## Program Tonight to Climax School Week Observance

A program in the Knox City school auditorium tonight (Thursday) will climax local observance of Public Schools Week in Texas, and school officials urged every one to attend the affair, which will begin at 7 with a 30-minute prelude by the school band.

About 90 percent of the student body will participate in the program, which will include numbers

by the Junior Band, the high school chorus and the various classes in school.

Supt. Chas. E. Silk will speak on "The Future of Our School System." Jimmy Seal Dutton will give the history of public schools in Texas, and Glenda Givens will give the history of Knox City schools. Barbara Egenbacher, high school senior, will speak on "Life in Knox City Schools."

Midway in the program there will be an intermission. Supt. Silk said, at which time anyone may feel free to come or go.

Other activities during the week included "visitation day" at the school today and presentation of an assembly program by the seventh grade. Supt. Silk, Miss Egenbacher, and Director W. J. Morris and the Beginners Band presented the program at the weekly luncheon of the Knox City Lions Club Wednesday.

Hollis and Newbrough filed the petition with County Superintendent M. D. McLaughlin Wednesday, and it is awaiting consideration by the county board.

## Knox City Man Killed Tuesday in Truck Accident

Funeral services were to be held at the Church of Christ in Quannah at 2:00 p. m. today (Thursday) for H. E. (Benny) Northam, Jr., 34, who was killed in a truck accident near Guthrie Tuesday.

Northam, an employee of Shell Oil Co., had been a resident of Knox City about two months, moving here from Odessa. He is survived by his wife and a 20-month-old son, Ken, and by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. B. E. Northam of Quannah.

The accident occurred about 12:30 p. m. Tuesday three miles east of Guthrie. Northam was driving a truck which collided with an empty cattle truck driven by Stanley Duane Scott of Lubbock, who suffered only minor injuries. According to investigating officers Northam was traveling east and Scott west on Highway 82 when the two trucks crashed together at about a 45-degree angle. Northam's truck burst into flames, and his body was taken from the flaming wreckage.

Assisting in the investigation of the accident were Sheriff Dub Hollar of King County, Sheriff H. T. Melton and Deputy H. C. Stone of Knox County, Patrolman M. W. Crigler of Paducah, Patrolmen Bill Jones and George Garrett of Seymour, and Sgt. Ralph Atkins of Wichita Falls.

The Benjamin Fire Dept. answered a call to extinguish the blazing truck.

## Highway Dept. to Let FM 143 Paving Contract

The long-sought paved "cut-off" from Knox City to U.S. Highway 82 at a point between Benjamin and Guthrie will at last become a reality sometime this summer.

Six miles of the road—Farm Road 143—has been paved for some time, and the State Highway Department is advertising for bids this week on paving the remaining 11.115 miles, which is in Knox and King counties.

The contract will be let March

20, and work will begin in thirty days or less and be completed in 160 working days, according to Herbert Cunningham of Munday, resident engineer. Cunningham added that all right of way has been secured, and work of clearing and removing fences and REA lines will be completed before time for the paving work to begin.

Paving of the cut-off was approved by the Highway Department in November of 1954. Approved at the same time was 6.2 miles of paving from a point on FM 143 0.3 mile west of the Union Creek bridge southwest. This heavily-traveled road serves the Katz oil field and Stonewall gas plant area.

Cunningham said he has completed plans for this paving as well as for a new Union Creek bridge. The plans will be submitted to the Department and will probably be in the May letting, he added.

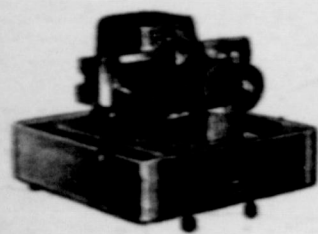

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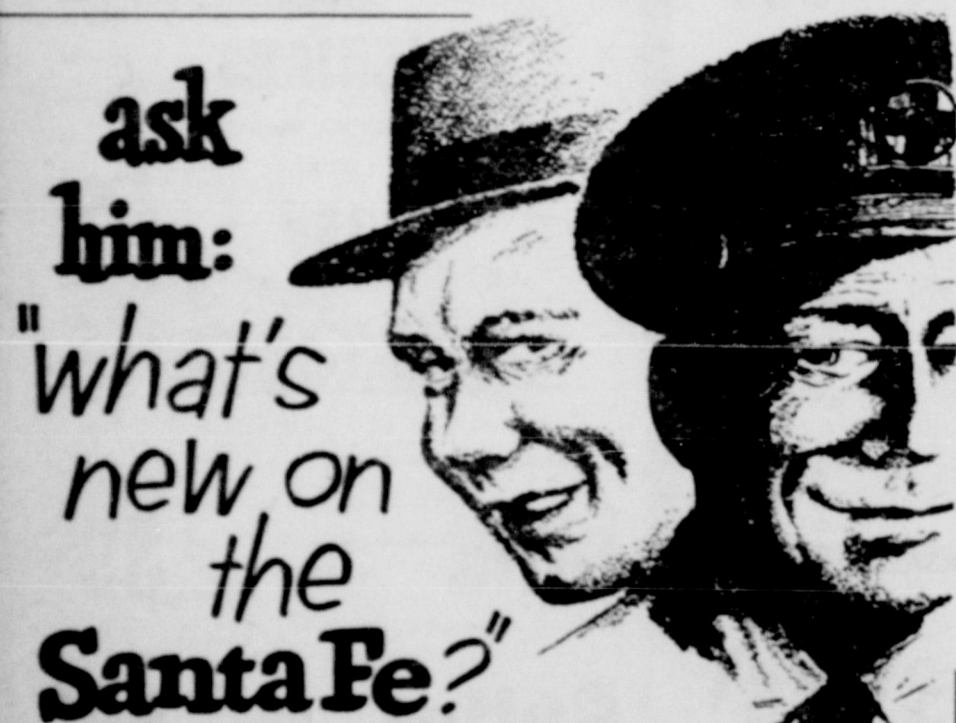

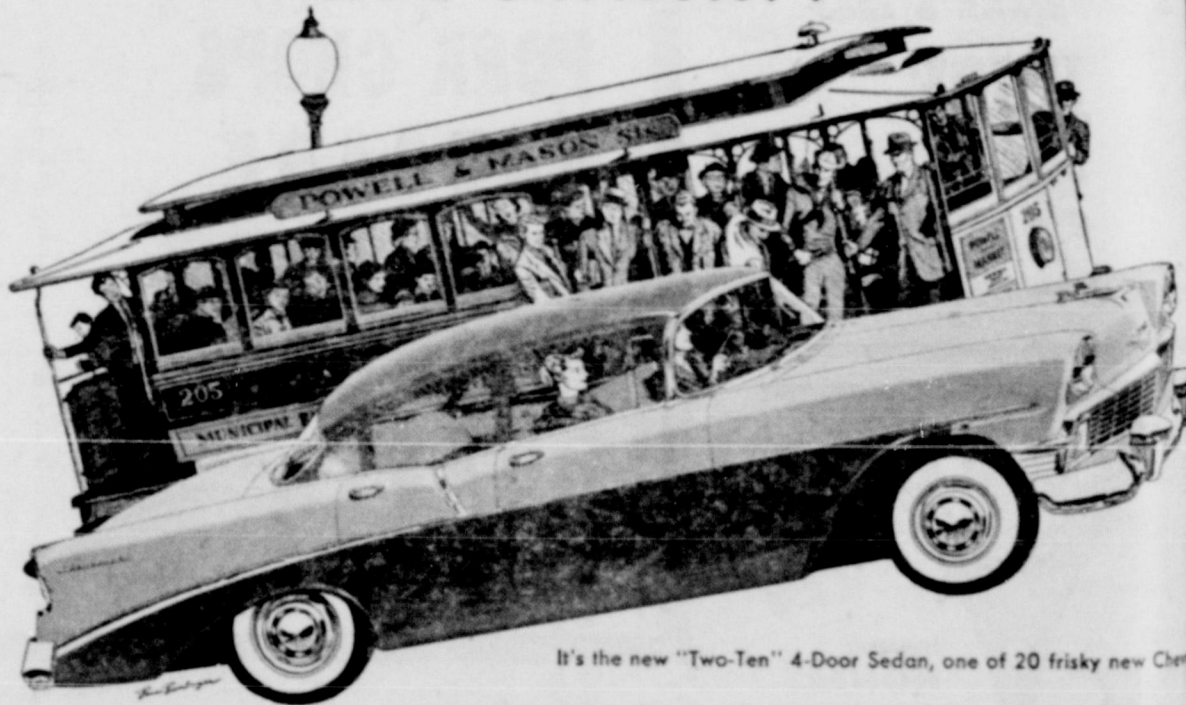
