With the many new materials on the market today, this labeling program will provide an important service to the homemaker and should be instrumental in keeping overall household expenses down. Mrs. Hoge said that 126 million labels will be put into use during the next months as they are attached to clothing.

Many of the new synthetics which appear washable should be dry cleaned and then on the other hand, some items should never be dry cleaned.

Mrs. A. L. Fitzgerald with an assignment of "Women in Medicine" chose to speak on Dr. Frances Oldham Kelsey, whose work on pharmacology with the U. S. Food and Drug Adm. came to the light by the Doctor's failure to give approval to the use of the drug Thalidomide thus preventing the tragedy in our nation that occurred in some European countries. Dr. Kelsey received the distinguished Federal Civilian Service Award for her outstanding contribution to the nation.

"Women in Government" was presented by Mrs. George Davis, who told about the work in India of Indira Gandhi, that country's first woman Prime Minister. Mrs. Gandhi, with her "magic name in India" was called to Nehru's side while he was Prime Minister to serve in a governmental post and was swept into the Prime Minister office later by a 2 to 1 vote. She serves 480 million people and took over as head of the government at a time of "trouble everywhere" not only militarily, but also at a time of famine and poverty, which has continuously plagued her country. Mrs. Gandhi ranks as one of the top politicians of the world.

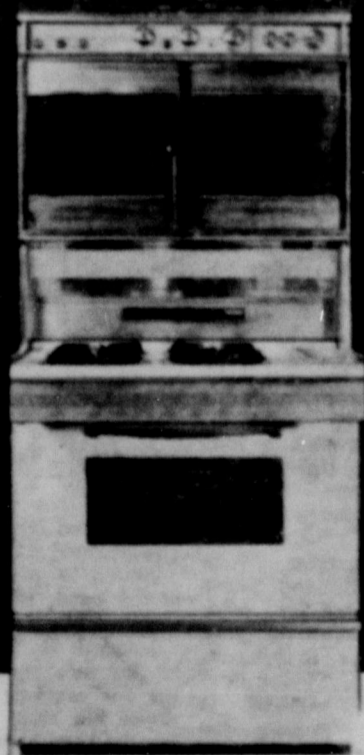

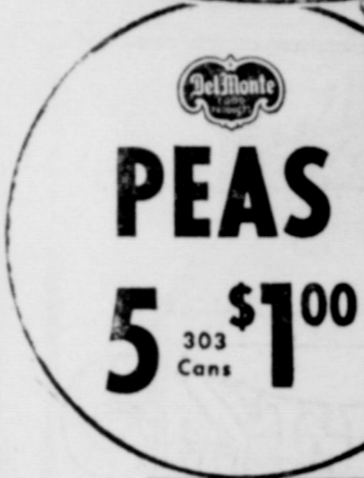

An item of particular interest brought out by the speaker was the new clothing labeling program becoming more widely used by manufacturers, which gives specific information on the care of clothing as what method of cleaning should be used.

With the many new materials on the market today, this labeling program will provide an important service to the homemaker and should be instrumental in keeping overall household expenses down. Mrs. Hoge said that 100 million labels will be put into use during the next month as they are attached to clothing.

Many of the new synthetics which appear washable should be dry cleaned and then on the other hand, some items should never be dry cleaned.

Mrs. A. L. Fitzgerald with an assignment of "Women in Medicine" chose to speak on Dr. Frances Oldham Kelsey, whose work on pharmacology with the U. S. Food and Drug Adm. came to the light by the Doctor's failure to give approval to the use of the drug Thalidomide thus preventing the tragedy in our nation that occurred in some European countries. Dr. Kelsey received the distinguished Federal Civilian Service Award for her outstanding contribution to the nation.

"Women in Government" was presented by Mrs. George Davis, who told about the work in India of Indira Ghandi, that country's first woman Prime Minister. Mrs. Ghandi, with her "magic name in India" was called to Nehru's side while he was Prime Minister to serve in a governmental post and was swept into the Prime Minister office later by a 2 to 1 vote. She serves 480 million people and look over as head of the government at a time of "trouble everywhere" not only militarily, but also at a time of famine and poverty, which has continuously plagued her country. Mrs. Ghandi ranks as one of the top politicians of the world.

National Fire Prevention Week October 9 - 15

Written for Last Week

Observance of National Fire Prevention week, October 9-15, in Knox County is being urged by both rural and city fire prevention leaders.

Oscar Spann president of the Knox County Farm Bureau urges citizens of Knox County to pay special heed to the observance this year by taking steps to prevent costly fires.

"We urge everyone to develop good fire safety habits which include such things as care with matches and smoking, good house-keeping to get rid of rubbish, proper use of electrical fuses, appliances, and extension cords, and a constant general awareness of the ways fires start and to how to avoid them." He added that fires killed about 12,000 people and inc cost exceeded \$1.76 billion in the U.S. last year.

The local farm bureau president said the fall and winter months are the most vulnerable times of the year for rural fires. "When fire occurs on far more rural property, damage is 3 to 6 times greater than in the average city fires."

Mr. Spann said that farm bureau has two programs designed to help curtail fire losses. The local organization, in cooperation with the Texas farm bureau, sponsors the attendance of local volunteer firemen at the annual Firemen's Training School each July in College Station. Local fire-fighters sponsored this year were Glynn Weaver. The State and local farm
