Water Proposal Plans Submitted

Chamber of Commerce members representing Knox City at the Texas Water Development Board meeting in Abilene Monday were Joe Roy Smith, Sam E. Clonts, Doyle Graham and Charles Lankford.

Lankford, director of the Knox City C of C and also West Texas Chamber of Commerce, had the following report to make to Mr. Joe G. Moore, Jr., Executive Director of the Texas Water Development Board:

"I am Charles Lankford from Knox City, Texas, and I wish to make the following statement for the official record of this hearing. The people in our area in Knox County and adjoining counties are very concerned that the preliminary plan for proposed water resources developments in the Brazos River Basin did not include a reservoir on either the Double Mountain Fork of the Brazos, or at the junction of the Salt Fork and Double Mountain

Fork of the Brazos. This is an area which comprises one of the best and most productive farm economies of the state. During the past 15 years 82,365 acres have been developed and are currently being irrigated.

"An additional 125,000 acres could be irrigated in Knox and Haskell counties using gravity supply. We produce a wide variety of crops, such as vegetables, cotton, wheat, and grain sorghums. The cities of Rule, Rochester, O'Brien, Haskell, Knox City, Munday, Goree, Benjamin, Vera, Seymour, and other communities are dependent fully on ground water for municipal water supplies. Based on report of the U. S. Geologic Survey, the dependability of our ground water supply over a long period is doubtful. In addition to these needs, our people do not have any nearby source of recreation. There is no doubt of our need for surface water development.

"We do not believe adequate consideration has been given by our staff of our needs in this area. For many, many years, any plans prepared for the maximum water resources development of the Brazos River Basin in Texas included a reservoir on the Brazos either on the Double Mountain Fork, or at the junction

of the Salt Fork and Double Mountain Fork. For example, the U. S. Study Commission—Texas plan included the Seymour Site at the junction of the Salt Fork and Double Mountain Fork of the Brazos. This reservoir would be located in Stonewall County northwest of Rule, Texas. The proposal by the U. S. Study Commission included approximately 1 million acre-feet of conservation storage and approximately 1 million acre-feet of flood control storage. It was estimated that this reservoir would produce an annual yield of almost 100,000 acre-feet.

"At about the same time the U. S. Study Commission report was being prepared, the Texas State Board of Water Engineers—your predecessors—developed 'A Plan for Meeting the 1960 Water Requirements for Texas.' This plan also included a reservoir for our area. It was called the Seymour Site No. 2 and located a few miles upstream from the Seymour Site. This Seymour Site No. 2 was proposed on the Double Mountain Fork of the Brazos River primarily to miss the high salt concentration from the Salt Fork of the Brazos. It is our understanding, however, that much work has been done in developing methods for reducing the inflow of salts from similar areas in the upper reaches of the Red River. This treatment in all probability can be done on the Salt Fork of the Brazos as well.

We do not feel that this salt problem in itself is sufficient reason to drop a much needed major reservoir from the Brazos River plan.

"In our opinion, the Texas Water Plan, which you have presented here today, does not adequately consider the needs of our area, nor will the proposed plan, when developed, meet the needs. It is inconceivable that the reservoir in our area was dropped from this plan when the apparent need for it was proven in the two reports previously mentioned and our needs are even greater today than they were when these studies were made.

"We would like to object to the part of the Brazos Plan which deletes the Seymour Site and we request that the final Texas Water Plan include the Seymour Site at the junction of the Salt and Double Mountain Forks of the Texas Brazos River with proposed treatment to reduce inflow from the small salt contributing areas in the Upper Brazos.

"We appreciate this opportunity to present this statement." The above report was included in the minutes of the meeting.

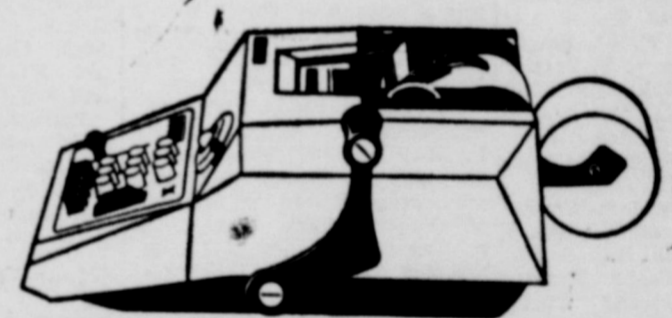

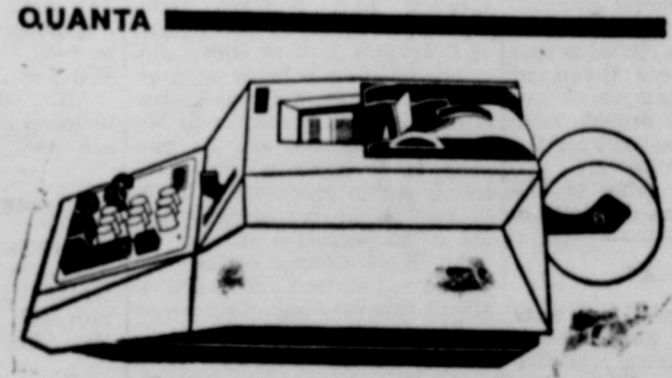

GI Bill Also Offers—

While most of the interest shown in the so-called new GI Bill of Rights has been concerned with educational benefits, there are certain little-noted provisions that give the 4-million veterans affected under the new law certain Civil Service job preferences.

They get five points added to their scores in Civil Service tests and 10 points if they were disabled or were awarded the Purple Heart, according to Jack Coker, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco.

In addition to the actual 5 or 10 points being added to their Civil Service test score, those veterans who have since January, 1955, thus become eligible for veterans preference in job selection. Prior to the enactment of the new GI Bill, veterans who served since 1955 did not receive veterans job preference even though they rated high on the tests, Coker said.

WILD WEST SHOW AND PORPOISE ACT NEWEST ATTRACTIONS AT SIX FLAGS
