> Purpose of the meeting was discuss moving the monthly musical to the City Park rather than continuing to have it at Greyhound Stadium during the summer months.



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



BLEACHED UNBLEACHED

Flour is the common denominator of home baking, providing the base of almost every baked food.

And with the interest in hatural' foods, many consumers are wondering if unbleached flour is any better than bleached flour. cotton in each dent. Then

Mrs. Sally Coble offers some insight into the differences between the two.

She's a foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System.

Nutritionally, bleached and unbleached white flour are almost identical. Both are suitable for baking. Unbleached flour is ideal for breads, though it does not make as good a cake as regular bleached flour.'

She explained that freshly milled flour has a creamy color because it contains carotenoids, the same pigments that make fruits and vegetables yellow. When such flour is stored for several months, it becomes whiter and the baking qualities improve.

This natural process of aging can be accelerated by the addition of certain oxidizing agents that are permitted for use in flour. Flour treated in this way must be labeled bleached', 'she explained.

Aged flour is more golden in color and more expensive than chemically bleached flour, she said.

SUMMER CARE GIVES OUTDOOR FURNITURE LONGER LIFE.

Mid-summer care of outdoor furniture provides longer, better looking, life for each piece.

A modest amount of effort makes metal, wood, wicker and plastic furniture look its best through hot summer

Consumers can try some economical tips for cleaning and making minor repairs on furniture used on the veranda, in the backyard and at lake or pool side.

aluminum Lightweight chairs and tables have new luster when rubbed with a dry pad of fine steel wool. Follow with a light coat of auto past wax. Allow wax to dry 20 minutes before buffing. This process protects aluminum from the elements and helps prevent pitting.

Pieces with vinyl cord or strip webbing need occasional VISIT HERE washing with sudsy water. Rinse thoroughly.

Tighten any screws that anchoer webbing or allow movement. Loose rivets sometimes can be tightened by crimping the head with a pair of pliers. If screws or rivets must be replaced, use larger zinc-coated sheetmetal

Wrought iron or all-weather furniture need frequent care. Hose or wash with a mild detergent. Rinse well and

Preserve finishes with an annual coat of automobile paste wax. f wrought iron furniture or railings are scratched or pitted, rusting will occur. Rub these areas with steel wool or silicone carbide sandpaper. Wash out and allow places to dry.

NATIONAL FARM SAFETY WEEK SET FOR JULY 25-31

Although farmers make up only about four per cent of the work force in the U.S., 28 per cent of all accidents resulting in injuries in 1975 were caused by farm work related accidents.

This emphasizes the need for attention to farm and ranch safety, and National Farm Safety Week July 25-31 is designed to do just that. Theme of this year's ob-

servance is "Educate for Safety." with the interest being that more extensive education will help cut down on the number of deaths and injuries caused by carelessness on farms and ranches.

Some 1,375 people were killed in farm related accidents last year and more than 140,000 were injured. The cost of farm accidents in the U.S. is estimated at \$3 billion A recent survey by the

National Safety Council showed some 204,000 injuries to farm workers, residents and visitors in 15 predominantly agricultural states over a one-year period. Almost


