JUNIOR CHAMBER OF COMMERCE CHANGE LIVESTOCK SHOW DATES AND DISCUSS OTHER MATTERS

Owing to the fact that Humphries Brothers, who have heretofore furnished a meeting place for the Junior Chamber of Commerce, have moved their tailor shop to the rear of the City Barbershop, temporarily, the meeting Monday night in Frizzell's Drug Store, of S. G. West and O. S. West, of the agricultural stock committees of the county fair and livestock show, presented the facts that it was the promoters of the show to complete arrangements for making the show a germine success, and would also give those who will have exhibits at the show more time to prepare for the same. It is probable, too, that more mild weather, which will be of great benefit to the livestock show, will be experienced from March 3 and 6. The appointments committee: R. H. H. Assistant Postmaster General Issues Statement to Rural Route Patrons

H. H. Billany, fourth assistant postmaster general, has issued the following statement to rural route patrons throughout the country, and desires that all of them read it and carefully consider its contents:

By direction of the Post Office Department, postmasters throughout the country have recently made an inspection of the rural routes from their offices. The purpose was that they might ascertain by personal observation and made report whether the roads used were in good condition for travel, the routes well arranged, boxes properly erected, so as to be easily reached by the carriers without difficulty and without obstructing travel, the carriers serving their routes as officially prescribed, the schedule observed, and whether the families served were satisfied with the service rendered, or there were improvements which could be suggested in the interest of the patrons or the Department.

It became necessary, in connection with the inspections, to request many patrons to take action to the end that their boxes might conform with the regulations as to kind, condition, location, or height, and in having the name of the owner plainly printed on them. Also, to bring to the attention of road overseers or other responsible persons the need for improvement in roads or repair or construction of culverts or bridges.

It is the desire of the Department, and its purpose, to provide adequate and convenient service, so far as may be possible, to all persons residing in rural communities, but this end can not be attained without the full cooperation of the patrons in the efforts of postmasters and carriers to serve them promptly, regularly and satisfactorily.

Whatever facilitates the work

of the carrier is of direct benefit to the patrons, for the more the ease and speed with which a carrier may cover his route, the earlier and better the service afforded.

So patrons of rural delivery can greatly help themselves by keeping their carrier, seeing to it that roads are kept in good condition and promptly opened after storms, by keeping the approaches to their boxes clear, and by promptly and willingly correcting any irregularities affecting their boxes when asked to do so.

Another great assistance that patrons can render carriers is by keeping themselves supplied with and using stamps instead of placing unstamped mail, with money for the purchase of the required postage, in the boxes. This delays the carrier and sometimes imposes a great hardship on him, especially in cold or stormy weather. If preferred, stamped envelopes, either printed or plain, may be obtained from the carrier, are of good quality, and cost but little more than the value of the stamps on them, and are ready at the value of the stamps.

Money for the purchase of money orders should not be left in the boxes, but should be handed to the carrier and a receipt obtained.

CHITA DISCUSSES THE K. K. K.

Chita Falls is often mentioned as "the city built by oil" and quite often spoken of as the "Texas Oil City," but the way that you take her, she is a fine little city that has a future of a great future. Chita Falls is now coming into the limelight for a discussion going the rounds as to the proper place for the K. K. K. Dr. Knickerbocker preached a sermon Sunday night in which he advocated "the tar and feather scheme" of righting wrongs. Others have entered the arena for the purpose of showing the wisdom of enforcing the written law.

When the public conscience is forced to accept the theory that the written law, founded upon the basic principles of constitutional government, should be replaced by secret prosecutions and executions, we fear for the destiny of the American people. We would favor and support stricter enforcement of the criminal statutes, but the citizenship of this great land and country can do no better than to sit as judge and jury in open court and pass upon the innocence and guilt of offenders.

When every man fully realizes that he, as a citizen, should aid and assist in the enforcement of the laws, by reporting offenses, and in every way possible assist in bringing criminals to trial, we will see a different condition in this country.

WHAT OF A BONUS?

You may object to paying the soldiers a bonus. You may think it is in dollars and cents and from your disapproval. You may be able to show a doubtful result of paying from the government treasury so huge a sum of money. But, my brother, will you stop and think for a moment what our soldiers suffered during the awful months of 1917-18 on the western front while you stayed at home and became prosperous?

Their wages are already high, 20 cents. Business has been hampered by exorbitant taxation, but for us we want to say that we would be willing to pay even a little more if that little should go to pay the needy soldiers. However, there is another viewpoint. Many and various ways may be devised of saving millions that have been worse than wasted that should be ample to take care of a soldier's bonus. Shall we so soon forget?



CARING FOR INDIAN FORESTS

Resources of Britain's Great Dependency Are Said to Be Well Worth Developing.

Forestry resources of India are not generally appreciated. Those of British India are vigorously exploited, but the observation does not apply to the same extent to the native states and it has been suggested that this is a direction in which the chamber of princes might adopt a constructive policy. In Jammu, Kashmir, Punjab, the Simla Hill states, Baroda, Mysore and Travancore the position is comparable to that prevalent in British India, but it is affirmed that more might be done in the development of the valuable type of forest such as teak trees so frequently on the plains of northern India and which has a direct bearing on the prosperity of the inhabitants in respect to fuel, grain and small timber. While it is impossible to expect native states to build up forest estates at great expense from a poor product, it has been proposed that a number of states might fairly combine to secure the services of the really trained expert who could advise on development and lay out a program which should look ahead for a term of several years.

HIGH COST OF EARTHQUAKES

Italy Has Been Called On to Expand Its Budget for Necessary Work of Reconstruction.

In the last 15 years, during which period Italy has been stricken earthquake 13 times, the Italian government has spent \$44,600,000 in repairs in the 25 provinces, including more than 1,000 towns and villages, which have suffered from the disasters. This sum is exclusive of the amounts spent for the reconstruction of public buildings destroyed. In view of the grave condition of the public finances and of the present high cost of materials, the government considers it the part of prudence to limit the budget requests for the continuation of the reconstruction work to a sum estimated necessary for the building to be accomplished in one year. About one-fifth of this sum will be used for the building of barracks and cottages to relieve the populations made homeless by earthquakes. Five million dollars is considered necessary for the construction of these dwellings, and the sum of \$17,520,000 is the estimation for the construction of other works of reconstruction.

"COBH," NOT QUEENSTOWN

Hereafter in sailing for foreign parts on a steamer that used to stop at Queenstown one will not stop at Queenstown, but at "Cobh." The Irish Free State has changed the name.

Whether one stops at Cobh (Queenstown) or at Queenstown (Cobh), he will be entertained to know that Cobh is pronounced Cove. It rhymes with stove; that is, when pronounced correctly.

Cobh has been officially adopted by the United States lines, which operate shipping board vessels, and the International Mercantile Marine, operating ships of the White Star line.

RELIQUARY MANY CENTURIES OLD

Recent Finds Made in Scotland Are Believed to Belong to the Bronze Age.

Archaeological finds have been made at Dunbar, Scotland. A small vessel of pottery was found in a grave in the churchyard and three short cists were discovered on the golf course. The vessel, which was of globular shape, with a wide mouth and short, constricted neck, was believed to belong to the Fourteenth century, and had, doubtless, contained holy water. The practice of depositing incense and holy water in clay vessels in graves was not an uncommon practice in western Europe during medieval times. That it was not unknown in Scotland is proved by the present discovery and by a few finds in graves of somewhat similar vessels which had contained incense. The Dunbar record, however, was important, as about ninety years had elapsed since the last analogous discovery was made in the country. Of the three cists, which apparently belonged to the Bronze age, one had been destroyed some years ago, another contained the remains of a human skeleton, and the third, which was of very small dimensions, a few incinerated bones. No relics were found with the human remains.

MECHANICAL CORNET

An ingenious soldier who is with the army of occupation on the Rhine has invented a mechanical cornet which anyone can play without previous instruction. He has made by hand an instrument which looks like an ordinary cornet. Hidden in the machine, however, there is a roll of cunningly cut paper which acts as do the rolls of the ordinary piano-player. The mere noise can blow into the mouthpiece of the cornet and produce tunes. The new cornet has only one key, and it is essential that it shall be depressed for the duration of each note. The mechanism and the roll of paper do the rest, so long as the player continues to blow into the mouthpiece.

ARABIC ON TYPEWRITER

An Arabic typewriter has just been built by an English firm at the invitation of the department of overseas trade, which has found agents for its sale in Egypt. The machine has a detachable keyboard and type which can be substituted by the alphabet of any language desired, and the carriage can be made to travel both ways, instead of only from left to right.
