Briscoe was increased. In the 1950s hay was hauled in from the mid-west to help sustain the mother cow herds. He is hopeful that a like program may possibly be undertaken.

Wind erosion may become a terrific problem, the judge said, unless some soaking rains come soon. Dust storms are forecast if ample rain doesn't fall before the winds begin to pick up this fall.

"We're doing everything within our capabilities," Clonts said. "There may be some farmers here quitting if things don't get better quick."

Briscoe's request was sent to U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz. Briscoe already has asked for federal aid for several other counties.

Wilson Receives Safety Award

Chad Wilson, Rural Mail Carrier of Knox City, has been selected as Driver of the Year for the Abilene Sectional Center.

Clyde Grant P.M. - Section Center manager - and Lou Henderson, safety officer, were in Knox City Tuesday to present Mr. Wilson with a certificate of Special Achievement as well as a check for \$500.00.

This is the first year the award has been given, and it is open to all employees who drive in the postal service. It is a part of the program to make all postal employees "safety conscious" with special emphasis on safe driving.

Mr. Wilson began his career with the postal service December 1, 1934, as a clerk for his father, John A. Wilson who was then Knox City's Postmaster. He was appointed Substitute Rural Carrier in 1935 on Route 1 which was

carried at that time by W.W. Hyde. Upon Mr. Hyde's retirement, Chad was made regular carrier July 1, 1941. Except for service as a naval mail clerk in 1944-45, he has served as a carrier for the Knox City Post Office ever since.

On March 21, 1959, the rural routes in Knox City were consolidated and Chad became the only carrier with a route of 93 miles.

Mr. Wilson has operated a postal vehicle for well over a million miles, and during this time, he has never had an accident of any sort or a traffic citation of any kind.

"This is an outstanding

record," Mr. Henderson, the safety officer, said, "which we would hope all postal drivers will try to equal or excel in years to come."

Mr. Grant expressed his personal appreciation in addition to his official commendation. "Employees such as Mr. Wilson make everyone's job easier and we offer our sincere congratulations."

Chad and his wife, the former Mabel Clonts, are both natives of Knox City. They have one son, Jerry, who resides in Dallas with his wife and three children.

They are members of the First United Methodist Church.
