Be it resolved by the Leigslature of

cle 3 of the Constitution of the State

thirty days of the regular session of the Legislature the various comtees of each House shall hold bear and such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such cm ergency matters as may be submit ted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature provided however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership.

Sec. 2. That Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Members of the Legislature shall receive from the ublic Treasury a per diem of not exceeding \$10.00 per day for the first 120 days of each session and after that not exceeding \$5.00 per day for the remainder of

In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and re turning from the seat of government which mileage shall not exceed \$2.50 for every 25 miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comp troller of each county seat now or hereafter to be established, no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called with in one day after the adjournment of a regular or called session.

Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional argendment shall be submitted to the electors of this state qualified to vote on constitutional amend forsments at an election to be held throughout the State on the firs Tuesday after the first Monday November, A. D. 1930.


