City and County Offer Building to Knox City Scouts

Action on an offer to give the Boy Scouts of Knox City a long-term lease on a building will be taken at a meeting at the First Christian Church Monday night at 7 p. m., Scoutmaster Pearce J. Burns said this week.

The offer was made by the Knox County Commissioners Court and the City Council of Knox City. The city and county jointly own the building, which was formerly used for a transient labor camp.

Scoutmaster Burns said the offer is a very generous one, but some discussion is necessary and some committees will be appointed at the meeting Monday night.

The Boy Scout Court of Honor will also be held at the meeting, with an investiture ceremony for Tenderfoot Scouts. A number of awards will also be made.

Jimmie Lea and Danny Colwell will receive Second Class Badges. Receiving Tenderfoot badges will be Stanley Compton, Danny Fisher, Lanny Logan and Richard Averitt. Doyle Graham will receive Merit Badges for cooking, camping, life saving, swimming and nature.

There will be a Board of Review for those who want to advance.

Mr. Burns said the business meeting will be a very important one, and everyone interested in any phase of the Scouting program—Cubs, Scouts and Explorers—is urged to attend.

Mixed Roughages Not Approved Under Drouth Feed Program

Walter T. McKay, state director of the Farmers Home Administration, has informed Wilburn A. Satterwhite, county FHA supervisor, concerning the eligibility of mixed roughage under the Drouth Roughage Program.

The question has arisen over a great part of the state as to the inclusion of mixed roughage feeds in the program in the same manner as mixed grains are included in the Drouth Grain Program.

Mr. McKay quoted a memorandum received from K. L. Scott of the Department of Agriculture regarding the point, as follows:

"We have given careful consideration to this and other requests to include mixtures of various roughages and other products, such as meals, molasses, proteins, etc., as eligible roughage and feel that to do so would bring about a conflict between the feed grain and roughage programs. Since the combinations we have considered to be more properly classified as mixed feeds rather than roughages, we can see no basis for their inclusion in our roughage programs."

Rochester Woman Dies From Burns

Mrs. P. P. Martin, 82, of Rochester died in the Knox County Hospital Tuesday at 8:45 p. m. of burns she received Tuesday morning. Gas exploded as she was attempting to light a heater in her home, it was reported.

She suffered second and third degree burns. The explosion occurred in her bedroom. Neighbors heard the blast and found Mrs. Martin standing just outside her back door with her gown on fire.

John Smith Named Demo Nominee for Assessor-Collector

At a meeting of the Knox County Democratic Executive Committee today, John A. Smith was unanimously elected Democratic nominee for the office of county tax assessor-collector. Leroy Melton, committee chairman, announced.

Smith's name will be on the ballot in the general election November 6, Melton said.

Smith, who had previously worked in the tax office, is now serving as assessor-collector under appointment by the commissioners court. A vacancy occurred in the office when M. A. Bumpas Jr., who had served in the office for several terms and was recently nominated for another four-year term, was accidentally killed.

Supt. Silk Reports On Building Program

A total of \$103,779.89 has been paid out of the Knox City School Building Fund, leaving a balance of \$96,605.11, Supt. Chas. E. Silk told members of the school board this week.

The building fund totaled \$200,385.00, with the \$200,000.00 bond issue being boosted by the sale of a number of sewing machines for \$365 and of two desks for \$20.

Expenditures reported by Mr. Silk were as follows:

Wm. N. Edwards Co., \$1,400.00; Texas Contractors, \$31.00; Wilson, Patterson & Associates, \$7,671.51; Baco Industrial Company, \$73,246.50; Graham Electric, \$2,767.50; Rowland Plumbing Co., \$12,938.52; and Furniture, \$5,724.86.

Remaining to be paid on the contracts for the new high school are Baco Industrial, \$52,553.50; Graham Electric, \$5,592.50; Rowland Plumbing, \$6,261.48; and Wilson, Patterson & Associates, \$1,530.09. The architects receive 6 percent of all base contracts, totaling \$153,360.00.

The unpaid balances total \$65,937.57.

Oil Field Worker Critically Burned

George R. McIlroy, 37-year-old Continental Oil Co. production foreman from Haskell, is in the Knox County Hospital after being critically burned at 3 p. m. Tuesday on the Berry Lease southeast of Rochester.

McIlroy was still in a state of shock late Wednesday and his condition was listed as critical. He was pouring gasoline into an engine when the fuel ignited, burning him over half of his body.

Prevailing Wages For Cotton Pulling In County Set

Cotton pulling in Knox County is \$1.50 per hundredweight on irrigated land and \$1.65 to \$1.85 per hundredweight in dryland cotton, according to the Texas Employment Commission office in Wichita Falls.

The figures were effective Monday, Oct. 8.

The commission was advised of the wage findings by Ed McDonald, regional director of the Bureau of Employment Security in Dallas.

Knox County farmers have only until Monday, Oct. 15, to sign up for the 1956 Soil Bank Conservation Reserve, J. T. Gilpin, manager of the county ASC office, said Tuesday.

Under the 1956 program, acreage put in the Conservation Reserve must be put in for six years, Gilpin said. Acreage that has been in non-controlled crops is eligible, but the acreage must not have been harvested or grazed during the entire calendar year.

Farmers should prepare a list of their acreage and crops in 1954 and 1955 before submitting their applications, the ASC manager said.

In Knox County the payment for land in the conservation reserve will be \$12 per acre per year.

The Sid Katz No. 1 A. P. Denton, wildcat test northwest of Knox City, was drilling today below 3235 feet. No tests have been made.

New locations staked in the county since last week include the Christie-Stewart No. 1 C. A. Hull, 3 1/2 miles west of Munday. Location is 330 feet from the west and south lines of west one-half of northwest quarter of section 6B, block 2, D&W Survey. Projected depth is 2200 feet.

Christie-Stewart also spotted the No. 2 C. P. McAfee, a 2250 foot test two miles northeast of Knox City, 330 feet from north and east lines of D. G. Burkett survey No. 9 and 2250 feet northeast of No. 1 in the same survey.

Garvin Oil Co. of Dallas has staked the No. 1 Florence Bowden, 330 feet from the west and south lines of block 11, D. G. Burnett survey No. 8 A-14.

In Haskell County General American Oil Co. staked the No. 1 Jack Neathery, four miles southeast of O'Brien. Proposed depth is 4,900 feet.

Diamond Drilling Co. No. 1 Hewitt, a re-entry project two miles east of O'Brien, has been completed as a well in the O'Brien West Strawn field. Daily potential was 40.28 barrels of 38.5 gravity oil, plus 60 percent salt water, pumping from 52 perforations at 5,068 feet.

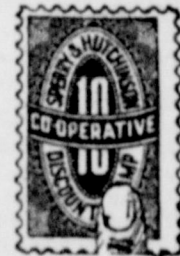

Ike Can't Make It Rain, But He's Still Best Man

The other day I asked a farmer if it was dry out his way. He said it sure was. "Looks like we just can't get any rain," he said. "Why, when Noah had his 40-day flood, we didn't get over half an inch."

There's no mistake about it, Texas is having itself a real drought. Some of the farmers and ranchers in our county are in such bad shape that they may vote for Stevenson.

Old Man Jones, from across the river, said he wasn't going to go to any such extreme. He said he needed rain as bad as anybody else. He claimed water was so scarce in his community that the preacher was baptizing new members with a wet handkerchief. But he was holding out awhile longer, anyway.

"I may be stubborn," said Old Man Jones, "but I just ain't been convinced that President Eisenhower is keeping it from raining."

He said he knew that Stevenson and Kefauver acted like they thought so, and they had a right to their opinion. Lyndon Johnson, he figured, knew better, but he was sticking with Adlai and Estes for the sake of unity. He said he didn't figure Mr. Sam Rayburn had known whether it was raining or not for the last 25 years.

"I hate not to go along with such a widely known crowd of weather observers," Old Man Jones said. "If there's anybody

who keeps up with which way the wind is blowing, generally speaking, it's Stevenson, Kefauver and Johnson."

Then he went on to say that he realized the national farm program hadn't pleased everybody—including him. If he was in the White House, he would do things different, at least in our county. He allowed that the \$61,000,000 spent by the Eisenhower administration for drought relief in Texas could have been doubled and still not made all the farmers happy and prosperous.

"But," said Old Man Jones, "I keep remembering that the main reason for our troubles, besides the drought, is the fact that we are not at war. Now, if Adlai and Estes really want to jump on President Eisenhower, there is a real issue. They've sure got the goods on Ike in that respect. If he hadn't stopped that Korean War, farm prices would be higher, no doubt. I wonder why they never mention that."

Old Man Jones was kidding a little, of course, in his usual way, but I think he had something there. We have got to adjust to peace-time, which is taking awhile but President Eisenhower is working at it. And meanwhile our boys aren't fighting and dying on foreign soil. It's worth thinking about.

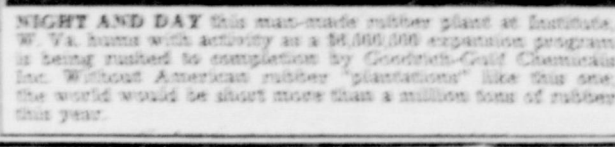

Large Crowd Hears Irrigation Specialist Speak at Munday

Dr. John Schrunck, irrigation specialist from Denver, Colo., discussed "Use of Irrigation Water for Profit" before a group of 95 irrigation farmers and other interested persons from Knox and surrounding counties in Munday recently.

Earlier in the afternoon, a tour was made by Dr. Schrunck and 36 persons, including James Simmons, district Extension agent, officials of the Burlington Railway, and many irrigation farmers, to the farms of Herbert Partridge, Johnny Michels and B. E. Smith.

Dr. Schrunck demonstrated a method of determining the amount of water penetration in an open ditch system of irrigation. He also emphasized the importance of head pressure in maintaining an adequate pattern of water application with a sprinkler system.

Dr. Schrunck's visit to Knox County was made possible by the Burlington Railway and the Extension Service. He was accompanied here by E. C. Kaykendall, general agent for the Wichita Falls Division of Burlington, A. K. Hepperly, general agricultural agent for Burlington, and Meryl Orman, agricultural agent for the Ft. Worth and Denver Branch.

During their visit here many of the farmers and business men were entertained at a buffet luncheon and dinner on the special railroad car furnished by the Burlington Railway.

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
