Dr. William O. Beazley, executive vice-president of Hardin Simmons University, will address the Benjamin seniors at their baccalaureate services on Sunday evening, May 28 at 8:00 o'clock.

Dr. Beazley is well-known in this area as he has spoken here many times on different occasions.

A native of Lexington, Va., Dr. Beazley holds a B.A. degree from Bridgewater College, Bridgewater, Virginia, and Master of Religious Education and Doctor of Education Degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth. His undergraduate majors are history and biology and he holds a permanent teacher's certificate from the state of Virginia.

His teaching experience dates back to 1937 when he became coach and assistant principal of Linville-Edmon High School in Edmon, Virginia. He came to Hardin-Simmons University as a teacher in religious education in 1948.

He has served as interim pastor of a number of West Texas churches among one of which is Munday's First Baptist Church for two years.

Dr. Beazley is an ordained minister and a member of Abilene's First Baptist Church. He is married and the father of three children.

## Sunday Reception Will Honor Retiring Teacher

Mrs. Ottis Cash, a person loved and respected by students through 47 years of teaching, is retiring at the end of this school year.

The Knox City Independent School District, the Board of Education, the faculty, Future Teachers of America, Pep Club, and the Delta Kappa Gamma will host a reception in her honor Sunday afternoon at the First United Methodist Church from two until five o'clock.

The gracious teacher said that she had taught 46 years in Knox County and one year in Foard County at Crowell and had loved "every minute of it." The last 26 of these years have been in Knox City.

Her teaching career began at Truscott in 1923 and at the end of the first year as the school had to drop one teacher, Mrs. Cash suggested that the board let her go as she was the last teacher hired. The salary at that time was \$85.00 per month for eight months. Mrs. Cash told the Truscott banker, Mr. Chesser, that she was not going to teach anymore. However, he insisted that since her dad had educated her to teach that she must continue. She was then hired at Gilliland where she was paid \$100 per month for nine months and after two years at Gilliland, she married and moved to Crowell in the fall of 1926.

Mrs. Cash's father had moved to Knox City and insisted that she and Ottis move here, so from 1927 until 1936 she taught in Knox City.

through twelve and has taught English, American History, and Algebra in High School as well as serving as grade school principal and high school principal in Knox City.

She has coached all athletics both boys and girls, except football and she laughingly remarked if they had been playing football at that time, she probably would have coached that sport, too.

Mrs. Cash has taught her sister, her nephew, her son and her daughter-in-law.

She related that she taught one year here during the depression for script with no one penny in money received for the entire year. She explained that the school board members did their best by the teachers in making out the script in any denominations convenient for them. She said she traded her script for what she had to have, never discounting it one cent, and got rid of every bit of it with the help of good friends such as the banker, T.E. Robbins, who helped her in trading it off.

During the years at Knox City, Mrs. Cash has served as Pep Club sponsor, and was responsible for organizing the Future Teachers of America chapter here ten years ago. Mrs. Artie Mae Burkett of Haskell came to Knox City and organized the chapter and Mrs. Cash said that this organization was especially close to her heart. She remarked that members of FTA plan and operate the chapter themselves and each has a desire not only to belong but to make it successful. She described the chapter as "fast-moving, thriving, and interesting."

Mrs. Cash is a member and past president of Beta Chi Chapter of the Delta Kappa Gamma, a life member and former president of the Knox City Study Club, and an active member of the Church of Christ. She said that when she resigned at Sunset, she told Mr.

### Induction Orders To Be Issued

#### To 1972 First Priority Group

AUSTIN, Texas—Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas, is instructing Texas Draft Boards to issue Induction Orders to all 1972 First Priority Selection Group men with Lottery numbers of 35 or below.

Under the Uniform National Call procedure, the "Induction Cut-Off Number" was announced by Acting Director of Selective Service Byron V. Peppone. Induction Orders will be issued to all fully acceptable registrants in the United States below who are members of the 1972 First Priority Group. This Priority Group is made up basically of men born in Calendar Year 1952.

Glantz said there is no quota of men for Texas, but he expects the June Call to result in approximately 650 inductions in Texas.

Glantz also said men in the 1972 First Priority Selection Group with Lottery Numbers of 75 and below could expect orders for a Pre-induction Physical Examination in June or July.

The Defense Department asked Selective Service to deduct Local Board No. 32, said no Induction Orders will be issued in Knox, King, or Baylor Counties. There are three men who will be issued orders for Pre-induction Physical Examinations soon.

"Where shall wisdom be found?" Job 28:12. Job asked this question of which he was speaking of the wisdom of God, in whom are hid all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. ## 'Understand Parents' Leaflet Available

The generation gap works two ways: misunderstood children and misunderstood parents.

"Understanding Your Parents", a new fact sheet from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, explores parents—what youth expect of parents, how they can help parents.

A first step is to accept parents as they are. This does not mean liking and admiring everything about them.

It does mean accepting them as humans with hopes, weaknesses, feelings, ideas and dreams. Every parent wants to feel that his children believe in him, respect and accept him.

Recognize that being a parent is a hard job.

Parents have many material and emotional responsibilities. Financial support, protection, love and affection and proper social and intellectual development are a few.

They have additional responsibilities in school and community affairs.

Appreciate that some adults are better equipped than others for parenthood. A very few have ever had formal education in family living or the care and raising of children.

They learn after they are married and have children.

Some parents worry; others do not. Some find it easy to have trust and faith; others do not. Some are easy going and never get upset; others do.



But she did not stop there. She followed up with a damage suit against Fred's parents.

At the trial, the parents claimed they could not be expected to make unpleasant disclosures about their own child. Nevertheless, the court held them liable. The judge said their defense was too deliberate and too important to be excused.

This is an unusual case. But it illustrates that doting parents do not have an unlimited right to favor their child at someone else's expense.

A comparable situation arises when parents are accused not of unfairly pushing a marriage but of unfairly breaking one up. For example:

A mother was sued by her daughter-in-law for alienation of her son's affections. It seems that the mother had waged a relentless campaign against the marriage, not so much because she loved her son as because she hated his wife. The court decided this too was outside the parental privilege and ordered the mother to pay damages.

Of course, the law does give parents a considerable amount of freedom to speak their mind. In another case, a youthful husband who was having marital difficulties went to his father for a man-to-man talk. The father urged him to get a divorce, and he did.

Could the father be held liable by the divorced wife for alienation of affection? A court said he could not, because his interference was within the reasonable limits of a parent's role. As one judge put it:

"Times of stress naturally bring parent and child together for counsel and advice. This, the law does not condemn."

### Violations Reported

Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has released egg law violation figures for the last four months of 1971 showing that during this period 14,877 lots totalling 1,562,351 eggs were inspected by his Department with approximately 2,100 stop-sale orders being issued.

Commissioner White noted that most of these "stop-sales" were written on eggs originating out-of-state. The continued T.D.A. emphasis on quality inspections at the plant level, he added, has resulted in a sharp decline in the number of out-of-state "AA" packs being marketed in Texas.

Elaborating on the T.D.A. "in-plant" inspection program, White said, "The strategy is to identify and solve quality problems before they reach the retail level. This allows the packer to make necessary corrections before the eggs leave the premises. In turn the retailer is happier with the eggs he receives and the housewife is assured the uniform high quality she has come to expect from Texas eggs."

Explaining some of the more common "non-quality" egg law violations, Commissioner White pointed out that most occur when carton inventories change hands because of the sale of a business or the transfer of an account. "In such cases," he added, "we recommend the use of a pressure sensitive label that will obscure incorrect information and display required additional information."

In closing, White commended Texas egg industry men for their cooperation in attaining continually higher quality throughout the State. "The point of our enforcement effort," he concluded, "is to protect both consumers and Texas producers from the sale of eggs that do not meet those quality standards set as goals by our own industry people."

### Your TV Set Can Detect A Tornado

These instructions should be available for quick reference when a tornado warning has been broadcast for your area.

First—warm up your TV set and tune in channel 13. Darken the screen to almost black—use the brightness control.

Second—turn to channel 12 and leave the volume control down (unless you have a broadcaster on that channel).

Your tornado detector is now in operation. As a storm approaches, lightning will produce momentary white bands of varying widths across the screen (color sets produce a colored band). A tornado within 15 to 20 miles will produce a totally white screen and remain white (color or color sets). Should this occur, turn off your TV set, take your portable radio and go to a place of shelter immediately.
