

## Crusade Against Cancer Gets Underway This Month, House To House Canvas To Be April 11 at 6 p.m.

With the appointment of Mrs. Glenda Bateman as Crusade Chairman, the 1967 Crusade Against Cancer will get underway in Knox County this month.

In addition to the urgent goals of getting information about cancer into every household in the county, and raising the funds needed to continue cancer control activities throughout the state, volunteers for the ASC will have a new and important assignment.

The Cancer Education Survey will be conducted in Texas for the first time this year; an estimated 600,000 replies will be collected from households in every section of the state.

Here in Knox City, the Survey will be carried out by Crusaders during the House-to-House drive the night of April 11, beginning at 6 p.m. After householders have

been given the list of cancer's seven warning signs, they will be asked to fill out a brief, confidential form, asking questions about their own health practices. The completed forms can then be mailed back in the envelope provided and will be counted by volunteers in the District Cancer Society offices.

"This is really a two-fold project," Dr. R. G. Howell of the Knox County Unit Board has explained. "Not only do many householders need to be reminded through this survey of the need for regular health examinations, but the answers will also guide the Texas Division ACS in planning the most needed and successful educational programs possible."

Mrs. Bateman, Crusade Chairman, has seconded the enthusiasm

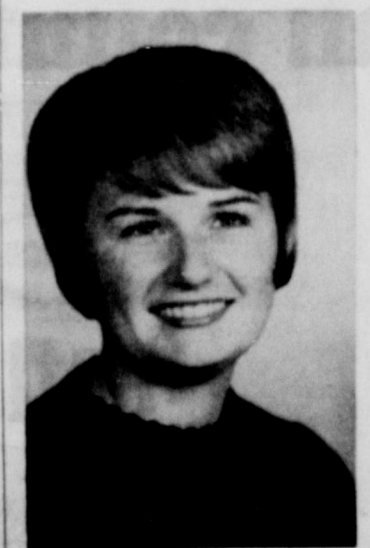

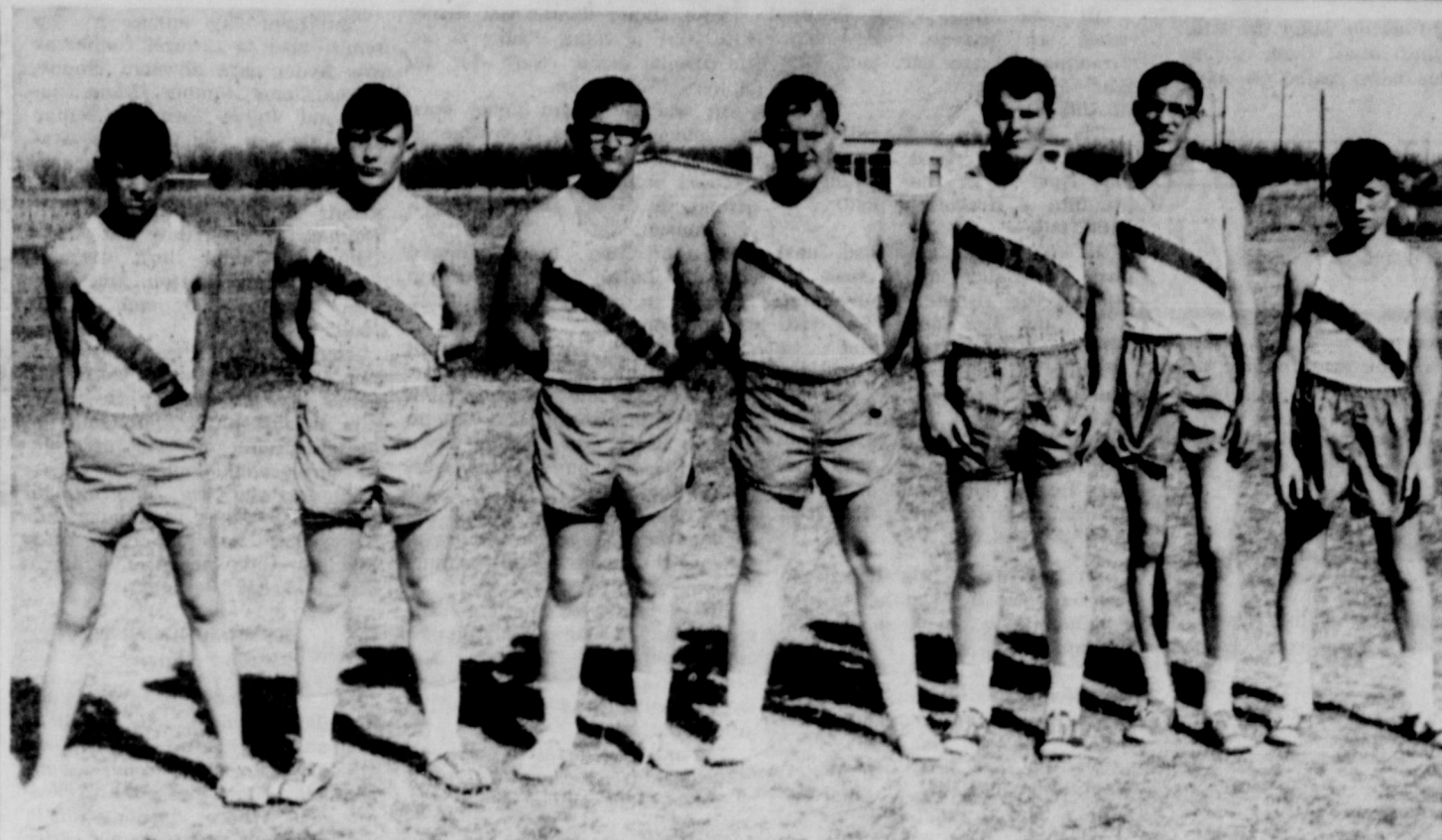
NANCY JO SMITH

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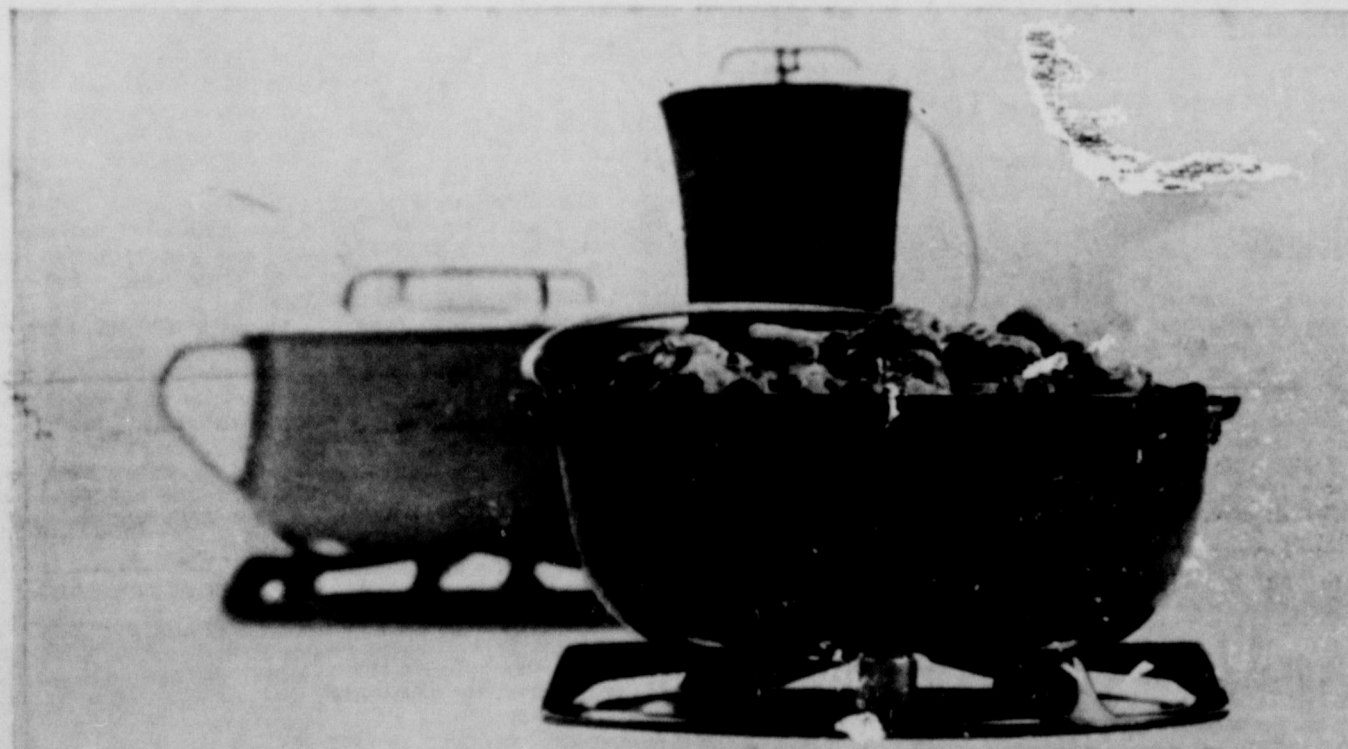

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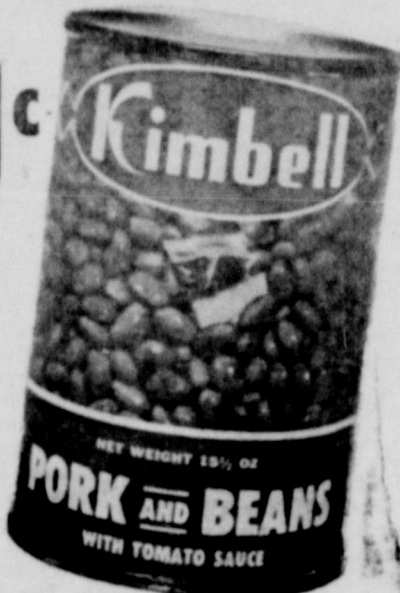

**Soil Conservation Co. Agents Report News ---**

The long quoted statement, "The wind blew and the sand flew", is appropriate terminology for describing the existing climatic conditions confronting the farmers and ranchers in the Knox City area.

According to Wesley Robbins, soil conservationist, working with district co-operators of the Wichita Brazos Soil and Water conservation district, that through the period Oct. 1, 1966 to Feb. 28, 1967 an official 0.81 inches of precipitation has been recorded. Checking the official rainfall record for Knox City, which dates back to 1935, it revealed some startling facts.

The 31 year average for this same period "October 1 thru 28" was only 1.28 inches of precipitation; with further study, it revealed that from Oct. 1 thru March 31 the average dropped to 1.24 inches and to April 30-1.34 inches, to May 31 an average of 1.66 inches of precipitation with the month of May averaging 4.00 inches of precipitation over this 31 year period. The rainfall for this period received so far this year is not too much below our 31 year avg. These records point out that we can almost be guaranteed a wind erosion problem during the six month period of October 1 thru March 31. Keeping this information in mind, the question as to the best method or methods of controlling wind erosion arises.

The larger more powerful tractors with more working speeds has made it possible for a farmer to cover more acres in shorter period of time and with the introduction of the "Sand Fighter" larger Disc Harrows and Chisel plows and other types of equipment that enables the farmer to cover acres of land on a days time has helped tremendously in controlling the "Erosion of Soil by Wind", providing there is enough moisture in the soil to make it stick together when a surface roughening tillage operation is performed, but the past 5 month period has been one where surface tillage operations performed to roughen up the soil surface to keep it from blowing have been very ineffective.

This has been a good time to study the effects of crop residue management and their effectiveness against the losses of soil through wind erosion.

Properly managed sorghum stubble or residues stops soil movement by wind before it can get started and keeps the soil from blowing, whereas a field adjoining it may be receiving tremendous amounts of damage by the blowing wind and eroding soil.

Different types of soil require different amounts of crop residues to be effective against wind erosion. Our coarse textured soils requiring the most on row planted sorghums approximately 2500 lbs. of residues acre should be managed on the soil surface through the critical erosion period around March 15th, or later, on moderately coarse textured 1750 lbs. acre and on the medium textured soils 1000 lbs. acre.

Tillage operations affected amounts of residues left on or near the soil surface. The use of chisels bury only 10 percent of the total residues on each operation, close space sweeps 15 percent, tandem disc 25 percent and the one way disc plow 50 percent. Sorghum stubble that is shredded after grain harvest needs to be tucked in by a tillage operation to keep it from blowing away and being lost. So next time the wind blows and the sand is flying will be a good time to observe the effectiveness of the use of crop residues against the loss of soil by wind erosion.

Residues have many uses for the conservation of moisture and others, but this winter period has been the one to put the emphasis on wind erosion control.

**Co. Agents Report- News ---**

With the arrival of warm weather and some moisture, livestock owners are reminded that the spring season poses a real threat for re-infestation of screwworms if ranchers relax their vigilance, say officials at Mission. They emphasize the importance of this case observation and urge producers to continue to treat all animal wounds. Collect worm samples and send them to the Mission Lab for positive identification.

Peach trees in the home garden can be protected from insects. Expensive equipment is not required and labor needed is not excessive considering the results obtained.

The following spray schedule is recommended. Spray the peach tree or trees with either Carbaryl (Sevin), malathion, methoxychlor or diazinon when 75 percent of the blossom petals have fallen. Make the second or shuck split application 10 days after the first application with one of the insecticides listed for first spray. Then 10 to 14 days after the second application make the third spraying with one of the recommended insecticides and 14 to 21 days later make a repeat application of the number three spraying.

The home gardener can do a satisfactory spraying job with a small power sprayer or a hand sprayer if close attention is given to the thorough coverage of the tree. It's important, to use enough spray to wet all fruit, leaf and bark surfaces.

Should infestations of fruit-damage insects occur following the completion of recommended spray schedule, Carbaryl can be used effectively up to within one day of harvest.

Insecticides are essential tools in the home garden; however, they should be used in accordance with the rate and safety directions printed on the container label.

It is well to remember, that Carbaryl may be applied to peaches up to one day before harvest; that malathion should not be used within 7 days of harvest; methoxychlor within 21 days of harvest and diazinon within 20 days of harvest.

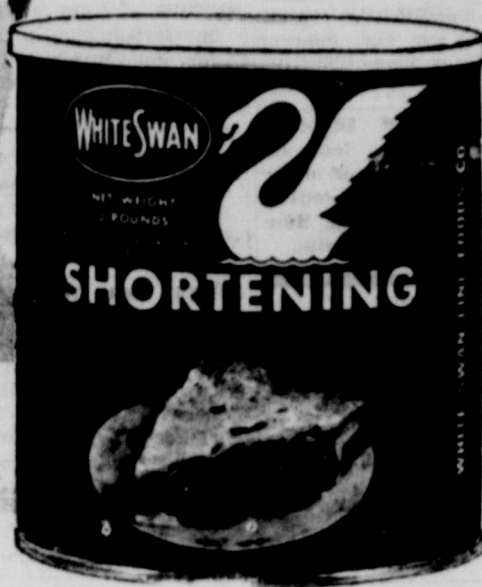

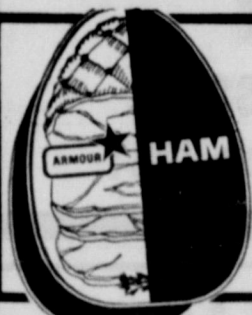

## Bond Sales For Knox County 33 Per Cent of Quota

W. E. Braley, chairman of the Knox County Savings Bonds committee announced today that February sales of United States Savings Bonds in Knox County totaled \$35,187. During the first two months of 1967 sales in Knox County totaled \$53,000 which is 33 percent of the 1967 goal of \$160,000.

During the first two months of 1967 Savings Bond sales in Texas

totaled \$29,451,247 which is 16 per cent of the state's goal of \$181.3 million and a 15.2 per cent increase over sales during the same period of 1966.

Nationally, the sale of Savings Bonds during the February totaled \$426 million and were 23 per cent higher than a year ago, and the highest for any February in 7 years. The January-February total was \$917 million, 12 per cent over sales for the first two months of 1966 and the highest January-February sales since 1963.

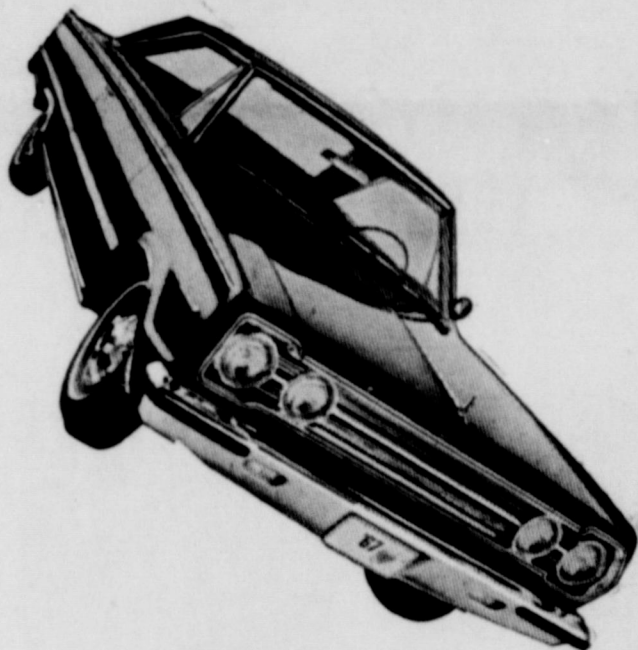

of her fellow volunteers about the survey. "We'll be giving something tangible to our neighbors in this project," she said, "because we're giving them a chance to help us understand what the greatest needs are in programs to reach all sections of the populations."

In line with the American Cancer Society's vigorous campaign against smoking, volunteers are seeking to discover how many people in each community smoke, how many have stopped smoking in the last year, and what the ages are in each group.

A follow-up survey will be conducted during 1968 to compare progress made through the Society's year-round programs of films, exhibits, pamphlets and speakers.

A survey of this size would be impossible by a health organization were it not for the tremendous cooperation of volunteers," Mrs. Bateman has commented. "The cost of the survey, as it will be carried out in each of Texas' 254 counties, will only amount to the cost of printing. All other services are rendered free by interested citizens in each community."

The goal for the 1967 Crusade in Texas is two million dollars, roughly a dollar for each Texan now living who will have cancer, if present trends continue.

The climate is hopeful, however, since one-half of all cancer victims could be cured, through early diagnosis and prompt treatment. To emphasize the vital need for regular, complete health examinations, the crusade this year will seek to reach every home in the community.
