





2. THE TRUTH IS NOW CONFIRMED

Jesus promised the apostles the baptism of the Holy Spirit (Acts 1:5), to guide them into all truth John 16(13), and to give them special power (Acts 1:8). This promise was fulfilled (Acts 2:4). Thesefore, when they began preaching the word they were able to confirm the word (Mark 18:30). The truth has now been confirmed.

If a person will not be convinced by the Bible, he would not be convinced if one should be raised from the dead (Luke 16(19-31). Those who claim to perform miracles today are igmorant of God's plan; and in reality deny that the salvation was over confirmed as the Bible declares. Heb. 2:3-41.

& THE MEANS OF OBTAINING MIRACULOUS POWER HAVE CEASED


Miraculous power was bestowed upon men in New Testament limes through two means: (1). Eaptism of the Holy Spirit (Acts 2:4, 43).

The last occurrence was about A. D. 41. TWENTY-THREE years thereafter, Paul wrote that there is "one haptism" (Epn. 4:5). About the same time Peter wrote that haptism is in water (1 Pet. 3:20-21). There is just one haptism now, and it is in water. The conclusion therefore follows that there is no Holy Spirit baptism now.
