If quotas are approved by at least two-thirds of the farmers voting in the referendum Friday, the wheat unit rate under the Soil Bank's Acreage Reserve in 1957 will be 60 percent of the \$2 national average, or \$1.20 a bushel, as a national average, with the usual differentials for local areas.

If quotas are disapproved by more than a third of the growers voting, price support on the 1957 crop will drop to 50 percent of parity. In that case, the unit rate for the Soil Bank would be 60 percent of the price-support level then in effect.
