They fit well into bays or corners of the back yards or in front of screens or border plantings. Avoid spoiling the spacious effect of the lawn by scattered bulb beds at the forefront of home grounds or planting them in rings around trees or shrubs.

Sunshine is not important if you expect only one crop of blooms, full sun or sun the greater part of the day is needed by nost bulbs.
