R. T. Picket Exhibits 45 Year Old Rattler



Above is Mr. R. T. Pickett, known widely as Uncle Tom, exhibiting a rattlesnake which he killed. The reptile had 45 rattlers and a button; he was six feet and a few inches long and had in himself a whole rabbit which he had just devoured before Uncle Tom found and killed him.

The rattler was killed in King county on Eagle creek in the Taylor pasture of the 6666 ranch. It was a hot afternoon in July, the 25th of July and immediately following the death of the snake, Uncle Tom drove to Knox City and exhibited him.

Uncle Tom started working on

the 6666 ranch 49 years ago and during those years he has killed many rattlesnakes; however, he states that this was among, if not the largest one he has ever killed.

Uncle Tom Pickett exhibited a letter this week which is an invitation to him to be a guest of Tom Green county for their convention on September the 17th and 18th. The convention is being held in the interest of cooperation and helpful suggestions in county government.

Bliss Dustin of Minnesota was in Knox City Sunday night and Monday to see Sid Liles.

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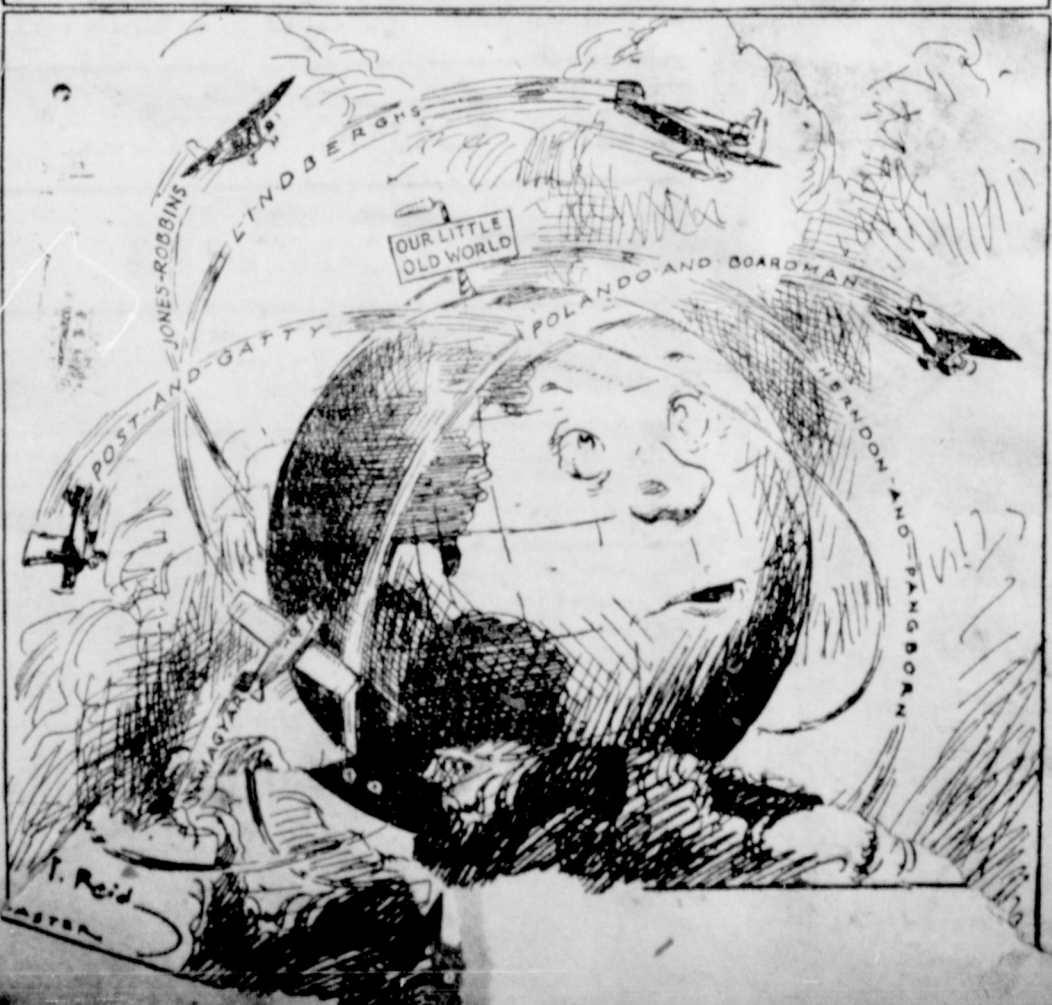
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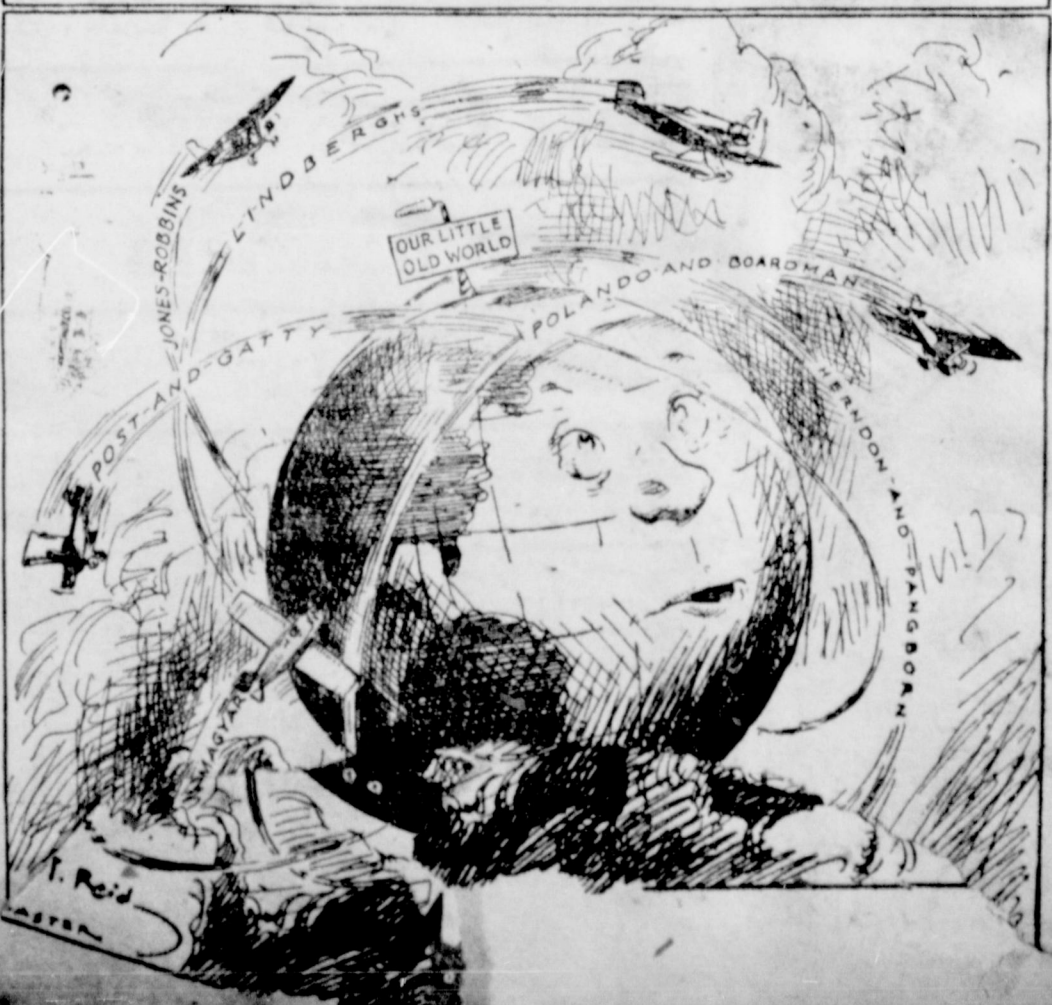
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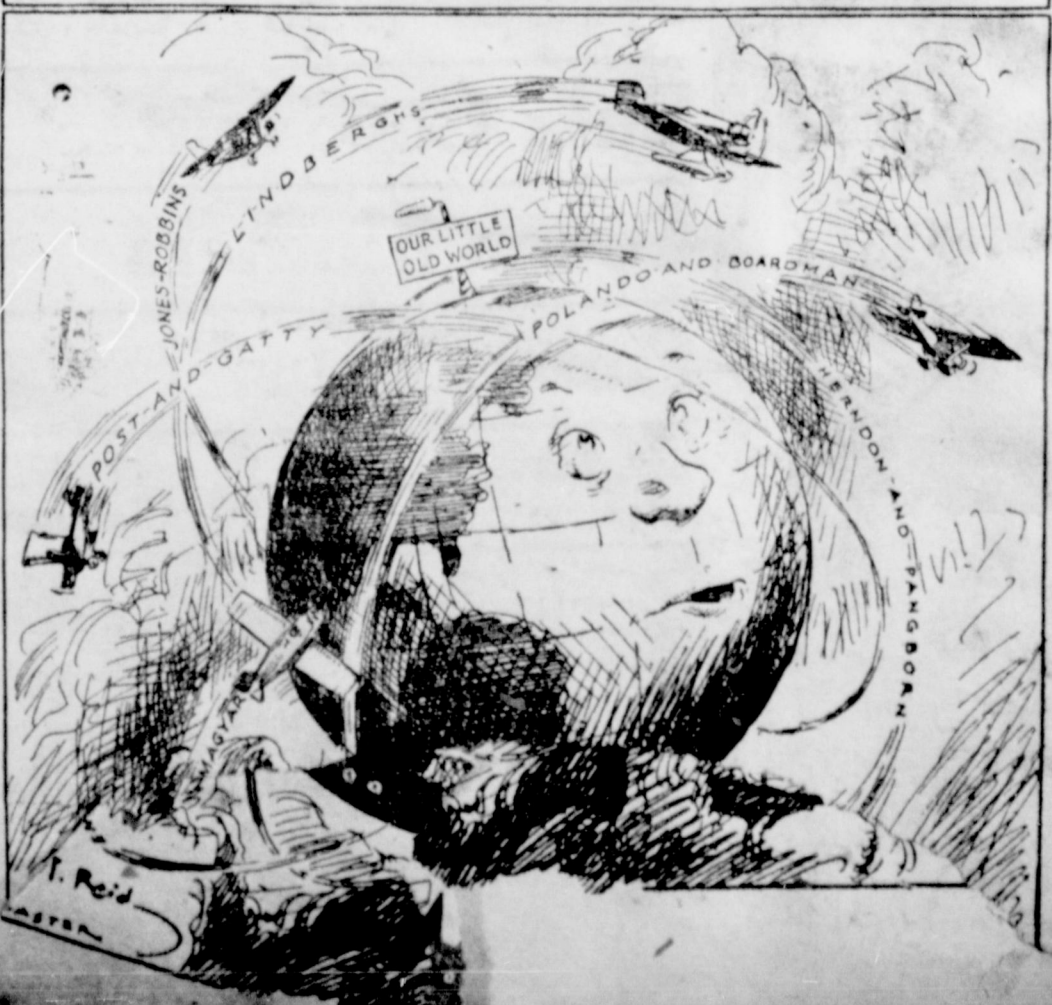
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Another Record on Firestone Tires

McDONALD SAYS COTTON SITUATION DESPERATE; URGES SPECIAL SESSION

Johnson City, Texas August 15.—Speaking before the Farmers Short Course here Saturday, August 15, J. E. McDonald, commissioner of agriculture, declared that definite and positive action in the cotton situation is imperative if a national crisis is to be averted.

"In a few short months," he said "this crop will have been harvested and sold at less than the cost of production. Our debts and taxes will not be paid, and the governors of our southern states will find it necessary to convene special sessions of the legislature to provide funds for the support of our government and schools. In other words, it will be a case of locking the barn after the horse is stolen.

"This crisis can be averted, and will have to be averted, either by the providence of God Almighty, in des-

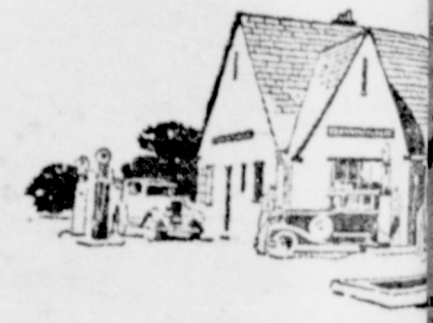
