"PURCHASE AGREEMENTS" AVAILABLE IN 1952 TO COTTON FARMERS

Cotton farmers will have an additional means of price support on their 1952 crop. J. C. McGee, Chairman of the County PMA Committee, reminded cotton growers today. This should make it easy for farmers to get at least the support price for their 1952 cotton crop, according to the chairman.

Mr. McGee explained that the new method of supporting prices is the so-called "purchase agreement", which has been used for several years to support prices of various other basic farm commodities.

KNOX COUNTY FARMER HARVESTS FIRST '52 WHEAT

For the second year in a row, John Michaels, Knox County farmer, harvested the first wheat reported in the nation.

Michaels delivered 75 bushels of wheat, cut on his land five miles north of Knox City, to the Wichita Falls General Mills Friday. The No. 1 hard wheat had a moisture content of 14.8 per cent and weighed 60.2 lbs. per bushel, and sold for \$2.29 a bushel.

Delivering the first grain to Wichita Falls made Michaels "King" of the city's 1952 Wheat-time activities, and won him prizes of \$100, a watch, western suit, boots, Stetson hat, and family tickets to all Wheat-time activities.

Under a purchase agreement, the farmer files an application to cover a specified portion of his crop. A small fee is charged for this service. The producer himself has control of his crop throughout the season, and may sell it at any time in the open market. Or, if the market price is not as favorable as the support rate, the owner may hold

his cotton and sell it to the government. McGee said that cotton loans will also be available this year as a means of price support for cotton growers. Cotton under loan may be stored either in warehouses approved by the Commodity Credit Corporation or in farm structures approved by the county PMA committee.

Have Miracles Ceased?

God created the first man and first woman miraculously. Since then, with a few exceptions, the human race has multiplied through the operation of natural law. Had God chosen to have done so, He COULD have continued to make men out of the dust of the earth and blow into their nostrils the breath of life. We ALL recognize that God did not choose to do so.

Furthermore, even a casual reader of the Bible knows that God performed miracles through certain men. Our question (stated above) is not COULD God enable men today to perform miracles as He did, but IS He granting them such power now. So this is not a question of God's power—but of God's plan.

1. THE NEED FOR MIRACLES HAS CEASED

God has enabled men to perform miracles in times past to spread and confirm truth. The miracles that Jesus performed were to confirm the truth of his mission and Divine Sonship (Matt. 11:2-5; John 20:30-31). The miracles that the apostles performed or that the Lord performed through them, were to confirm the word that they preached (Mark 16:17-20). The gospel that they preached was a new message they were to take to all the world. How could they prove that Christ had sent them? They had no Bible—the New Testament had not been written. So the Lord promised them special power (Luke 24:46-48; Acts 1:5-8), through which they were able to convince the world that He sent them and was with them, and that they were preaching the truth.

2. THE TRUTH IS NOW CONFIRMED

Jesus promised the apostles the baptism of the Holy Spirit (Acts 1:5), to guide them into all truth (John 16:13), and to give them special power (Acts 1:8). This promise was fulfilled (Acts 2:4). Therefore, when they began preaching the word they were able to confirm the word (Mark 16:20). The truth has now been confirmed.

3. IT IS FOREVER CONFIRMED

Does Jesus have to come back and raise Lazarus from the dead again, and do His other miracles in order for us to believe that He is the Son of God? Do the apostles have to come back and again perform miracles in order for us to believe? If a court proves a man innocent of a charge, does it have to convene and reconfirm this man's innocence every year?

A TRUTH ONCE PROVED IS FOREVER PROVED

We now have the evidence in writing (John 20:30-31)—the written word of God. Faith comes by hearing the word (Rom. 10:17). The written word supplies the man of God completely unto every good work (2 Tim. 3:16-17).

If a person will not be convinced by the Bible, he will not be convinced if one should be raised from the dead (Luke 16:19-31). Those who claim to perform miracles today are ignorant of God's plan; and in reality deny that the salvation was ever confirmed as the Bible declares (Heb. 2:3-4).

4. THE MEANS OF OBTAINING MIRACULOUS POWER HAVE CEASED

Miraculous power was bestowed upon men in New Testament times through two means: (1). Baptism of the Holy Spirit (Acts 2:4, 43).

(2). Laying on of hands of the Apostles. (Acts 8:14-18; 13:1-7). There are only two examples of Holy Spirit baptism in the New Testament: Acts 2:4 the twelve apostles received it; Cornelius and his household received it (Acts 10:44; 11:18). The last occurrence was about A. D. 41. TWENTY-THREE years thereafter, Paul wrote that there is "one baptism" (Eph. 4:5). About the same time Peter wrote that baptism is in water (1 Pet. 3:20-21). There is just one baptism now, and it is in water. The conclusion therefore follows that there is no Holy Spirit baptism now. Hence, no one can receive power to work miracles through this means.

All the apostles have died. Therefore, it is impossible for them to impart power to any one through the laying on of hands. So, no one can receive power to do miracles through means of the apostles' hands.

Jesus Christ gave power to perform miracles while he lived to many he sent out under personal ministry (Luke 10:9). The purpose of this was also to confirm the word.
