The cotton will be purchased at the following prices: (1944 crop Middling 15-16 inch, basis gross weight flat cotton at Memphis. Tenn.) October, 21.90c per pound; November, 21.95; December, 22.00; January, 22.05; February, 22.10; Mar., 22.15; April, 22.20; May, 22.25, and

Too many good citizens show an indifferent attitude toward proposed changes in our constitution-in many instances they do not even take the time to acquaint themselves with the amendments, and, therefore, cannot cast an intelligent vote.

One Amendment, HJR 18, would change up our present tax structure and bring it up-to-date. Constitutional tax limitations enacted more than half a century go are still in effect. Post-war work can be greatly enhanced by the adoption of this sensible change in our present out-moded system. At present we face an emergency with two alternatives. The Constitution of Texas limits county tax levies to 80c on each \$100 as follows: 25c for the general fund; 25c for the permanent improvement fund: 15c for the road and bridge fund: and 15c for the jury fund. This structure was set up when the constitution was adopted. It has had

Herein in the possibility of fin ancing future activities which might Entered as second class matter at require funds not now available, and the postoffice at Knox City, Texas, definitely unavailable except through an increase in rendition of taxable property.

An example: Any county facing distress in its general fund might increase the present statutory limit of 25c to 40c and compensate by reducing the levy for other funds, if nec November 7 should not allow their essary, to remain within the legal limit of 80c.

The plan is optional with all coun allocation. It merely authorizes such action where it is desirable. The tax structure of no county is involved except by special vote of authority

from each county's property owners. Not one dissenting vote was cast in either house of the 1943 Texas Legislature when this constitutional amendment was authorized.
