Cotton will take the spotlight in Knox City September 11-17 the dates of the "Cotton Promotion Week" here designed for the dual purpose of bringing people into town and to create more interest in cotton products. The event also will put emphasis on the uses of cotton, cotton seed, farm machinery and equipment.

"Get behind the production of cotton—wear Cotton—and use cotton," said Charles Stenholm of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers Association earlier at a meeting held for the purpose of setting up Cotton Promotion Week. Cotton Promotion Week is being sponsored here jointly by the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers Association and the Knox City Chamber of Commerce.

### COTTON IS KING

When the Cotton Program unrolls here on next week slogans, window displays and other advertisements of cotton will be prominent throughout the town. It is expected that businesses will cooperate by not only decorating windows in cotton products but that their clerks and helpers will wear hat bands and streamers welcoming visitors to the city or in some other way banner the week's activities. The tags, streamers or hat bands to be worn will read as one of the following: "Welcome to Knox City" and "Cotton is King."

### DISPLAYS OPEN FRIDAY

The production will step into high gear on Friday, September 16 when exhibits will open in the American Legion Hall and in the Cobb building downtown. Among the exhibits will be the Fancy Cotton Needlework Exhibit, which will be of particular interest to the ladies of the area and of equal attraction to all will be the students' posters on cotton. These will be made by junior high students from schools throughout the county. Both of these exhibits will be shown all day at the American Legion Hall on Friday and Saturday.

Taking the attention of the men and others will be the farm machinery equipment exhibit near the American Legion Hall which will open on Friday morning and will continue through the remainder of the week.



in the plot and will be harvested separately. The results will be run through a computer at Texas A&M and the results will be used by the Soil Testing Labs in making recommendations for fertilizer.

So that more farmers will have a chance to see the plots and note the difference before harvest, a field day has been planned for Friday, Sept. 9, at 8 a. m. The farm is located 3 miles west of Knox City on F. M. 143 then a quarter mile South on FM 2279.

The tour will last less than an hour. Dr. Mulkey will be present for the tour.

At present time some of the plots are ripening while others are just in the bloom stage. It is sometimes surprising what a difference fertilizer can make. Make plans now to attend this field tour and see for yourself these results.

The water in an irrigation ditch or farm pond may look cool and inviting on a hot summer day, but a dip in either version of the old swimming hole could be a health hazard.

Disease organisms are sometimes present in water frequented by animals or contaminated by animal waste.

Leptospirosis is the disease that commonly spreads in this manner. The disease is present in livestock and is occasionally contracted by man.

A main goal to which animals have access could be even more dangerous as a source of possible infection than running water in an irrigation ditch.

Leptospirosis is caused by slender, spiral organisms so small they can be seen only through a high-power microscope. The organism can enter the body through a break in the skin or through healthy mucous membranes of the mouth, nose or eyes.

The disease apparently is transmitted to man through contaminated food or water.

As for that swim on a torrid day, we would advise for safety, do not swimming in places approved by the local health department.

Deferred grazing is one of the best means of utilizing the maximum forage production of a ranch.

The stocking of a ranch must be flexible enough so that a deferred program can be set up to allow from a sixth to a fourth of the total ranch acreage to be deferred during each growing season, from 4-6 months. The other pastures on the ranch should not be overgrazed while trying to improve one pasture.

Deferred grazing refers to the practice of removing livestock from grazing various parts of a ranch while other parts are being grazed at various seasons of the year. At least, 2, 3, or 4 pastures are necessary to establish a systematic plan. Only one herd of livestock is moved at any one time from a grazed to a deferred pasture.

Some of the benefits from deferred grazing include the establishment of new plants, restoration of vigor of old plants, internal parasite infestations, improved range conditions, re-establishment of plant varieties and allows for increasing stock rates.

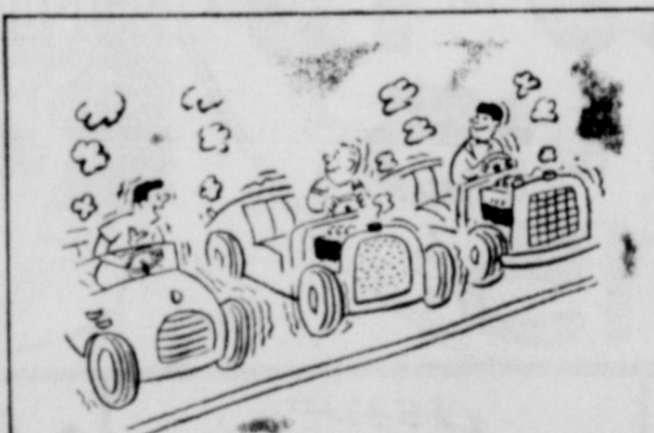

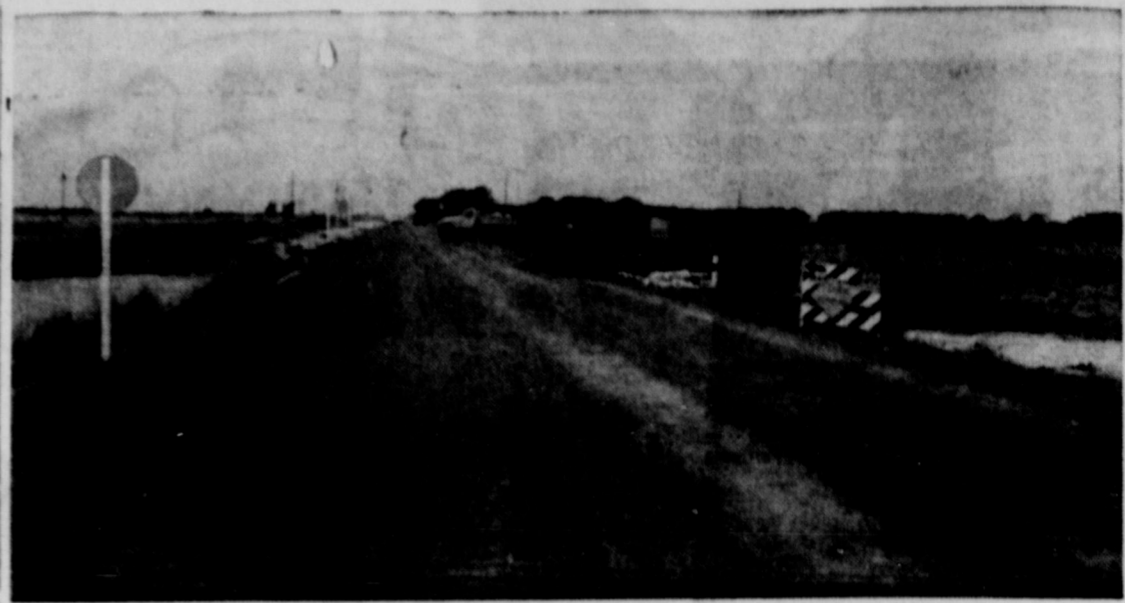
