DAVIS HOME BEING REMODELED

TEXAS OAT CROPP FROZE OUT

With the oat crop in central and south Texas froze out west Texas farmers will get a good price for their early maize and as Knox and adjoining counties produce and market the earliest maize grown, it gives us an advantage over other localities.

Maize heads are now bringing \$28 to \$30 per ton on the Fort Worth market. We are assured of \$20 or better for our early maize as soon as it is dry enough to ship. Just two or three years ago Knox City had shipped over 500 tons of maize before September 1st. This year we should do equally as well.

At the present price of cotton it is very discouraging to depend on it for a money crop. We have got to produce something that the buyer the public wants and market it ahead of the other fellow. The Plains country is planting more Kaffir and Hegaria and are not planting a great deal of yellow maize, because they can harvest the Kaffir with their combines and they cannot the maize. There is now a four to five dollar premium on yellow maize over the white varieties of grain sorghams. Make your plans now to plant plenty of early maize.
