In a Christian civilization, however, we cannot contemplate with equanimity a system which permits the aged to drag out their declining years in misery and want. The system of herding them into poorhouses lived for a century or two, but it put the stigma of pauperism upon all of the inmates.

Any system of old-age pensions, it seems to us, if it is to conform to the humanitarian spirit of the age, must apply to all alike, whether destitute or not. If a J. P. Morgan or Rockefeller reaches the pension age, he should get his monthly check out the same as the destitute day laborer or farm-hand. Only in that way will the stigma of pauperism be avoided.

## "EASY MONEY" IS GONE FOREVER

We hear a good many people talking about "Recovery" as if they believed that the aim and purpose of all the things that are being undertaken in the name of that commendable objective was to bring back the "easy-money" days of the later 1920's. We don't think that any thoughtful men, in or out of politics, expect and desire anything of the sort.

Those days were times when the hope and belief that there was some short-cut to riches pervaded a large section of the American people. We fear that there are many ambitious young men today who cherish the same sort of hope. We believe that most are doomed to disappointment.

To be sure, not many people actually did get rich in a hurry, but everybody, figuratively speaking, had a try at it. And enough achieved sudden wealth to inspire others with the belief that it was easy. As a matter of fact, it never was easy. The subtle simply didn't hear about the hard, patient work that those who succeeded did before riches began to come their way. They only heard of them after they had won their wealth.

We do not understand that there is a purpose, anywhere, to restore conditions under which anybody can expect or hope to get rich without working even harder for them than those who galloped them in the past worked. There always have been, always will be, a few to whom making money is a natural talent. Who under any social scheme, will always accumulate more than the majority.

And we believe that there are as many opportunities as ever, perhaps more than ever, for the accumulation of wealth.

It seems to us, however, that for a good many years to come there is going to be a much closer scrutiny of the means whereby men become wealthy, and important riches are not going to be earned except by those who, in earning them, do something which definitely benefits society as a whole.

## Today and Tomorrow

### BOOKS—The New Deal

People are not buying so many books, these days; but good books are selling more than they did. There was a period of several years in which any book would sell if it were only nasty enough, and a great number of prudent-minded would-be authors, who never had mastered even the rudiments of writing, broke into print with volumes which irresponsible publishers put out and which seemed to find a ready market.

That sort of literature is fading from the scene. In its place and vital questions, which people who are eager to know what all the economic troubles are about are rushing to buy.

To my desk come many books. In the past ten days I have received not less than six books discussing the New Deal from different angles. All of them worth reading, although I don't agree with all of the authors.

### HOOPER—his ideas

Liberals, whether they call themselves Democrats or Republicans, ought to read Herbert Hoover's book "The Challenge to Liberty." Mr. Hoover is not a liberal stylist. He writes plainly, directly and often bluntly.

It is hardly necessary to say that he doesn't approve of the New Deal. Many of its objectives, he agrees, as all sensible liberal-minded men agree are not only worthy but necessary. What Mr. Hoover fears is that, in trying to arrive at economic security by a short-cut, the American people may be sacrificing liberties which they can never regain.

What Mr. Hoover has to say about the tendency of bureaucracy to perpetuate itself and expand its functions arises from his own experience and observation. And what he says about the control of business by Government and what its consequences may be provides food for deep thought.

### WALLACE—an honest view

I have long maintained that the most perfectly-functioning brain in the Roosevelt Administration is that of Henry Wallace, Secretary of Agriculture. Mr. Wallace is capable of seeing both sides of any subject and of thinking things through to their logical conclusions.

Now Mr. Wallace has found time to write a book entitled "New Frontiers." It is not a compilation but a fresh record of events and issues as they have appeared to him as a member of the Roosevelt Cabinet.

Mr. Wallace, naturally, approaches his subject from a different angle from that from which Mr. Hoover views the Washington scene. I get the impression that he is not entirely satisfied with the ways things have worked out for the farmer, and if he had the shaping of a new Agricultural Adjustment Act it would be quite a different piece of work.

### CONSTITUTIONAL—Ten-parties

Another Wallace—Professor Schuyler C. Wallace, who holds the chair of Public Law at Columbia University, has written a book which gives to the average reader a clearer and more understandable picture of the New Deal than any single volume I have seen. Professor Wallace, while sympathetic, seems to have preserved a non-partisan, impartial point of view. To the facts about the various phases of the efforts of the administration he adds his own comments and interpretations, which I would hesitate to call plain and fairly stated.

For the average reader, this is perhaps the most generally useful book of the lot on my desk.

### CONSTITUTIONAL—from snaks

James P. Warburg, who was one of President Roosevelt's economic advisers until they parted company over the Administration's monetary policy, has written "It's Up to Us," a highly entertaining book on a little understood subject money and banking. Jim Warburg knows his subject. He says that the New Deal is like a calf with five legs but that because the American people wanted a five-legged calf.

Frank R. Kent, keenest and most penetrating of political observers in Washington, is out with a book called "Without Ojives." Anyone who wants to read the inside of the Washington developments is they occurred, and get a pen-picture of many of the personalities involved written in a racy, breezy style, would do well to read this one.

David Lawrence, as profound a thinker as there is in the ranks of journalism, in his "Beyond the New Deal" tries to follow through to the ultimate consequences of the more important efforts that are being made to achieve recovery.

### FIRST STEP TOWARD SAFETY

"The best way to fight fire is to stop the fire before it starts", should be one of the slogans for fire prevention week.

Losses and deaths can be greatly reduced by correcting building methods such as are used in all modern cities. Correct construction of the homes, business houses and other public buildings can figure importantly in loss reduction. It should be the interest of every citizen to obey the building codes, following all details in construction work. Engineers have spent large sums of money and have studied all types of material from a lasting and fire-resisting viewpoint, to recommend only the best in that line. The time has long past when fire fighting first started.

The majority of the homes are of frame construction, with the hollow spaces in the walls from ground to attic. A fire starting at any point quickly spreads throughout the building, being drawn upward through the flue, like openings or spreading downward by falling embers to lower levels.

Building codes recommend fire stops of incombustible material at each floor level, cutting off cellar or area under the house from upper part of structure. This provides a check against the spread of flames. Accidental fires in this type of building are usually confined to a small room and are easily extinguished. Less water is used to combat fires, another item of loss reduction.

Stairways and elevator shafts are instrumental in adding the spread of fires through buildings. These should be protected and constructed with incombustible material, and all doorways or openings should be provided with self-closing doors. A rapidly spreading fire that cuts off the escape of occupants of a building is the fire that proves disastrous to life.

Fire prevention education is having a beneficial effect in reducing the number of accidental fires.

This time of year, during Fire Prevention Week in particular, all citizens are urged to cooperate and reduce the number of fatal accidents as well as the great waste of physical property.
