acres of land donated by the city. The institution's name was changed to Abilene State Hospital in 1925. In 1957, the function was changed to that of a school for the care and training of the mentally retarded and the name was changed to Abilene State School. Since 1965, the school has operated under the supervision of the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

Their goal is to help each individual to develop his abilities to the maximum, in order that he may lead as productive and satisfying a life as possible.

Abilene State School is one of nine state residential institutions for the retarded and serves 101 West Texas counties through the efforts of over 950 employees and a payroll expenditure of about \$3,856,068 annually.

Similar to a small city, the school has facilities which include an Academic School, Arts and Crafts, Business Services, Campus Life, Developmental Recreation, In-service Training, Medical Services, Psychological Services, Recreation, Chaplain, Social Development, Social Service, Speech Therapy, Superintendent, Vocational Rehabilitation, and Volunteer Services.

This school has helped a lot of people of all ages. It is wonderful that there are so many people who care enough to donate their time, money, and services to such a worthy cause.

The best place to start in helping the retarded is with YOU. Whether or not you work with them as a volunteer or in a career, whether you hire or fire them, if you accept them as a fellow human being, their battle is half won.

They need respect not pity, nor over-protection, nor babying. Though they also need your financial support for education and training, treatment and care, they need YOU even more. No amount of money or trained manpower can substitute for the most needed commodity of all, and the most successful, a person who cares. The rewards are great.

They both can use and are in great need of any donations you are willing to give. Organizations and groups who are interested in touring the school should contact the Psychology Department at the school.
