## George W. Coats Jr. To Lecture In Europe

George W. Coats Jr., Professor of Old Testament at Lexington Theological Seminary in Lexington, Kentucky, will be visiting professor at Hamburg, Germany, from March through August of 1977. He will be lecturing on Genesis and conducting a seminar on an introduction to Old Testament theology.

The week of May 9, he has been invited to lecture at Cambridge, Oxford, and Sheffield in England, and at St. David's in Lampeter, Wales. His lectures will be principally on Moses.

Dr. Coats is now on sabbatical leave from the Seminary and will be pursuing his research in Germany while lecturing at Hamburg. A na-

tive of Texas, he is a graduate of Southern Methodist University where he received his B.D. in 1961 and is an ordained Methodist minister. Before coming to Lexington in 1968, he was professor of religion at McMurry College in Abilene, Texas, from which he graduated magna cum laude with the B.A. degree.

## Culler To Present Weekend Workshop

C. Warren Culler, a native of Abilene, will hold a watercolor workshop in O'Brien this weekend, March 11-13. Culler is familiar to Big Country artists, having won numerous awards, given demonstrations and judging area shows.

After several years as a commercial artist, Culler earned his Master of Fine Arts from the Instituto Allende in San Miguel de Allende, Guanajuato, Mexico and began eight years of teaching art at the college level. His most recent teaching position was at Western Texas College in Snyder. He is a member of the Southwest Watercolor Society, Texas Watercolor Society and Texas Fine Arts Association.

Last year Culler and his wife, Donna, opened Culler Studio near Bertram, Texas. The new studio is homebase for "Waterworks", watercolor workshops taught in communities throughout the Southwest. In addition, the studio is the scene of weekly classes in watercolor and drawing and a gallery showing the latest in Culler watercolors.

The local workshop will begin Friday, March 11, at 7:00 p.m. in the O'Brien Jr. High cafeteria. Culler will have a slide presentation, display some of his finished watercolors, and demonstrate a watercolor painting, start to finish. The Friday evening demonstration is open to the public for a small fee.

Classes are Saturday, March 12, 9:00 to 12:00 and 1:00 to 4:00, and Sunday afternoon 1:00 to 4:00.

Each student will produce three paintings during the weekend workshop.

# Rehab Center Offers Help To All

A young adult who suffers a crippling illness or accident needs expert help regardless of his ability to pay for it.

So West Texas Rehabilitation Center at 4601 Hartford in Abilene has a major program for young adults, and they are a special group there as they and therapists work to rebuild their lives.

Mike Williams, a young machine shop employe in Abilene, and Monte Gardner, a fisheries research man from Clyde, are two of them.

Williams, 20, fell from a rooftop last September and broke his right leg above the knee.

"I was putting up a weathervane as a favor for a lady who was in the hospital," he said. "I fell off, and I joined her in the hospital."

He has been coming to the Center to rebuild his leg and work the stiffness from his knee since the cast was removed seven weeks ago.

Gardner, 36, a fisheries technician for the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife, broke both femurs or thigh bones in a horseriding accident last August 31.

"We hit a tree, and the tree came out the best," he said.

He came to the Center December 28 in a wheelchair and now is walking with crutches and slowly regaining his mobility.

"Without a place like this, I don't know where I'd be today," he said. "Probably still in a wheelchair."

Patsi Albert, a young married woman from Abilene, and Gary McLane, an oil field worker from Denver City, are also starting their lives over again at the Center.

Mrs. Albert, 23, and her husband Paul were moving to Abilene from Orlando, Florida, last March 10 when their pickup truck went out of control and smashed up near Lake Charles, Louisiana.

She suffered compression fractures of her spine and was paralyzed completely for two months.

She mentioned her therapist, Dolores Poyner, and the director of patient services, Bill Snowden, as instrumental in her continuing recovery.

McLane, 23, was going through an intersection in Denver City last September 17 when the motorcycle and car were in collision and he suffered almost fatal injuries.

He had a broken leg and shoulder, a broken finger and

severe head injuries which left him in a coma for 25 days in a Lubbock hospital.

"They didn't expect me to make it," he said. "The doctors didn't give my parents any hope."

He still has no recollection of the accident.

Other young adults undergoing treatment are Danny Williams, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Coy Williams of Route 5, Abilene, who suffered a spinal cord injury in an automobile accident last Labor Day weekend;

# Arthritis Strikes Infants

LUBBOCK -- "At least a quarter of million children, from eight weeks of age to late adolescence, suffer from a form of Rheumatoid arthritis," reports Bruce R. Bartholomew, M.D., Medical Committee, West Texas Chapter of The Arthritis Foundation.

These children are afflicted with a form of the disease called juvenile rheumatoid arthritis, a painful, inflammatory disease that attacks one or more joints in a child's body. While primarily a joint disease, JRA can cause serious damage to the heart,

kidney, liver and eyes in some cases.

Less than 25 years ago, the medical picture was bleak for children afflicted with arthritis: One third dies; one third became severely crippled; and the other third were in constant pain. Today, thanks to new treatment advances, childhood arthritis can be controlled and 70 percent of its victims overcome the disease.

"Unfortunately, there are only 30 physicians in the U.S. who are fully trained both in arthritis and in pediatrics," Dr. Bartholomew pointed out.

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

**FOR SAFETY SAKE**  
Be sure control is "off" before reaching into your washer. If one is necessary, use only a heavy duty extension cord. Be sure your washer is grounded. Keep dry cleaning agents, color remover and fabric softeners out of your washer. It's a good idea not to wash clothes containing cleaning fluids in your washer.

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## KC Women Return From Caribbean Trip

Alma Culwell and Sammie Carpenter recently returned from a Trans-Panama Canal Cruise and the Caribbean Sea. The trip was planned and directed by Intrav, a company which coordinates trips for different groups. This particular trip was for the Texas Medical Association and most of the passengers were doctors and their families. Mrs. Culwell's son, Jerry, is a physician in Irving.

Mrs. Carpenter accounts for their exciting and interesting trip in her own words: "The Dallas area people flew to Houston where the ones from that area boarded the DC 10 of Trans International Airlines and flew to Balboa, Panama.

Itinerary for the trip covered the very best of the Caribbean, northeastern South America and the incredible transit of the Panama Canal. "There is nothing comparable to being at the sea. The pace of shore-bound life is left behind and the do-as-you-please atmosphere, crisp salty air and warm sun are invigorating tonics. The crew and staff on the Greek ship, the Stella Oceans, were efficient and courteous with the stateroom being comfortable and clean. Each room was carpeted and air-conditioned with telephone service and channeled music. Vacationing on a cruise ship is calming and exciting and there is always excitement at the approach of each new port of call.

"The first highlight of the cruise was the transit of the Panama Canal which separates the Pacific Ocean from the Caribbean. The story of the construction of the Canal is one of the richest sagas of the United States history. The story is awesome; 35,000 men labored 30 years; each of the six locks containing more than 65 million gallons of water through which the ship is towed by six electric locomotives known as mules. The route of the ship passed through Gatun Lake dotted by tiny islands. At times the dense jungle seemed close enough to touch. Even crewmen who have made the crossing dozens of times are fascinated.

The first stop of the cruise was on the San Blas Islands inhabited by the Cuna Indians. These Indians are among the smallest people in the world. There women wear vivid colored clothes, body paint and gold rings through their noses and the women are the head of the family.

"The approach to Cartagena, Colombia was breathtaking. There was an interesting tour of the old walled city

and the 400 year old fortress of San Felipe and the new modern part of the city.

"The captain's traditional cocktail party was held the second night and the formal dress for both men and women was a great contrast to the costumes many passengers wore two nights later at the Masquerade Party.

"The next port of call was the island of Aruba in the Netherland Antilles which was a bit of Holland found in the New World. The people were hospitable and polite, the language is called Papiamentu which is a mixture of Dutch, Spanish, Portuguese, and English.

"The approach to La Guaira, Venezuela was a pleasant sight which is a short drive to Caracas. The city of Caracas is beautiful, cool, modern and progressive and a trip to be long remembered." Granada, which was the next stop, is known as the spice island. One-third of the world's supply of nutmeg is grown here. The vegetation on the entire island was beautiful and the beaches were fascinating.

For the passengers, it's an eating marathon with early morning breakfast, mid-morning tea luncheon, mid-afternoon snack, dinner, and midnight buffet. The waiters have a great sense of humor and always seem to remember the small but important likes and dislikes of everyone while the ship sailed in the Atlantic, Caribbean and Pacific."

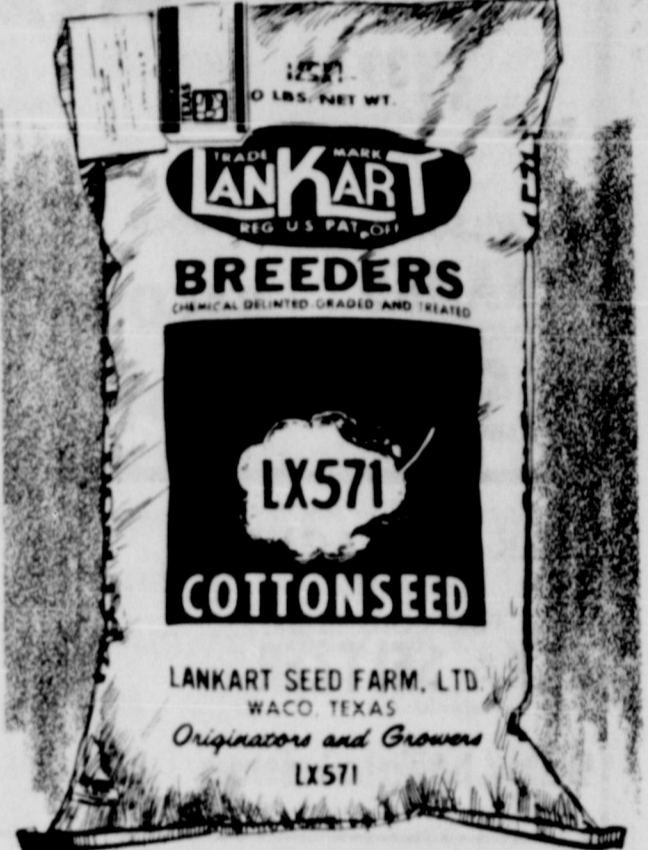

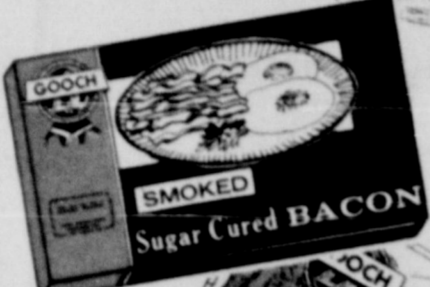

## Your Social Security

Each year hundreds of Medicare beneficiaries have their medicare benefits delayed! Many patients do not receive their medicare payments timely and their doctor bills must go unpaid for long periods of time!

Why? Simply because many people do not complete their medicare claim forms correctly. This is the major problem the Social Security Administration has in processing medicare claims.

Both patients and doctors can avoid this unnecessary delay. The medicare claim form SSA-1490 (Request for Medicare Payment) has only six simple questions that need

to be completed in most cases. Patients should take care in answering these first six questions. It is surprising how many people miss the first question by misspelling their own names!

An often missed and very important question is "What is your claim number?" This claim number should be copied directly from one's Medicare card. Be careful not to copy this number incorrectly. A wrong claim number will delay the claim for several days, if not longer.

The answer to number six is the claimant's signature. If the form is not signed, it will be returned for his signature, causing another delay. The claim cannot be processed unless it is signed.

The remainder of the form does not need to be filled out if the claimant has an itemized bill from the doctor or the hospital. If you have no itemized bill, the doctor should complete and sign the bottom half of the form.

If the claim is for payment on the rental or purchase of medical equipment such as wheelchairs, hospital beds, or other devices, then a signed statement by the doctor should be included with the claim to show why the equipment is necessary. A doctor's prescription will suffice if it indicates the need for the equipment.
