Large Crowd Hears Irrigation Specialist Speak at Munday

Dr. John Schrunk, irrigation specialist from Denver, Colo., discussed "Use of Irrigation Wat-er for Profit" before a group of 95 irrigation farmers and other interested persons from Knox and surrounding counties Munday recently,

Earlier in the afternoon, a tour was made by Dr. Schrunk and 36 persons, including James Simsons, district Extension agent, officials of the Burlington Halfway, and many irrigation farmers, to the farms of Herbert Partridge, Johnny Michels and B. E. Smith. During the tour Schrunk demonstrated a method of determining the amount of water penetration in an ditch system of irrigation. He also emphasized the importance of head pressure in maintaining an adequate pattern of water application with a sprinkler system

Dr. Schrunk's visit to Knox County was made possible by the Burlington Hailway and the Extension Service. He was accom panied here by R. C. Kuykendall, general agent for the Wiehita Falls Division of Burlington, A. K. Hepperly, general agricultus al agent for Burlington, and Macyl Orman, agricultural agent for the Ft. 


