Son of Local Couple To Receive PH.D. Degree

Joe Lynn Cash, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ottis Cash, has completed the work for his doctorate and the Doctor of Philosophy degree will be conferred May 13, 1972, by the Graduate School of Texas Tech University at Lubbock.

Joe's final examination for his Ph.D. was held Wednesday, February 9, at 2:30 p.m. His major area of study was English Literature from 1832 to the present, and his minor was Comparative Literature. Advanced courses in English Literature of the Eighteenth Century, the Romantic Movement, the Victorian Era, and the Twentieth Century provided the background for his interest in the area of his dissertation. Joe used "The Treatment of Women Characters in the Complete Works of Joseph Conrad" as the title of his dissertation abstract.

A native of Knox City, Joe graduated from Knox City High School in 1958. He entered Abilene Christian College and received the Bachelor of Arts degree in English in 1962 and his Master of Arts degree from Texas Tech University in 1967.

While a student at ACC, Joe was a member of Sigma Tau Delta, Kappa Delta Pi, Student Education Association, Blue Key National Honor Fraternity, Editor of the "A" (1962), Band, Art Club, Science Club, Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges (1962), and Outstanding Senior Student in Secondary Education (1962).

At Texas Tech, Joe was art editor for Conradiana, and was the recipient of graduate fellowships in 1968, 1969, and 1971. Joe was also a member of the Conference of College Teachers of English, National Council of Teachers of English, South Central Modern Language Association, and College English Association.
