

To Host Paducah Friday

KC Falls To Crowell

The Crowell Wildcats drove 70 yards in the fourth quarter to make their winning touchdown, defeating the Knox City Greyhounds 20-14. The game was played at Greyhound Stadium.

The Hounds are now 2-1 in district play and 6-2 for the season. Crowell moved up to be the only undefeated team in the district with three wins and a 7-1 season record.

The Greyhounds scored on their first possession when on their sixth play from scrimmage with 7:47 remaining in the first quarter. Charlie Flye ran in from the Crowell three yard line. The extra point kick failed.

Following ball exchanges, Wildcat Tommy Tamplen raced 77 yards for six points with 1:16 left in the initial period. The PAT was good.

and Crowell led 7-6.

Punt exchanges filled the second quarter until, with 1:15 remaining, Tamplen scored from one foot out. Again, the PAT was good, bringing the score to 14-6.

An intercepted pass ended the Greyhounds' second possession of the second half, but after several plays from scrimmage the Wildcats returned the ball on a punt. The Hounds began their drive on the Crowell 49. On their fourth play Jimmy Don Moore moved in from the 19 yard line for a KC touchdown. Flye made the two extra points good, tying the game 14-14 with 2:28 left in the third quarter.

Jerry Eaton covered the on-side kick for the Hounds, but on their third play an interception turned it over to the Wildcats.

Crowell then began the 70-yard drive for their final TD. Rocky Glasscock made the score on a 10-yard run. The PAT failed, and Crowell led 20-14.

Following the Crowell drive, the Hounds turned the ball over on an interception, but recovered a Crowell fumble several plays later to regain possession. With 14 seconds remaining Crowell intercepted one last Greyhound pass, and the game ended two plays later.

The Hounds had 37 yards of passes, completing 5-13.

Total rushing yardage for the Hounds was 105, with Flye leading in this area with 42 yards, followed by Jerry Stamps with 39 and Moore with 30.

Fifteen-year-old Brett Boone of Knox City was named Knox County Gold Star Boy at the annual 4-H awards banquet held in the Munday High School Cafeteria Monday evening. The presentation was made by Knox County Extension Agent Herman Collier.

Brett, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Boone, has been active in the 4-H horse program for the past six years. He has won polebending at the county show for the past four years, and has won or placed in several other events, also. He was Runner-Up High Point Horseman at last year's county show. Brett won District III polebending two years, qualifying for the state 4-H show where he was a finalist both years. He placed fifth in the state show his second year. Last year he won Junior poles at the Open Youth Show at the National Youth Horse Congress in Dallas. He has also been a member of Knox County's horse judging team.

An honor student, Brett is a sophomore at Knox City High School. He is a member of the Greyhound Junior Varsity football team and track team. This year he is serving as treasurer of the Knox City chapter of Future Teachers of America, and is reporter for the Future Farmers of America chapter. He served as president of the FFA Green-

County Voters Against Changes

Knox County voters overwhelmingly opposed all eight propositions in balloting Tuesday. The proposed state constitution was vetoed by more than an 8-1 margin. Only 860 of the 2,900 registered voters cast ballots in the constitutional revision election.

Totals for the county include Prop. 1, 42 for, 847 against; Prop. 2, 44 for, 843 against; Prop. 3, 50 for, 843 against; Prop. 4, 50 for, 822 against; Prop. 5, 51 for, 836 against; Prop. 6, 40 for, 846 against; Prop. 7, 47 for, 841 against; and Prop. 8, 39 for, 847 against.

In the lone box in Knox City, totals were Prop. 1, 9 for, 312 against; Prop. 2, 7 for, 314 against; Prop. 3, 8 for, 313 against; Prop. 4, 5 for, 315 against; Prop. 5, 7 for, 314 against; Prop. 6, 8 for, 310 against; Prop. 7, 8 for, 312 against; and Prop. 8, 9 for, and 311 against.
