

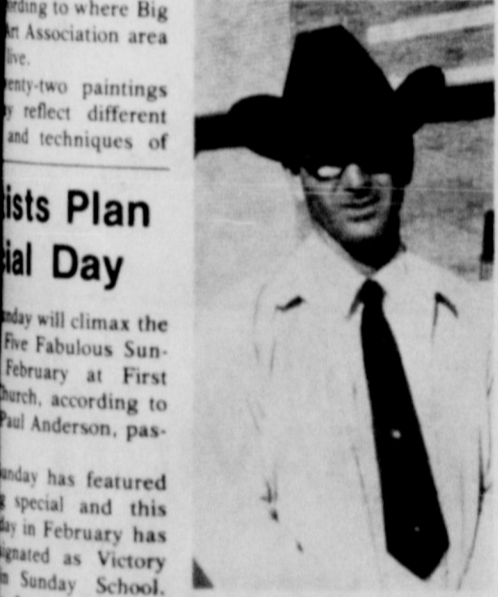

## City Clean-Up Set March 1-6

The City Council has designated March 1 through March 6 as "Clean-Up Week" in Knox City, in cooperation with the Knox City Study Club and the Knox City Garden Club who have joined forces to promote the city-wide effort.

Other organizations assisting with the campaign include the Knox City Lions Club, the Boy Scouts, the Chamber of Commerce, the Volunteer Fire Department, and the KC Schools.

All residents of the city are urged to repair and clean up their properties.

The city will haul off all junk and rubbish placed near the alleys; however, everyone who can is encouraged to haul

off his own in order that the city truck can be used for those without transportation.

The city has been busy for several months removing dirt and grass from curbs and gutters, widening unpaved streets to their legal boundaries, and cleaning rubbish from right of ways, according to Mrs. Faye RAILSBACK, city secretary.

Park tables, benches, and water fountains have been repaired and the park fence is presently being repaired. The Kennel and the swimming pool building, shelters and benches are being painted, and plans are underway to erect a flag pole in the park. Mrs. RAILSBACK said.

## For 60 Days City To Provide Ambulance Service

With the recent announcement by Smith Funeral Home of Knox City and McCauley-Smith Funeral Home, Inc. of Munday that they would discontinue ambulance service in the near future, plans to provide ambulance service have been underway.

Several meetings have been held to work out a solution to this most important item of interest for Knox County, the Knox County Hospital District, Munday, Goree, Benjamin, Knox City, and other communities within the county.

Officials learned that it is not any one agency's legal responsibility, but all groups concerned feel that this is a service the communities must have.

Since Smith Funeral Home will discontinue service February 29 and since no county-wide plan has been worked out, the City of Knox City has agreed to furnish ambulance service for sixty days or until satisfactory arrangements can be made. Effective March 1, the ambulance service phone number will be 688-3376.

Hoping that a plan can be worked out toward a volunteer service, officials were in Idalou and Ralls Wednesday of last week to check into their volunteer service, a system that has worked well for both of these communities for several years. The City of Knox City is making plans to pattern a plan after theirs and is in the process of setting up first aid classes. Making the trip were Faye RAILSBACK, city secretary-manager; Sam E. Clonts, County Judge; Glen Rumley, Knox County Hospital administrator; and Walter Hertel, city administrator of Munday.

## Benson Files For Re-Election

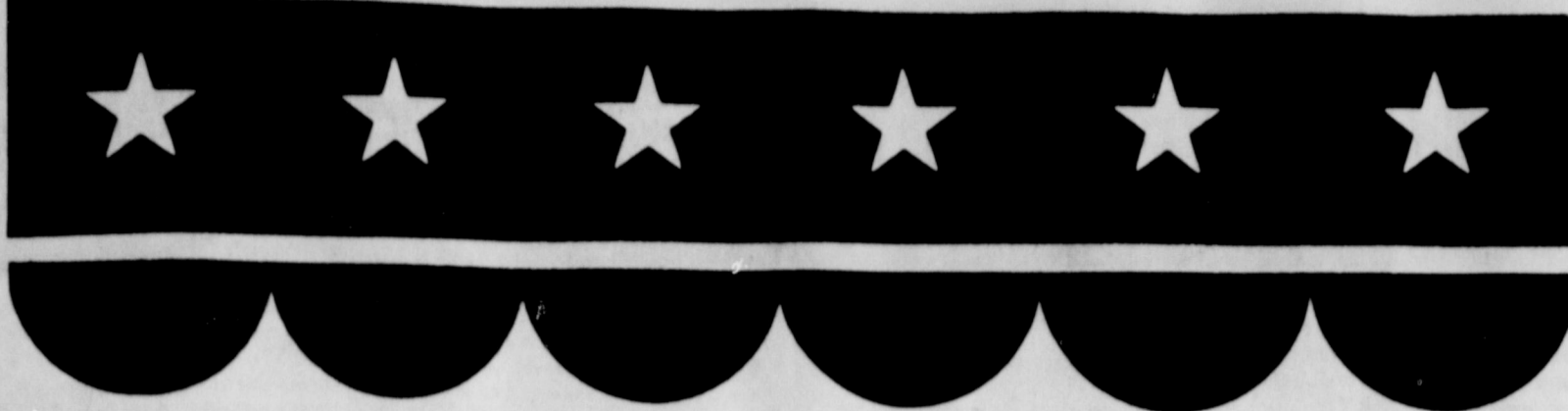
